"You can't expect a quarterback to pick up a system that fast. It takes time and Joe is making good progress."

### Soyers Problem:

Gale Soyers, who carried the ball 13 times for 73 yards, and one touchdown Sunday, claims that every team in the NFL, including the Vikings, is setting up its defense so the former Kansas great can't run.

"Everybody is playing their tackles wide and I have to move up the middle," said Soyers. "Our offensive line has been rattled with injuries so that has hurt some. But we'll be all right."

### Joltings:

### Gabriel, Rams Slam Cowboys

DALLAS, Tex. — (AP)—Roman Gabriel ran for two touchdowns. Dick Bass for one and a touchdown defense accounted for two more Sunday as the Los Angeles Rams routed to a 25-13 victory over the Dallas Cowboys.

### Cards Rally to Overtake Lions 38-28

ST. LOUIS, Mo. — (AP)—Jim Hart passed for two touchdowns as he led St. Louis from a 14-point deficit to a surprising 38-28 victory over the Detroit Lions as the Lions lost their first game of the National Football League season.

Hart completed 19 of 27 passes for 313 yards.

Detroit's Mike Pugh hit 17 of 26 passes for 266 yards.

The routing of Johnny Roland complicated Hart's routing. Roland scored three times, twice from the one, once from a 19-yard run.

The victory gives St. Louis, Detroit's 1-2-1 in the Western Conference's Central Division.

Both teams used deflected passes to score touchdowns. Detroit's second score came when Hart, passing over his left hand, hit the deflected pass to the running back, Larry Brown, who was a free end in the Browns' backfield. Brown was the only player to be deflected.

The St. Louis go-ahead touchdown came when Hart was deflected to Smith on a 37-yard pass.

Jim Bakken's second-quarter field goal put St. Louis in a 30-yard hole, and an NFL record field goal by Cleveland's Ed McCaffery kept the Browns in the game.

McCaffery's 54-yard field goal was the longest in NFL history.
