## LCS AND WORLD SERIES CREDENTIAL APPLICATIONS AVAILABLE NOW

The media credential application for the 2018 World Series presented by YouTube TV and 2018 League Championship Series is now available on https://credentials.mlb.com.

This online form is the only acceptable application for 2018 LCS and World Series Media Credentials as no other application or request will be processed. Applications must be completed by the Sports Editor or Sports Director and received by Major League Baseball no later than Thursday, October $4^{\text {th }}$. All applications must include a 1" x 1" hi-resolution photo (JPEG format) and valid e-mail address for each applicant. A coverage grid must also be completed within the application for each applicant to indicate which games they plan to attend. The system will not accept any applications that are missing a photo, e-mail address or a grid for any applicant.

Media members who have used the MLB Club Credentialing system to apply for a jewel event or regular season games in the past have access to the application by signing in with your e-mail address. If you have forgotten your password, you can obtain a new one by clicking the "Reset Password" option on the MLB Credentialing System homepage.

## HI-STORY

In last night's game against the San Francisco Giants at Coors Field, AllStar shortstop Trevor Story of the Colorado Rockies batted a perfect 3-for-3 with three solo home runs to lead Colorado to a 5-3 victory. The outing was the $17^{\text {th }}$ three-homer game in franchise history, and the first since Trevor's All-Star teammate Nolan Arenado last season on July $19^{\text {th }}$. Additionally, the right-handed-slugger became just the $16^{\text {th }}$ shortstop to accomplish the feat, and the first since All-Star Corey Seager of the Los Angeles Dodgers (June 20, 2017).

On the season, the NL MVP candidate is slashing .298/.354/.566 with 77 runs, 39 doubles, five triples, 31 home runs, 95 RBI and 25 stolen bases
 over 138 games played. The 25 -year-old Story is just the fifth shortstop in Major League history to record at least 30 home runs and 25 stolen bases in a single season, joining Hanley Ramirez, Jimmy Rollins, Alex Rodriguez and Hall of Famer Barry Larkin. AL All-Star and MVP candidate Francisco Lindor is close to joining this prestigous list with 31 round-trippers and 22 stolen bases thus far in 2018. Should he reach the 25 -stolen base mark, this would mark the first time in MLB history that two shortstops accomplished the feat in the same season.

## BETANCES STILL STREAKING

On Tuesday against the Oakland Athletics, relief pitcher Dellin Betances of the New York Yankees tallied a strikeout in his $37^{\text {th }}$ consecutive appearance dating back to May $29^{\text {th }}$. Since then, the four-time All-Star has compiled a 3-2 record with two saves, 63 strikeouts, 14 walks, 15 hits and a 1.26 ERA across 35.2 innings pitched. Now with 101 punchouts on the season, the 30-year-old is the first pitcher in MLB history to register at least 100 strikeouts as a reliever in five consecutive seasons.

The streak is currently tied for the third-longest among Major League relievers in a single season since at least 1908. Milwaukee Brewers reliever Corey Knebel holds the MLB record, posting a strikeout in 45 consecutive games during his 2017 All-Star campaign. Earlier this month, Dellin established a new AL record, eclipsing the previous mark of 32
 games set by Kansas City's Jeff Montgomery in 1989. The table below depicts relievers who have tallied at least one punchout in 34-or-more outings.

# They Said It, and How! <br> (by MLB Official Historian John Thorn) 

## My Favorite Century; More

Yesterday on Twitter there arose a discussion of the Washington Nationals' 19-year-old star Juan Soto, who in his lone season had just broken Mel Ott's mark for bases on balls by a teenager. Ott had taken three years to accumulate his esoteric standard. A fellow tweep remarked that Ott and Soto both fell short of a batter's-walk record established by kid pitcher Willie McGill in 1890-1893, who went to his grave not knowing he had established a watermark for generations to come.

I bring this up because it brings home for me a baseball truism, evident in no ther sport and possibly no other human activity, in which the past is ever present. Below, some more voices from long ago, echoing across the canyons, and not always sweetly.

WEE WILLIE KEELER (right), explaining the essence of his batting success: "Hit'em where they ain't."

TIM HURST, to a fellow umpire complaining how thankless is the job: "You can't beat them hours."

