Yanks Top Orioles 4-2 to Tie for Lead

BALTIMORE, Md. — (AP) — Southy Whitey Ford pitched his second straight victory for the New York Yankees Friday night with the aid of another homer by Mickey Mantle in a 4-2 triumph over the Baltimore Orioles.

It was the fifth straight triumph after a losing debut for the defending American league champions and moved them into a tie with Detroit for the league lead.

The loss was the fifth out of six games for the Orioles before 12,368 on hand for the start of a four-game series with the Yanks.

Mantle closed his fourth homer of the young season with a runner on base in the third inning of Steve Barber, who had pitched the only Oriole victory to date.

Ford, loser in the Yankee debut, followed with a shut-out last Monday over Kansas City. He doled out seven hits to the Orioles, but they broke his spell of goose eggs in the fifth on a pair of two-runners.

Mantle's homer came behind a single by Hector Lopez, Bobby Richardson, who smashed a single off Barber's glove and took second when catcher Gus Triandos threw the ball into right field, scored the first run on the hit by Lopez.

The Orioles got to Ford on a double by pinch runner Dave Philley over the head of Roger Maris in right field. Philley's two bunter knocked in Earl Robinson, who drew Ford's only walk, and Marv Breeding, who doubled.

The Yankees nudged over their other run on Oriole reliever Dick Hall in the seventh on singles by Howard and Maris and sacrifices by Cito Royer and Ford.
