Boswell: Trying to Make Me a Bad Wolf

"You wouldn't believe how horrible he looks," said Dave Boswell's mother by telephone from Baltimore.

At first she refused to call the Minnesota Twin pitcher, who was involved in a fight with manager Billy Martin and outfielder Bob Allison in Detroit last Wednesday night, to come to the plane.

"It all started when pitching coach Art Fowler called one name I didn't like in the clubhouse Wednesday afternoon," said Boswell, who was signed by the Twins for a big bonus contract in 1964.

"Early when the other pitching coach along with Fowler asked me before the game, and after Fowler had come out, whether I was going to run.

"I had run—maybe not the 15 sprints I was asked to run. I do a lot different things to keep in condition. I

run ground balls, cover bases, take throws at first base from the infielders. I'm all over the field.

"I was on the bus in Detroit when Martin walked in. Martin said he wanted to talk to me tomorrow (Thursday) and I went with Fowler. I was mad because I didn't want this truck in my crew before I went to sleep. I wanted to get it settled then.

"I said hello to Billy when he walked onto the plane. His answer was 'What is all this crap about you not running like the rest of the pitchers?'

"I didn't think that that was the time or place to bring the subject up. I had a blister on my finger and wasn't able to pitch.

"I don't ever remember disagreeing to get Fowler. I did think they were making a big thing out of nothing. I did open my mouth a little loud to my manager and his partner (Allison).

"So I got up and went to the other end of the bar,

hoping that I'd be alone.

"When I decided to leave, Allison did try to calm me down—the way he had tried to for the past four years.

"We were outside, Allison said to me, 'If you are going to be tough about this why don't you hit me. I was in a bad mood so I did hit him.

"Allison didn't have his hands in his pocket as he was quoted in Baltimore. I admit I hit him first.

"After I hit Allison, I wasn't going to let him up. He's not fair for me to handle so I did everything I could to keep him down.

"That's what you have to do when you are a one-handed fighter. I have one hand that I can fight with. On my other hand, I have a finger that sticks straight up in the air. What can I do with that?

"The next thing I remembered there were three or



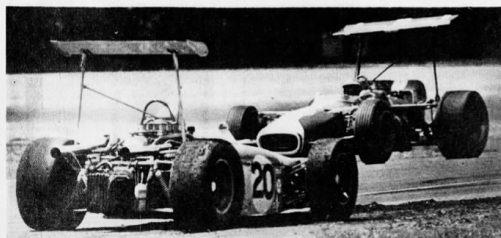

ADAMOWICZ CHARGE FAILS Hobbs Wins at Donnybrooke

BRainerd, Minn.—Qualifying for the \$100,000 prize money, David Hobbs' weekend, led by Adamowicz, won the first heat, and beat the second heat, and then held the lead from the pole to the first run on the 1/2 mile straightaway.

It deprived Orioles left-hander Mike Cuellar of a hitless game toward which tension had been building in the 19-61 crowd while the Minnesota Twins were going down one by one before Cuellar's blazing fast ball.

Cuellar needed a one-hit performance to finish ahead of the Twins' Jim Perry, who pitched a sound four-inning game in the fourth round of the American League All-Star game Sunday.

He was helped by some a pitcher's defensive play. Center fielder Paul Blair went to the deepest part of the field to catch a looping catch on Rich Reese's drive in the fourth. Third baseman Brooks Robinson was the only third baseman in the league capable of cutting off pinch-runner Frank Quisenberry's drive in the eighth.

A 6-4 shortstop, Belanger needed a tremendous leap to head down Harmon Killebrew's blast in the ninth.

Kapp's injured knee to get tests today

The status of Viking quarterback Joe Kapp's injured knee remained uncertain Sunday, at least until further tests could be made this morning.

Kapp's right knee cramped under him when he set up to pass in the second quarter of the Vikings' 26-6 victory over Denver Saturday night in Metropolitan Stadium.

The injury was called a strained knee at that point and probably will be called that until the tests are completed.

The doctor said there didn't seem to be too much swelling. "ough Bill Grant said. "The knee was stiff and sore, but we won't know for sure until all the tests are done."

Kapp, center Mike Thigbort and reserve running back Earl Denny did not return the squad in Mankato last night.