ENCYCLOPEDIA BRITTANICA:"Base ball is a quicker and more lively pastime than the great English national game of cricket, which is the chief thing to be said in its favour."


Cricket in 1744

HENRY CHADWICK in 1876: "What Cricket is to an Englishman, Base-Ball has become to an American. ... On the Cricket-field—and there only-the Peer and the Peasant meet on equal terms; the possession of courage, nerve, judgment, skill, endurance and activity alone giving the palm of superiority. In fact, a more democratic institution does not exist in Europe than this self-same Cricket; and as regards its popularity, the records of the thousands of Commoners, Divines and Lawyers, Legislators and Artisans, and Literateurs as well as Mechanics and Laborers, show how great a hold it has on the people. If this is the characteristic of Cricket in aristocratic and monarchical England, how much more will the same characteristics mark Base-Ball in democratic and republican America."

LEWIS MEACHAM on Chadwick, after the announcement of a new National League in 1876, formed without consulting him: There is nowhere in the world so sad a spectacle as a cynical carping old man who has outgrown his usefulness, and who being left far behind in the progress of events, vainly attempts to hold back the world to his place, and grumbles because his little say-so is not taken as law. This becomes sadder than ever when the useless old man finds himself placed in a position where he should be an authority, but in which he cannot even maintain the appearance of respectable mediocrity. Such a man is Henry Chadwick, of The Clipper, who though not old in years, has had experience enough to have made himself a man of respect had heaven but given him a head. For some years The Clipper was recognized as an authority in base ball, and at last Chadwick made the fatal error of confounding cause and effect, and so came to believe that he made base ball, instead of contenting himself with the truth, that base ball made him. Full of this mania, he proceeded to call himself the "Father of the Game," and to assume much on the strength of the title. But he found an unruly child, and one which disinherited its papa with rapidity and ease...."

ERNEST L. THAYER: "Oh! somewhere in this favored land the sun is shining bright; / The band is playing somewhere, and somewhere hearts are light. / And somewhere men are laughing, and somewhere children shout; / But there is no joy in Mudville—mighty Casey has struck out."

JOHN M. WARD: "There is now no escape for the player. If he attempts to elude the operation of the rule, he becomes at once a professional outlaw, and the hand of every club is against him. He may be willing to play elsewhere for less salary, he may be unable to play, or, for other reasons, may retire for a season or more, but if ever he reappears as a professional ballplayer it must be at the disposition of his former club. Like a fugitive-slave law, the reserve-rule denies him a harbor or a livelihood, and carries him back, bound and shackled, to the club from which he attempted to escape. We have, then, the curious result of a contract which on its face is for seven months being binding for life, and when the player's name is once attached thereto his professional liberty is gone forever."

## LINE DRIVES (Compiled from Club Game Notes)

140 DOWN: The Boston Red Sox are one of 20 teams since 1900 to win at least 96 of their first 140 games. The Sox' 96 wins were tied for their second-most ever through 140 games ( 97 in 1912; 96 in 1946). In Yesterday afternoon's thrilling game against the Atlanta Braves, a go-ahead home run by Brandon Phillips propelled Boston to its $97^{\text {th }}$ win of the season. Phillips became the first player in franchise history to club a go-ahead homer in the ninth inning-or-later in his first game with the team.

CATCH \& HIT: Miami Marlins All-Star catcher J.T. Realmuto hit his $19^{\text {th }}$ and $20^{\text {th }}$ home runs of the season on Tuesday night, extending his single-season career high. His 17 home runs as a catcher rank second-most by a Marlins backstop in Club history, two behind Charles Johnson's 19 in 1997. His 59 RBI when behind the plate are the fourth-most in a single season in Marlins history, behind Hall of Famer Iván Rodríguez (82 in 2003) and Johnson (69 in 2001 and 63 in 1997).

McKINNEY GET ON BASE AGAIN?: Last night against the Tampa Bay Rays, outfielder Billy McKinney blasted his fourth home run of the season, while extending his on-base streak to 14 games. The streak is the fifthlongest to start a career with the Blue Jays in Club history, trailing Dave Martinez (24), Roy Howell (18), David Segui (15) and Shea Hillenbrand (15).

