Frosh HR Clouters Chase Vet Roberts

The home run, champagne of hits, has Pacific Coast League pitchers reeling. And, in this singular season, no matter who leads the league in long balls, a record will be set.

The Coast league this year will zip through its shortest season in history. The slimmed schedule calls for only 148 games. Thus, no batter will approach the hoary homer mark of 60 in a season, set by Tony Lazzeri for Salt Lake in 1925, when the PCL labored long—200 games.

At this writing, Dave Roberts of the Oklahoma City 89ers was in front of the distance hitters with 25 homers. Dave could come up with 40 for the year.

Yet, the fans' murmurs-and the pitchers' moans - over homers do not center as much on Roberts as on s o m e redoubtable rookie rappers. Roberts is a veteran and known for his power. It is the precocious yearlings who are capturing notice with the unexpected.

Oddly, two are first basemen, Lee May of San Diego and Bill Davis of Portland. May, who stepped into the spikes of another hot San Diego rookie first baseman, Tony Perez, was the first newcomer to reach and pass the 20 total in home runs.

May Falls Into Slump Lee had hit 21 homers at the halfway point of the season. He then went silent for a full week or might have thrown more challenge at Rob-

erts for the league lead. Davis, who graduated from the University of Minnesota last year, was not even expected to stick with the Beavers. But the lanky fellow began pounding almost immediately and couldn't be moved. He was on May's heels with 20 homers.

Then, there is Tacoma's Ollie Brown, prime outfield prospect of the San Francisco organization. Brown was in strong contention for rookie slugging honors with 19 homers, most of them strategic swats.

Hawaii also has a callow clouter, Brant Alyea, young outfielder. Brant had 17 fence blasts at press time.

Rick Reichardt, the most expensive piece of baseball merchandise in the league, made a slow start

but recently has found the range. For Seattle, he has hit 11 homers and no longer is belying his \$200,000 price tag.

Clouting Kosco-A Real Bargain, Twins Forecast

DENVER, Colo.

There's always something exciting, for the present owners at least, about a player who makes it big with one organization after another has given up on him.

Such a guy is Andy Kosco of the Denver Bears, who, according to Minnesota's executive vice-president, Joe Haynes, "has to be the player of the year in the minor leagues."

Lest Haynes be accused of organization prejudice, consider these Kosco credentials: 86 runs batted in, 31 doubles, 19 homers and a .318 batting average in Denver's first 87 games; a "sure glove; a tremendous arm from right field; virtual immunity to injury; exceptional speed for a big man; the power that a well-coordinated frame of 6-3, 208 pounds can produce; willingness and ability to absorb instruction; outstanding temperament, and person-

\$45,000 Bonus From Tigers

How did such a man get away from his original owners, the Tigers, who signed him for a \$45,000 bonus?

Listen to Vern Morgan, who managed Minnesota's Bismark-Mandan (Northern) farm last year and is presently managing Wilson in the Carolina League:

"We happened to be in Duluth last year in the spring when I read in the paper that Kosco had been released. I couldn't believe it. Usually, the only reason you release a big strong youngster is because of injury, a dead arm, or because the kid may be a bad actor or a bad influence.

"So I called the Duluth club and asked if it was true they had released him. They said it was so. I asked if he was a bad actor. They said no.


"Finally I called Kosco and asked him if he wanted to join our club. He said yes. Next I talked to the Twins' farm office and got the goahead to sign him.

"All it cost us was a ten-cent phone call."

Preparing for Law Career

Kosco, a budding lawyer who has all the credits to enroll in law school and plans to do so eventually, suddenly found himself. He had a sensational season in the Northern League, hitting .346 with 28 homers, 24 doubles and 97 runs batted inall league-leading marks. His work last spring with the Twins proved it wasn't a fluke.

Although technically on the Denver roster, he literally had the Minnesota roster made and the Twins were going to keep him until a recheck showed his options were used

up. This meant the Twins couldn't later send him to Denver once the season started without exposing him to the draft in the fall. So he stayed on the Denver roster.

Detroit General Manager Jim Campbell, who originally signed Kosco, explained his release this way: "We knew the boy had all the tools, but he never was able to put them together for us.

"He had been in the minor leagues for five years and all of his major league options were used up. Sometimes when a player is released, it shakes him up. This apparently is what happened to Kosco. He led a Class A league in hitting, but after being in baseball for five years, this isn't a great accomplishment.

Passed Over Despite Big Year

"Even after the great year in the Northern League, he was subject to draft and 19 clubs passed him. Frankly, I was surprised somebody didn't take him."

Kosco credits Morgan and his present manager, Cal Ermer, for helping him lick his problems. Morgan told him to give up switchhitting and concentrate on righthanded hitting only. It paid off. Ermer has helped Kosco whip a strikeout problem after he had whiffed 40 times in Denver's first 44 games.

He then went 11 games without a whiff and had only 12 in the next 30 games, a low rate for the big slugger type.

The 23-year-old native of Youngstown, O., who has completed three years of pre-law study at Youngstown University, looks like the bargain of all time for Minnesota's Calvin Griffith.
