Stange Tops Twins on 3 Hits

 BOSTON, Mass. — Lee Stange, a former Twin, pitched a three-hitter as Boston defeated Minnesota 4-0 Monday.

Stange, 30, a resident of St. Louis Park, had a perfect game until two were out in the seventh inning. Then Harmon Killebrew lined a single to left.

"KILLEBREW hit a curve, up a little too high and a little to much inside," Stange said.

Stange pitched for the Twins from 1961 until he was traded to Cleveland for Jim Grant in June 1964. He came to Boston last summer with pitcher Don McMahon in exchange for relief pitcher

er Dick Radatz. Stange is 7-6 this season.

Stange employed mostly his fast ball and slider yesterday, keeping the ball on the outside corner.

"SINCE I've been working in rotation, my control has come around," Stange said. He has a four-game winning streak.

Stange walked none yesterday and has granted only 18 walks in 113 innings.

Carl Yastrzemski gave right-center/off-ender Dave Rowell.

"Mike Ryan and Joe Foy scored ahead of Yastrzemski in a tie with Killebrew for the American League lead in runs batted in with 75.

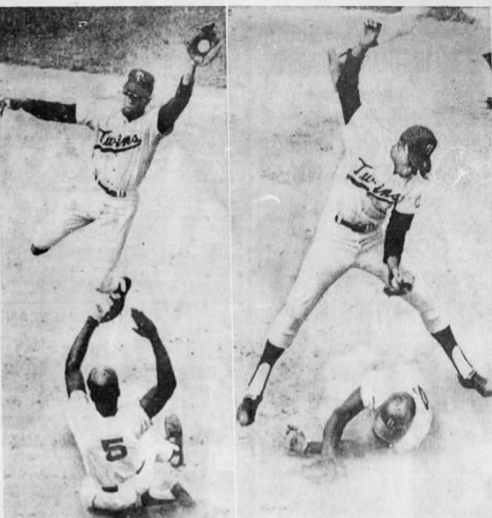
Boswell and Jim O'Neil, who relieved in the eighth, allowed only four hits. Third baseman Foy got two hits.

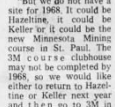
