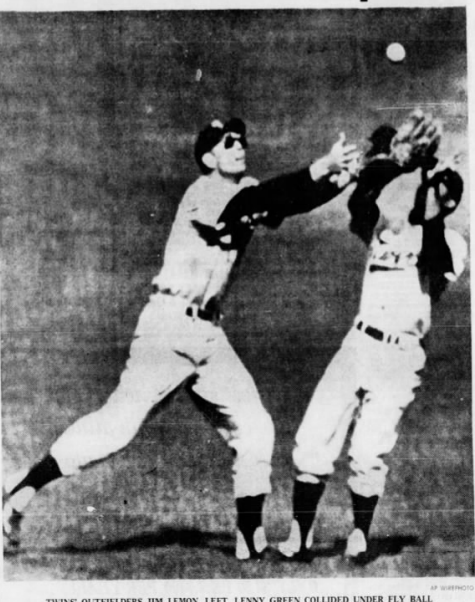

"But someday," she added, "she is going to have to go to school, and if she is in the newspapers all the time that will affect her little classmates and they will treat her differently.
