## ALMORA PROVIDES SPARK OFF THE BENCH

In the Chicago Cubs' 17-5 win over the New York Mets on Wednesday night, outfielder Albert Almora entered the game as a pinch-hitter for the Cubs in the bottom of the seventh inning and hit a three-run home run. After remaining in the game, Almora came to bat once again in the bottom of the eighth inning and collected a bases-clearing triple to plate three more runs.

Almora became just the $12^{\text {th }}$ player since RBI became an official statistic in 1920 to collect six RBI in a game that he did not start, and just the first since 2005, when Toronto's Reed Johnson accomplished the feat in a 15-2 win over Boston (full list below).

In addition, Elias notes that there have been over 2,000 six-RBI games produced in the Major Leagues since 1920, but there have been only two other instances of a player driving in six runs while only having two plate appearances in the game - Detroit's Babe Birrer against Baltimore on July 19, 1955 and San Diego's Archi Cianfrocco against Atlanta on July 21, 1995.

With a triple and a homer in last night's contest, Almora joined Chris Taylor of the Los Angeles Dodgers as the second player this season to collect a triple and a home run in a game off the bench. This season is just the third time since at least 1913 in which two different players accomplished this feat in a single game. In 2011, Toronto's Dewayne Wise and San Diego's Cameron Maybin turned the trick, while Montreal's Adolfo Phillips and Philadelphia's Dave Watkins accomplished the feat in 1969.

## 20-HOMER CLUB

Entering play today, the Baltimore Orioles have logged 220 home runs this season, second-most in the Majors to only the Texas Rangers (221). Led by three-time All-Star third baseman Manny Machado (32), Baltimore boasts six players so far this season with at least 20 home runs - Jonathan Schoop, Adam Jones, Trey Mancini, Chris Davis and Mark Trumbo - matching the record for the second-most players on a team with at least 20 homers.

Backstop Welington Castillo enters action today with 19 round-trippers on the season. With his next home run, this year's Orioles will become the sixth Club in Major League history with seven players reaching the 20-homer milestone, joining the 2010 Blue Jays, 2009 Yankees, 2005 Rangers, 2000 Blue Jays and 1996 O's.

In 2016, four teams had six players reach the 20 -homer mark - the Orioles, St. Louis Cardinals, Blue Jays and Washington Nationals - to establish a Major League record. This season, in addition to the Orioles, the Chicago Cubs and Cincinnati Reds have each seen six players club at least 20 home runs this season. Entering play today, both the Los Angeles Dodgers and Texas Rangers each have six players with at least 18 home runs on the season. Should each player reach the 20-homer threshold before the 2017 campaign concludes, this season will set a new MLB record with five teams seeing six players reach 20 round-trippers.

Additionally, the Cubs have set a Major League record with five 20 -homer seasons by players in their age 25-or-younger season (Javier Báez, Kris Bryant, Willson Contreras, Ian Happ, Kyle Schwarber), surpassing the 2007 Milwaukee Brewers and 1979 Montreal Expos, both of which had four.

Lastly, Robinson Chirinos of the Rangers enters play today with 17 round-trippers on the season. If he, Nomar Mazara and Shin-Soo Choo each reach the 20-homer mark, this year's Rangers would establish a new Major League record with eight players reaching the milestone.

## 10/10 VISION

On Tuesday night against the Pittsburgh Pirates at Miller Park, Milwaukee Brewers third baseman Travis Shaw stole his $10^{\text {th }}$ base on the season. During his breakout campaign, Shaw enters play today slashing .272/.349/.523 with 31 doubles, 29 home runs and 90 RBI to go along with his 10 stolen bases. Joined by Orlando Arcia, Ryan Braun, Keon Broxton, Hernán Pérez, Domingo Santana and Jonathan Villar, the 2017 Brewers became the first team in Major League history with seven players posting at least 10 home runs and 10 stolen bases. The Texas Rangers have seen the second-most players reach the 10/10 mark this season with four players accomplishing the feat (Elvis Andrus, Shin-Soo Choo, Carlos Gomez and Rougned Odor).

