Dropped by Twins, Whitby Fires No-Hit Game for Charlotte

August 11 began on a blue note for Bill Whitby, but ended with a sweet song of success when the 22-year-old righthander with Charlotte pitched the first no-hitter of his professional career to defeat Asheville, 2-0.

It also was the first nine-inning no-hitter in the Southern League this season.

Whitby, who had been pitching for Charlotte on option from the Twins, learned the day before that he had been released outright to the Hornets.

His no-hitter was keyed to a touch of irony. Sherry Robertson, farm director of the Twins, was in the stands for the game.

Whitby, who had a brief trial with the Twins last year, walked only one and struck out eight in posting his seventh victory against five defeats. But the 6-foot-1, 190-pounder had to weather several close calls to keep his gem intact.

In fact, one play originally was ruled a hit, then changed to an error after official scorer Wilt Browning conferred with the players involved and the managers of both teams.

Shortstop Drops Ball

In the seventh inning, Felix Santana of Asheville looped a soft liner toward left field. Shortstop Minnie Mendoza, backpedaling, made a leaping catch of the ball and then dropped it.

"I had my eye on it all the way,"
Mendoza told Browning after the
game. "But I just jumped too soon.
I should have made the play."


Charlotte Manager Al Evans and Asheville skipper Pete Peterson agreed that Mendoza had misplayed the ball, but Whitby was noncommittal.

Browning changed his decision, charged Mendoza with an error and Whitby had his first no-hitter since his high school days in Victoria, Va.


After graduating in June, 1961, Whitby signed with the Twins and went to Wytheville (Appalachian), where he had a 2-7 record and a 6.05 ERA. After spending time at Ft. Walton Beach (Alabama-Florida) and Wilson (Carolina) the next year, he had another losing season (9-12) at Wilson in 1963.

Whitby moved to Charlotte last year and logged an 11-9 slate. The Twins recalled him briefly.

That little taste of the majors has made Whitby a hungry man. He wants more of the same.

Beck Chalks Up Southern's 4th '65 No-Hitter

No-hit games are rapidly becoming a fad in the Southern League.

The latest to accomplish the feat was righthander Rich Beck of the Columbus Yankees, who faced the minimum 21 batters and beat Lynchburg, 2-0, in the seven-inning night-cap of a double-header, August 13.

Beck's masterpiece was the fourth no-hit, no-run game of the season in the league.

The 6-foot-3, 190-pound native of Spokane, Wash., recorded his tenth victory against seven defeats with his sparkling performance against the White Sox.

Beck walked leadoff man Bruce Andrew in the first inning, but after pilfering second, Andrew was thrown out trying to steal third.

He also walked Danny Murphy, leadoff man in the second inning, but Murphy was erased on a double play. The Columbus pitcher then retired Lynchburg in order the final five innings to record the second no-hitter of his professional career.

Same Pilot in '62


He hurled his first no-hitter, also seven innings, against Boise while making his O. B. debut with Idaho Falls (Pioneer), June 19, 1962. By coincidence, his manager at Idaho Falls was Loren Babe, the present Columbus skipper.

Beck, who had a 6-9 record at Chattanooga last season, was acquired from the Lookouts just before the current campaign opened.

He had been in the Yankees' organization before the Phillies drafted him in November of 1962. Johnny Johnson, the Yankee farm director, said he had always liked the gangling righthander and jumped at the opportunity to get him back.

Beck, christened Richard Henry, was a football, basketball and baseball star at Pasco (Wash.) High School and made the all-state baseball team his senior season. He also played baseball and basketball at Columbia Basin Junior College and at Gonzaga University. He was signed by Yankee scout Eddie Taylor after his graduation.

At Idaho Falls in '62, Rich recorded a 9-6 record, his only winning season in baseball until this year.
