On Probation

The NCAA backed the Southwestern Conference's two-year probation of Southern Methodist University and put one-year probation on Texas and Arkansas. All penalties apply only to football for rules violations. Of the three, only SMU is prohibited from postseason competition.

Moorhead Nine Triumphs Twice

MOORHEAD, Minn.—(Special) — Moorhead State swept a baseball doubleheader from South Dakota State Monday, 1-0 and 2-0.

Jerry Barney and Dick Harlow teamed to pitch a four-hitter for Moorhead in the opener with Jerry Heggs driving in the winning run. Frank Wagner pitched and batted the host team to the nightcap win with three runs batted in. It was the season opener for both teams.

Golembiewski, Lubanski Take Doubles Lead

Ed Lubanski and Billy Golembiewski, 35-year-old hold-over professionals from Detroit, Mich., scored first in the Classic Doubles division of the American Bowling Congress tournament at the St. Paul Auditorium Monday with a 1,281 total.

Golembiewski, ABC Masters champion in 1960 and 1962, combined a game of 221, 245 and 189 for a 665 total. Lubanski, bowler-of-the-year in 1959 when he won three ABC titles, fired a 616 on games of 200, 199 and 217.

Don Wray and Bob Ulrich, Lake Pointe Chrysler team mates of Billy G. and Lubanski, tied for fifth place in doubles with 1,202.

Classics Division and Ray Orf of St. Louis, Mo., had led Classic Doubles with 1,240.

Lake Pointe, doubled by a 691 from Bob Strampe, shot a 3,032 on games of 960, 1,016 and 1,054 last night, take third in Classic Teams with a six-game 5,912.

Strampe, a Minneapolis native now living in Detroit had games of 556, 525 and 210.

Mike Schmid Five of St. Paul fell to 2,518 last night after a 2,851 start Sunday and claimed fourth place.

Edson, N.J., bowlers accounted for yesterday's other changes.

Terry Makris, a 31-year-old baker's helper, used scoring rounds of 698 in doubles and 629 in singles to nab first place in Regular All-Swifts with 1,502.

Makris, who was competing with a new bowling ball, had shot 375 in Sunday's night team event. Makris' used games of 235, 216 and 247 in doubles to go with partner Jack Middaugh's 542 for a 1,240 total and fifth place.

Lumpe, Rookie Power Tigers KANSAS CITY, Mo.—(AP) — Two-run homers by Jerry Lumpe and rookie John Sullivan fired the Detroit Tigers past the Kansas City Athletics 6-3 Monday night. Detroit got strong pitching from starter and winner Mickey Lolich, a left-hander who won 18 games last season, and right-hander Larry Sherry, who went the last three innings. The Tigers trailed 2-1 against A's starter Mo Drabowski and Dick McAuliffe singled and Lumpe tied it, a 2-pitch to the right field bank. Sullivan's homer was the first major league hit for the 24-year-old catcher, who batted .220 at Syracuse last season. It was a 410-foot drive which nearly cleared the concrete wall atop the right field. Sullivan connected off reliever pitcher Wes Stock after veteran Don Demeter, who was 3-for-3, struck a single to left.

base and none out, the Yankees had little choice but to follow dictated strategy in such situations.

Manager John Keane of New York ordered the bases filled on walk pitcher Pedro Ramos, the fourth and losing Yankee pitcher, first passed pinch-hitter Rich Reese and then pinch-batter Sandy Valdespo, setting up a force play at any base and a possible double play.

IT APPEARED the right-handed Ramos might pitch through the trouble. First, Zoilo Versalles popped out to short left, so shallow Allison was unable to score from third base after the catch. Next, Jerry Kindall safe struck after fouling off an attempted squeeze bunt.

Now it was up to Tovar, a mid-winter trade acquisition from Cincinnati in the Gerry Arango exchange. The crowd worked to one ball and two strikes. The right-handed hitting Venezuelan infielder lined Ramos' exit pitch into short center field.

