counted for all of Boston's runs with his third homer in the seventh. It boosted his league lead in runs batted in to 115.

Yastrzemski is tied for the league lead in homers with Minnesota's Harmon Killebrew, who hit two yesterday, and also leads in average with .319 in his bid for the triple crown.

The dejected Yastrzemski refused to count his club out, but he conceded an edge at least to Minnesota in the windup of the four-team dogfight for the American League flag.

"They've been through this before just a couple of years ago," Yastrzemski said. "But their big edge is experience. We've got a lot of young ball players on this club. Over the entire season you can be great, but when you get down to the last three or four games, youth and inexperience may show."

His homer tied him with Ted Williams for the Boston single-season homer record for a left-handed hitter. He called it "my biggest personal thrill in baseball," but said it would have been "a lot more satisfying if we had won."

Chico Salmon, a .222 hitter, drove in three of the Indians' runs with a homer and double as Cleveland beat former teammate Hall for the first time in four decisions this year.

Tant, fanned eight Red Sox batters to set a Cleveland record for strikeouts in one season, boosting the 1967 total to 1,165. The high was 1,162 in 1964.

The Red Sox set an all-time home attendance mark with its crowd of 16,652-1,008,752.

A National League spokesman said he did not intend to file a protest with the league.

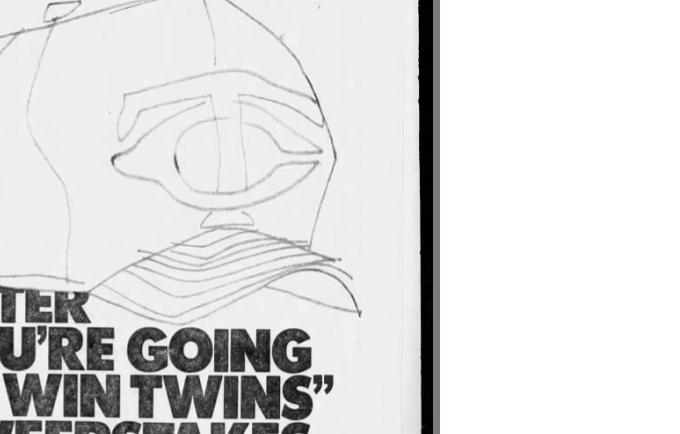
