C. Peter Magrath had been hired as the new president, and before he took office, he said he wanted the University of Minnesota to become another Harvard in five or 10 years. On second thought, he wanted Harvard in 10 years to mean to become another Minnesota.

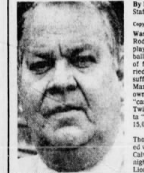