Center fielder Tom Tresh of the Yankees, who had a miserable day with two errors, came on with a rush and went down to the grass for the catch, coming up with the ball. By a second-base umpire's call, Tovar was out on the outfield for a base out at the play, waved his hand in the safe signal, indicating Tresh had trapped the ball on the short hop.

There was no protest from the Yankees as Allison ambled in from third base with the decisive run on Tovar's single.

IT WAS ONLY a question of injury fate which placed Tovar in the ball game in the first place, and he went from fielding hero to goat, and back to hitting hero in seven innings.

Rich Rollins, the Twins' regular third baseman, left the game in the fourth inning after twisting his left knee chasing a pop fly.

Tovar sparked on five fielding assists until the fateful ninth inning, when he dropped a two-out pop fly to enable the Yankees to gain a 4-4 tie.

Actually, pitcher Jim Kaat of the Twins earned a 2-0 victory in regulation time on a nifty five-batter game as he attempted to end a four-year, nine-game losing streak to New York.

Nursing a one-run lead into the New York ninth, Kaat gave up a one-out single

to Mantle. Lopez entered at 1-0, buster into a worker's hand as Tovar threw out the peevy Elton Howard for the second out. Joe Pepitone then lofted a certain third-out pop up to Tovar.

AT THE LAST second, Tovar appeared to take his eye off the ball and it popped off his glove to the ground for an error. Fans stared for a second in disbelief. Lopez loped home with the tying run to send the game into overtime.

It started out as a duel between Kaat and Jim Boston of the Yankees, but Boston couldn't find his control and the Twins took advantage for a run in the first inning.

Kindall and Rollins walked. They advanced to third and second on a wild pitch and Kindall scored on Tony Oliva's ground out to second baseman Bobby Richardson.

The Twins took an unearned run in the second inning. Pepitone bobbled Jimmie Hall's easy grounder to first base. Hall stole second and scored on Allison's single to center.

Two more runs, one unearned, gave the Twins a 4-1 advantage on Boston in the fourth inning. Harmon Killebrew singled and went to second on a wild pitch. With one out, Allison walked Jerry Zimmerman grounded out to shortstop Tony Kubek, who made a high throw on the attempted force of Allison at second base. All hands were safe.

THEN BOLTON violated an old rule of pitching: "Never throw a slow pitch to a

pitcher," and Kaat singled to center for two runs.

The Yankees kept edging back, however. They got one in the fifth on Howard's 429-foot homer into a worker's pavilion in deep left center. They pulled within 4-3 in the seventh inning on a walk to Maule, Howard's double, Pepitone's infield out and Clete Boyer's sacrifice fly.

Rookie Jerry Farnow of the Twins picked up his first major league victory in the 10th when Allison dropped Kubek's fly ball for a two-base error. Kubek went to third up a sacrifice and scrambled back to the bag before Farnow threw out Tresh. Bobby Richardson was walked intentionally. The one-strike second base. The left-handed Farnow curved out Roger Maris on strikes.

In the Yankee 11th, Lopez survived on second baseman Ken Griffey's error, but the Yankees scored the sacrifice just with their best man at the plate, only to have Howard ground out a double play.

The Twins placed second baseman Bernie Allen on the disabled list for 30 days, cutting the roster one below the American League limit to 27.

Catcher Earl Battey missed the game with a sore arm . . . The Twins said three players from their under-contract roster to reach 40 — infielder Buddy Neenan went to Orlando, infielder Len Boricca to Thomville and infielder Dennis Reese to Wisconsin Rapids. Infielder Jay Ward was traded to Denver for the contract of Twin pitcher Mel Nelson.

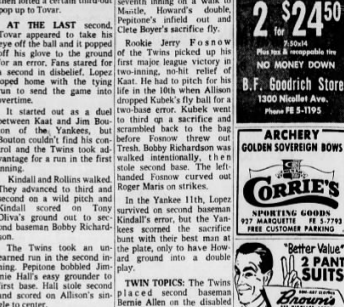