The previous record of six players was accomplished three times in MLB history by the 1999 Cincinnati Reds, 1998 New York Yankees and 1991 Reds.

## GARCÍA POSTS FIVE-HIT, SEVEN-RBI AFTERNOON

Earlier this afternoon, Chicago White Sox outfielder Avisaíl García went 5 -for- 5 with seven RBI in a 17-7 win over the Detroit Tigers. The performance marked the fourth instance this season in which a player has posted five hits and seven RBI in a single contest. The others included Washington's Anthony Rendon (six hits, 10 RBI), Cincinnati's Scooter Gennett (five hits, 10 RBI ) and Colorado's Nolan Arenado (five hits, seven RBI). This marks the first season in MLB history to have four such performances, eclipsing the previous best of three, done in 1987 when Kevin Seitzer (six hits, seven RBI), Mickey Brantley (five hits, seven RBI) and Dave Parker (five hits, eight RBI) each accomplished the feat.

# EVERY PICTURE TELLS A STORY (by MLB Official Historian John Thorn) 

## Baseball in Hell

My friend Rob Edelman wrote this in the 2015 number of Base Ball: A Journal of the Early Game:
"In 1901, political cartoonist, writer, and Republican-turned-socialist Arthur Young (1866-1943) published a book with a drawn-out title: Through Hell with Hiprah Hunt: A Series of Pictures and Notes of Travel Illustrating the Adventures of a Modern Dante in the Infernal Regions; Also Other Pictures of the Same Subterranean World. As for its content, the title tells all; the drawings (which come under such descriptions as "Bribe-taking aldermen," "The quack doctors," "Having fun with a brutal policeman," "A case of selfishness," "He walked over others," and "He ate
 like a pig") were previously printed in a range of publications from Cosmopolitan to the New York Evening Journal.
"One has a more generic title: 'A great event.' In it, Young depicts a baseball game in hell, in which those destined to spend eternity down under are privy to a raucous ballgame while crowded into a ballpark that looks more like an ancient coliseum."


When the illustration was first published, as I found at the New York Public Library's Picture Collection, it bore a different title-"A Ball Game"-and a reading line of "Never, until this time, had the sinners known a single hour's respite from torture."

Where did this line originate? It is not to be found in Through Hell with Hiprah Hunt, etc.

A little digging led me to Hell-Up-to-Date: The Reckless Journey of R. Palasco Drant, Special Correspondent, Through the Infernal Regions, as Recorded by Himself; with special illustrations by Art Young. It was published by the Schulte Publishing Company of Chicago in 1894. The jocularly named author may be assumed to be Young himself, as the only copyrights in the volume attach to the publisher (Francis J. Schulte) and to the illustrator ("Arthur H. Young").
"I was fortunate in arriving in Hell at a time when I might witness a scene that had never occurred before in the history of the place. Never, until this time, had the sinners known a single hour's respite from torture. [Aha!] In this one brief holiday, Mr. Satan permitted the holding of a base-ball contest between picked nines from Boston and Chicago sinners. A scrap torn from the Daily Groan, Satan's official organ, and reproduced on page 52, gives a fair report of the more interesting events of the game."

The "scrap" reads thus:


When Young revamped the work for publication in 1901 as Through Hell with Hiprah Hunt, he added this bit of text, as Canto XXXIII:

## LINE DRIVES (Compiled from Club Game Notes)

JOSÉ! JOSÉ! JOSÉ! JOSÉ!: On Saturday night against the San Francisco Giants, White Sox first baseman José Abreu became just the sixth player in Sox history to hit for the cycle, and the first since José Valentin on April 27,2000 vs. Baltimore. According to Elias, he is the first Cuban-born player in Major League history to record a cycle. Abreu joined San Diego's Wil Myers, Washington's Trea Turner, Texas' Carlos Gomez, Colorado's Nolan Arenado, the Dodgers' Cody Bellinger and Tampa Bay's Evan Longoria as players to hit for the cycle in 2017.

