Adamowicz Wins Elkhart Lake 500

ELKHART LAKE, Wis.—To crawl out from under the Tony Adamowicz of Wilton, Conn., was the overall winner as far as my hip, but the driver of the Road America 500 Sunday at Elkhart Lake.

He finished fourth in the first heat, second in the second heat and won the third heat. John Carson won the first heat and Joe Eaton the second.

An accident on the first lap of the first heat pinned Jerry Hansen of Idaho in his McLaren-Monaco Formula 1 A car, but he escaped with only minor injuries.

Hansen miraculously left the first lap station with only slight burns on his back and bruises on his legs after the incident, which occurred two-thirds of the way around the 4-mile race course.

Hansen came out of the sweeping "Carroll" turn at Elkhart Lake and went slightly wide, getting a wheel off into the gravel. The car swerved as the tire came back onto the pavement and was bumped by another car in the thick traffic, throwing Hansen's car into a spin.

The light, open-wheeled racer then was hit by three or four other cars, with the last blow coming from Chuck Dietrich's Lola-Chev, which put Hansen's car upside down.

"I got nudged and I got back on the track," Hansen said. "When I spun, there was a lot of dust and I could feel one, two, three bumps, but my head down because I was out of control and then I felt the big hit."

Dietrich, next to last in the pack of 30 cars that started the race, couldn't avoid the "big hit."

"I saw everything and I thought that Hansen was clear," Dietrich said, "but as I went through, his car shot back from one side of the course to the other and my car hit his tire."

Perry, Twins Win Twice from Pilots

SEATTLE, Wash.—Jim Perry pitched 11 scoreless innings Sunday to gain credit for two victories as the Twins defeated Seattle 11-7 in 18 innings in the completion of Saturday night's suspended game and 4-0 in Sunday's regularly scheduled game.

In winning, Perry brought his record to 11-4, best on the Twins' staff as Minnesota heads into the All-Star break with a four game lead over second-place Oakland in the American League West.

Putting off until tomorrow what they should have done with ease yesterday, the Twins Sunday completed the longest game in the team's history, an 18-inning, 11-7 victory over Seattle.

The game took 5 hours and 41 minutes to play, passing by one minute the team's 20-inning marathon against Washington two years ago.

What made yesterday's game different was that it lasted 5 hours and 1 minute Sunday before it was halted after 16 innings by a 1 a.m. curfew. The sun rose in Minneapolis just 2 hours and 41 minutes after play stopped in Seattle.

After 17 innings of play, ranging from shabby to mediocre, the Twins came up with four runs off Pilot rookie John Getnar.

When play was halted at 1:05 a.m. Sunday, Jim Kaat, the fourth Twins pitcher, was facing Marty Pattin, the sixth Seattle pitcher.

Both managers decided to start their announced starters for the series finale when play was resumed yesterday in the suspended game.

Both Getnar and Jim Perry got through the 17th, but the Twins had a decided edge with their left-handed lineup against the right-handed Seattle rookie. Seattle had used all its players except pitchers in the first nine innings.

The Twins winning run scored when Getnar went into his motion and stopped to pick up the fresh bag. The balk scored Perry, who had doubled, from third and advanced two to second.

Perry is now within one victory of his best year with the Twins. In 1969 he had an 18-10 record for Cleveland.

The team now will have three days off before throwing error by Ron Clark provided the Twins with two more runs in the eighth inning.

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LOSES MORE THAN \$11,000

Phillies Reinstate Richie Allen

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. (AP)—Richie Allen of the Philadelphia Phillies was reinstated Sunday after 26 days under indefinite suspension without pay.

The controversial first baseman was reinstated after meeting for more than an hour Sunday morning with Phillies manager Bob Skinner.

Allen was suspended June 24 when he failed to show up for a doubleheader against the New York Mets at Shea Stadium.

Skinner said in a terse statement, "Richie Allen is reinstated as of today. He will not play since he is not in shape to play. It would not be fair to him."

"He is going to throw at home, and Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday he will work out at the ball park."

Skinner, in response to questions, said, "Richie and I forgot the past and are interested only in the future of Allen and the Phillies."

Someone asked Carpenter: "During the 26 days, Allen

missed 29 games, and at his reported \$80,000 a year salary, he lost more than \$11,000 in pay. He earns some \$450 a day."

Skinner also was asked if Allen could get back the money he lost.

"We didn't discuss any of the finances," Skinner said. "Richie understands he was suspended without pay."

The meeting between the hugging infielder and Skinner was set up by Allen's assistant manager, Cliff Capozzoli, and Philly owner Bob Carpenter.

Carpenter was asked if Allen understood he would have to conform to all of the club rules.

"We discussed all phases and I think he'll make every effort," Carpenter said. "I just want him to be one person."

He understood the regulations, he said, but he was not sure he would conform to all of the club rules.

Skinner was asked why he reinstated Allen.

"There's no way you can expect anyone to be a new person," Carpenter replied. "He understands the regulations except for a television interview for which he received \$500."

Allen stayed away so long. "We didn't discuss that," the manager replied. "He wants to play ball, that's why he came back at this time."

Skinner also was asked if there was any mention of a trade for Allen in the future.

"You can't predict the future," Skinner said. "When fall comes around Bob Carpenter, John Quinn, general manager, and I will evaluate the Phillies."

Before jumping the team, Allen had a .318 average in 1968. He had 198 hits and 45 RBIs.

During Allen's suspension, the Phils won 13 and lost 16, including a nine-game winning streak, and a seven-game losing streak.

Allen has been at his Philadelphia home during most of the suspension. He has related to talk with newsmen except for a television interview for which he received \$500.

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Hill Captures Philly Playoff

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. (AP)—Dave Hill remained in an 11-foot hole put on the first extra hole Sunday and beat Tommy Jacobs, Gay Brewer and R. H. Sikes in a playoff for the \$50,000 first prize in the Philadelphia Golf Classic.

Hill, the first triple winner of the year, had to salvage a scrambling par on the last regulation hole for a three-under-par 69 that tied him with the other three at 279 after 72 holes.

Sikes shot a final 67, former Masters champion Brewer a 69 and Jacobs, the three-round leader, a par 72 on a 6,570-yard Whitmarsh Country Club course.

It was the third victory in his last four starts for the chain-smoking Hill and vaulted him into first place on the money winning list at slightly over \$120,000. He previously won the Memphis and Buick titles.

Sikes left a 20-foot putt one inch short on the playoff hole and tapped in for his par. Hill carefully lined up his birdie attempt.

He paired badly and a knocked it into the center of the cup.

Brewer, only man left with

a chance to tie, missed a 10-footer and Hill had it won.

Frank Beard, winner of last week's Minnesota Classic, was alone in the fifth place with a 68 for 280.

He was followed by a group of five at 281, Australian Bruce Devlin, who had the day's best round, a 66; Mac MacLendon, with a 68; Lou Graham, 70; Deane Brennan, 70; and Grier Jones, 74.

Arnold Palmer failed to master a charge and finished with a 71 for 286, well back and tied with Bill Casper, who closed with a 69 for 287.

Hill, three strokes off the pace going into the final round, was paired with the veteran Jacobs in the last two games to get away in the cool, cloudy weather.
