

John Tauer Fires 71, Leads State Amateur Golf Field

Left-handed John Tauer, 22-year-old St. Paulian, a college graduate who plays out of Highland, took the front-end lead in the 36-hole qualifying of the State Amateur Golf tournament Monday at Somerset with a 20-36-71.

Tauer was the only golfer in the starting field of 130 to match Somerset's par, and he needed a 10-foot birdie putt on the 18th hole to do it.

One stand-back, with a 30-36-72, was for Frank Bandonick of North Oaks, a former Wayzata member. Bandonick, 23, wore Dean Gaudin of University, Carl Falvo and Doug Green of Glenview, Tom Sempur of Twins and Country, Tom Garrett of Somerset and Gene Christensen of Haslam.

Tauer, a smooth-swinger with an excellent short game, became the first left-hander to lead a round in the Amateur since Spivey.

Old Joe Adcock Is Example of Hustle

I MAY STRIKE YOU AS ODD THAT ONE REMAINS so much wistful this one memory of the sad series between Los Angeles and the Minnesota Twins, swept by the Angels.

It is the picture of Joe Adcock, the Angels' first baseman, running out a simple ground ball.

The clinical report on Garry Roggenburk's tender left arm now reads like this Monday night:

Sore, but no serious damage. Roggenburk is encouraged.

The Twins' left-handed pitcher was removed in the fifth inning of the 127-benefit game victory over Milwaukee.

"The elbow was a little sore before the game started," Roggenburk said. "I stayed that way through the first four innings, then hurt more in the fifth."

But I think it's coming around. Certainly it felt better in my right hand last Monday when I pitched at Winnipeg."

Manager Sam Mele had hoped Roggenburk could work six or seven innings, but he was also relieved that no serious damage resulted.

"I liked the relief pitching of (Jim) Roland," Mele said. "He looked better to me than he has in a long time."

Roland felt it was his best pitching in at least two months. Tonight I was getting the ball over, which was the last move in the fifth."