GLOVE LOVE: Chciago Cubs first baseman Anthony Rizzo enters tonight with a career-high 123-game errorless streak at first base dating to April $25^{\text {th }}$. That's the longest errorless streak by a Cubs first baseman since Hall of Famer Ernie Banks had a 126-game errorless run at first base spanning the final 114 games of the 1969 season and the first 12 games of 1970.

THE DEBUT: Texas Rangers second baseman Willie Calhoun made his Major League debut Tuesday night and had an RBI single in his first plate appearance. Calhoun became the first Rangers rookie to collect a hit and RBI in his first career plate appearance since his teammate Joey Gallo logged an RBI single on June 20, 2015 against the Chciago White Sox. The rookie also recorded his first outfield assist in the eighth inning.

THE DUDE ABIDES: After his double Tuesday night, Tampa Bay Rays first baseman Lucas Duda's previous 13 hits had all gone for extra bases ( $9-H R, 4-2 B$ ), establishing a Club record. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, this was the longest streak by any player since San Diego's Jim Edmonds (13), July 25-August 25, 2008. Duda leads the Rays with 12 home runs and 23 RBI since being added to their active roster on July $28^{\text {th }}$.

100-100 CLUB: Mets infielder Jose Reyes became the $13^{\text {th }}$ player in team history to reach 100 home runs on September $8^{\text {th }}$. Reyes became the fifth player in Club history to record 100 home runs and 100 stolen bases, joining Darryl Strawberry, Howard Johnson, Carlos Beltrán and David Wright.

MILESTONE: Seattle Mariners third baseman Kyle Seager belted his $150^{\text {th }}$ career home run Tuesday night, becoming the third player in Mariners club history to reach the 150-home run plateau prior to turning 30 years of age. Seager joined Hall of Famer Ken Griffey Jr. (398) and Alex Rodriguez (189) in Mariners lore.

THE LONG BALL: The Oakland A's have hit 40 home runs in the last 21 games and have 209 for the season, which is tied for fourth in the American League. It is the fourth-highest total in Athletics history and is the most since 2000 ( 243 in 1996, 239 in 2000, 235 in 1999). A's players have 18 individual multi-homer games, which is second-most in Oakland history ( 20 in 1996). Home runs have accounted for 321 of the A's 665 runs ( $48.3 \%$ ), and the Oakland record for highest percentage of runs scoring on home runs is 46.3\% in 1996.

WALK YEAR: New York Yankees outfielder Aaron Judge has scored runs in eight of his last nine games (10 R total), and has walked in four straight and seven of eight (11 BB total). His Major League rookie record 110 walks lead the AL and rank second in the Majors to Cincinnati's Joey Votto (121). Judge is only the fourth Yankee since 1963 to reach 110 free passes in a single season, joining Jason Giambi (129 BB in 2003, 110 BB in 2006), Jack Clark (113 BB in 1988) and Willie Randolph ( 119 BB in 1980). Aaron leads the AL with 109 runs scored, the most by a rookie since Mike Trout (129) in 2012, and the third-most in a season by a Yankees rookie in team history (Hall of Famer Joe DiMaggio - 132 in 1936; Earle Combs - 117 in 1925).

SHORT HOPS: Pittsburgh Pirates shortstop Jordy Mercer has established a single-season career high with 14 home runs. The last Pittsburgh shortstop to hit 14 -or-more home runs in one season was Jay Bell, who smacked 16 in 1991. The club record for a shortstop is 19, hit by Arky Vaughan in 1935. Mercer's 46 career home runs as a shortstop give him the fifth-most in team history at that position (Glenn Wright is fourth with 50).

