# McNally Wins His 20th as Orioles Defeat A's

BALTIMORE, Md.—Dave McNally pitched the Baltimore Orioles to a 5-1 victory over Oakland Tuesday night and became the first 20-game winner in the major leagues.

McNally, who has won eight straight, got all the runs he needed when the Orioles scored four runs on five consecutive hits in the third inning, chasing starter Diego Segui, 8-10.

The Baltimore left-hander, who has lost seven, reached the 20-victory total for the third consecutive season—feat last accomplished in the American League by Bob Lemon of Cleveland in 1952-54.

Canny Campaneris had four singles for Oakland, which bunched six of its 10 hits in the first three innings.

# Mantle Not After Houk's Position

NEW YORK, N.Y. (AP)—Mickey Mantle makes it plain he's not after Ralph Houk's job.

"I didn't come here for that purpose," the New York Yankee's newest coach said Tuesday, but he admitted he does have managerial aspirations.

Mantle, in an interview, pointed out that he first asked Houk's permission before joining the Yankees.

"I asked Ralph if it was okay with him," said Mantle. "I never push him out of a job—he's the best manager I ever played for."

The former Yankee star starts in his new capacity Sunday, when the team taken on the Minnesota Twins at Yankee Stadium.

Although I like living in the Southwest best," he said he considered it almost imperative to come back to New York. "This is my city—the people have been so good to me here."

Mantle, who hit 536 homers during a record-breaking career, recently was chosen as the fifth Yankee coach. His addition will have no immediate effect on the positions and responsibilities of the other four coaches. The team plans to use five the remainder of this year and again in 1971.

He will serve as a special batting coach, assisting especially the young players, occasionally working on the coaching lines and aiding Houk in a variety of ways.

Why did he come back? "It was getting tired of just sitting around in Dallas," the MoCo said, "and I wanted to do something in baseball—my first love."

Mantle said he wanted to get into managing in the future, but not necessarily with New York.

"We'll just have to wait and see how things work out this season," he said. "I won't be able to make a decision until after the season."
