

# Californian, 18, Blisters Wayzata With Record 74

 The defending champion of the Minnesota Amateur golf tournament last year, California's 18-year-old, four-time San Francisco, Calif. city champion, stepped into the Women's Western Amateur golf tournament picture at Wayzata.

Barbara Fay White was unimpaired on the practice tee after studying for seven weeks on her master's degree when a petite, dark-haired Californian

came in with a course record 74 in yesterday's pre-tournament best ball event.

Jan Ferraris, 18-year-old, bounced Sun Francisco, Calif. city champion, stepped into the Women's Western Amateur golf tournament picture at Wayzata.

She did it with accuracy as "I missed only three greens." Yet the challenge of Wayzata's huge greens was obvious by her round — she took 26 putts.

"I didn't make a putt over three feet all day," she added.

Miss White missed yesterday's best ball event, arriving at Wayzata late because of seven weeks of "I hate to admit it," she said, "but I have not touched a club in seven weeks. I managed to practice some Friday, and some more today. I really can't

say yet how I'm hitting the ball."

Miss White then went out to play a practice round with Paul Shook, another late arrival, and Carol Sorronson.

Miss Sorronson, the British Open champion, shot an 84 yesterday and commented, "I hit the ball all right, but I couldn't score."

Finley, first amateur to win the tournament since Bill Wayman in 1960, had an even-par 35 on the front nine, then blended two birdies and three bogeys to go one-over-par coming in.

Defending champion Corby Dalt finished with 182. Two top-rated amateurs, State Amateur champion Dave Gumbel and Bob Barbarous, had 154s.

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## Tarkenton, Vandy Bemidji Roadblocks to Hopeful Berry

Any rookie attempting to win a spot on the Minnesota Viking roster has a tough job. But consider the obstacles confronting young Bob Berry.

Berry is the first-year quarterback back from Oregon, Norm Brock's former college country, and he is attempting to win a position at which the incumbent are Fran Tarkenton and Ron VanDerKam.

"You'd have to say the odds are against me," Berry admitted as he joined the other incoming rookies Sunday at the Holiday Inn.

"I KNOW what the situation is. When I talked this summer with Van Brock, he said, 'Tarkenton is our No. 1 quarterback and Vandy-Kelen is No. 2. It's up to you to beat them out.'"

Berry, 21, other rookies and 18 veterans leave this morning for Bemidji and the opening of the Vikings' summer training camp. He is happy to have the chance to join the club immediately, instead of spending a month at the College All-Star camp near Chicago, Ill.

"I didn't want to play in the All-Star game," Berry said. "It would just get me behind in the job I'm trying to do here. The All-Stars have four quarterbacks in camp. How much do you suppose three of them are going to play?"

"I was at Buffalo (N.Y.) for the other all-star game last June. Jerry Rhombus started at quarterback for our team. I got in for about six plays. That was enough of all-star games for me."

BERRY is a pleasant, compact man, standing 5-11 and weighing 180 pounds. He looks like a quarterback, and his college record bears out Van Brock's decision to obtain him, along with Ted Mann, in a trade with Philadelphia last year for Chuck Lammon, Terry Koslos, Ray Poyge and Don Hiller.