BRING A BROOM: Last night's win gave the Minnesota Twins their $10^{\text {th }}$ sweep of an opponent this season (3 games vs. KC April $3^{\text {rd }}-6^{\text {th }} ; 2$ games at KC April $28^{\text {th }}-30^{\text {th }} ; 2$ games at CWS May $9^{\text {th }}-11^{\text {th }} ; 3$ games at BAL May $22^{\text {nd }}-$ $24^{\text {th }} ; 3$ games at CLE June $23^{\text {rd }}-25^{\text {th }} ; 2$ games vs. MIL August $7^{\text {th }}-8^{\text {th }} ; 2$ games at MIL August $9^{\text {th }}-10^{\text {th }} ; 3$ games vs. ARI August $18^{\text {th }}-20^{\text {th }}$; and 3 games vs. CWS August $29^{\text {th }}-31^{\text {st }}$. The Twins had only four sweeps last season, while their last season with nine sweeps came in 2010, and their last season with 10 sweeps was in 2006 when they won the AL Central.

LIVING DANGEROUSLY: The Angels' 43 comeback wins this season pace the Majors (Club record is 47 comebacks in 2009), while they have also set a Club record with 10 comeback victories when trailing by four-or-more runs (most in MLB). The Angels have 25 one-run wins in 2017 and boast nine wins when trailing after 7 frames. Los Angeles has notched 19 wins in their last at-bat.

ALL HE DOES IS WIN: The 2017 season marks the ninth Postseason appearance as a manager for Dusty Baker of the Washington Nationals. According to Elias, only six other managers have led teams to nine Postseasons, and all of them are in the Hall of Fame: Bobby Cox (16), Joe Torre (15), Tony La Russa (14), Casey Stengel (10), John McGraw (9), and Joe McCarthy (9). The NL East crown is the seventh division title Baker has led his clubs to, joining the 1997 \& 2000 San Francisco Giants, 2003 Chicago Cubs, 2010 \& 2012 Cincinnati Reds and the 2016 Washington Nationals.

SELECT COMPANY: If Houston Astros second baseman Jose Altuve finishes the season leading the league in hits, he will become the first player in MLB history to lead the AL or NL in hits in four straight years. Altuve, who is 10 hits shy of 200 and two doubles shy of 40, could also become the second player in MLB history to post four straight 200-hit, 40-double seasons, joining Wade Boggs (1985-89).

DOUBLES: The Braves doubled seven times Tuesday night, their most two-base hits in a single game since the club posted eight on August 25, 2010 at Colorado. The Atlanta franchise record is nine, done three times and last on July 29, 2007 at Arizona.

300: Entering play today, Cincinnati Reds first baseman Joey Votto has reached base 288 times, the most in the Major Leagues (Charlie Blackmon 2nd, 263). Votto is on pace to lead the Majors in times reaching base for the third time $(2013,2015)$, and on pace to lead the National League for the fifth time $(2011,2013,2015,2016)$.

EXTRA, EXTRA: Colorado Rockies third baseman Nolan Arenado is the second player in franchise history to have three seasons with 80-or-more extra-base hits (also Todd Helton, who had four). Outfielder Charlie Blackmon is the sixth Major League leadoff hitter since 1914 to collect 80-or-more extra base hits, and he is the first Major Leaguer since 2007 (Curtis Granderson, 81; Jimmy Rollins 80) to accomplish the feat.

DYNAMIC DUO: Marlins outfielder Marcell Ozuna recorded his $110^{\text {th }}$ RBI on Tuesday night with a solo home run (\#33) in the $10^{\text {th }}$ inning. He joined Giancarlo Stanton ( $53 \mathrm{HR}, 113 \mathrm{RBI}$ ) to become the first pair of outfield teammates to record at least 30 home runs and 110 RBI in a season since Atlanta's Gary Sheffield ( 39 HR, 132 RBI ) and Andruw Jones ( $36 \mathrm{HR}, 116 \mathrm{RBI}$ ) in 2003. Ozuna is currently fourth in the Majors with a career-high 110 RBI, trailing Nolan Arenado (123), Giancarlo Stanton (113) and Paul Goldschmidt (112). His 110 RBI are the 10th-highest single-season total in Marlins history, while Stanton's 113 are eighth-most.
