Bishop Shannon Excommunicated By His Marriage

Roman Catholic Bishop James P. Shannon automatically incurred excommunication when he married last week, according to officials within the church.

It was disclosed Saturday that Bishop Shannon, 68, secretary bishop of St. Paul, married Betty Whitson, 38, a divorcee from suburban Rochester, N.Y., in a ceremony performed in Endicott, N.Y., Aug. 2, by the Rev. H. Hugh Kelly, a Discalced Carmelite priest.

Bishop Shannon tendered his resignation from his position as bishop last winter but it had never been officially accepted.

The Most Rev. Leonard P. Cook, auxiliary bishop of St. Paul, said that Bishop Shannon is a divorced man and that he now becomes ineligible to administer or receive the sacraments of the Catholic church locally.

BISHOP COVLEY said, however, that because Bishop Shannon has been officially declared a layman, his bishop's sacraments administered by him could not be called invalid.

Bishop Covley indicated that Bishop Shannon incurred the excommunication upon himself by going to a ceremony in New York.

The New York Times reported Bishop Shannon and four other persons, including the Catholic Church, filed suit in federal court in New York City to annul the marriage. Bishop Shannon is 68 years old and has worked in the steel industry for 23 years.

It is not likely that Bishop Shannon will be able to receive the sacraments of the Catholic church until he is declared a layman.

NEW YORK, N.Y. — A federal appeals court has ordered the trial of a suit to test the constitutionality of a House Internal Security Committee, formerly known as the House Un-American Activities Committee (HUAC).

The ruling, by a unanimous three-judge panel of the United States Court of Appeals in Chicago, will appear to give the effect of placing on trial the constitutionality of the committee's authority to investigate alleged subversion.

"What that means," said the court, "is that the committee is subject to the same constitutional limitations and the rights of citizens."
