Weaver pointed to the outfield, and umpire crew chief Nestor Chylak at second base even entered the discussion.

Weaver claimed the Twins were "cheating" with a 10th man in the scoreboard in right-center field calling the pitches.

Imagine, manager Billy Martin of the Twins doing a thing like that in the great American pastime of baseball, 1969 playoff style.

"Yah," Martin waved his beer mug in the cool of the clubhouse after the game, "that was the turn-ing point. We had a submarine periscope man in the scoreboard."

Mets, manager Weaver presented his version of "scoreboard superspy." "We had Curt Motton in

In the meantime, Frank Robinson of the Orioles was holding "Kangaroo Court" in the Baltimore clubhouse and he fined Weaver for saying the Orioles needed to win five more to win the World Sorios. Series.

Over on the Twins' side, Martin said, "The Mets have some pitching, but they'll be surprised to see some of these Baltimore hitters. I like Baltimore in the World Series."