HOME RUNS: Atlanta Braves backstop Kurt Suzuki hit his $10^{\text {th }}$ home run of the season on Tuesday, driving a 2-2, second-inning pitch from Rick Porcello over the wall in center field. Suzuki reached double-digit home runs for the second consecutive season, and for the fifth time in his career on the same day he was named the Club's nominee for the Roberto Clemente Award.

POWER AND SPEED: With 18 home runs and 25 stolen bases thus far, White Sox infielder Tim Anderson is one of five players in the Majors with at least those totals, joining Boston's Mookie Betts, Pittsburgh's Starling Marte, Cleveland's José Ramírez and Colorado's Trevor Story. Anderson is attempting to become the first White Sox shortstop to record a 20/20 season, and could join Alex Ríos (2010) and Tommie Agee (1966) as the only players in franchise history to post 20 homers and 30 steals in one season.

ALL OR NOTHING: Tuesday night was the seventh time in franchise history that the Cardinals hit at least five home runs in a game without hitting a double or triple (6-1 record). The club also achieved the same feat this season on May $11^{\text {th }}$ at San Diego (5 HR).

HARDWARE: According to the Elias Sports Bureau, the Colorado Rockies are the first team in MLB history to use four different players at any point in the season who had previously won a batting title for that franchise. Charlie Blackmon (2017), DJ LeMahieu (2016), Carlos Gonzalez (2010) and Matt Holliday (2007) have each won batting titles with the Rockies.

SEVY LIFTING: Following his outing last night against the Oakland Athletics, All-Star Luis Severino has posted his second career 200-strikeout season (also 230 in 2017). Severino is just the third Yankees pitcher to record multiple seasons with at least 200 strikeouts (also: David Cone, 1997-98 and Ron Guidry, 1978-79).

OUR BÁE: Chicago Cubs All-Star infielder Javier Báez reached 30 homers and 100 RBI with a solo home run on Sunday to become just the fifth Cub to record a 30 -homer, 100-RBI campaign before or in their age- 25 season, joining Hall of Famers Ernie Banks (1955) and Ron Santo (1964, 1965), as well as Kris Bryant (2016) and Anthony Rizzo (2015).

MAH-TOOK HIM DEEP: Detroit Tigers outfielder Mikie Mahtook went 1-for-4 with a solo homer in last night's game. After not homering in his first 33 games (122 PA) this season, Mahtook has hit seven home runs in his last 17 games ( 71 PA ). Over his last 12 games, Mahtook is batting $.341 / .426 / .707$ with five home runs and eight RBI.

UNO, DOS, ADIOS!: First baseman Jesús Aguilar of the Milwaukee Brewers has a Major League-best, and franchise-record, 61 RBI in two-strike counts this season, which is tied for fifth-most in a single season since 1988 when such data became available. Both of his most recent RBI on Tuesday night came with two strikes.

EXTRA-BASE MAUER: Six-time All-Star Joe Mauer enters play today with 596 extra-base hits in his career, and needs one to tie Tony Oliva for fourth-most in Twins history (since 1961). Hall of Famers Harmon Killebrew (728) and Kirby Puckett (678), as well as Kent Hrbek (623) rank in the top three, respectively.

A SHOT OF JAMESON: Pittsburgh Pirates starting pitcher Jameson Taillon has allowed three earned runs-or- less in each of his last 18 starts. He is one of just three pitchers in the Majors this season to make at least 18 straight starts while allowing three earned runs-or-less, joining Jacob deGrom of the New York Mets (25) and Tampa Bay's Ryne Stanek (22). The last Bucco hurler to be charged with three earned runs-or-fewer in 18 straight starts in the same season was Jeff Karstens in 2011.

THE WILL TO WIN: On Tuesday night, Tampa Bay Rays pitcher Hunter Wood recorded his first career win, and became the $23^{\text {rd }}$ different Rays pitcher to collect a win this season, extending the club record. The 23 different pitchers represent the highest total in the Majors this season.

POWER SURGE: San Francisco Giants outfielder Gorkys Hernandez hit his $15^{\text {th }}$ home run of the season on Tuesday night, tied with Evan Longoria for the most on the Club. Last season, Hernandez did not record a home run in 348 plate appearances. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, the last MLB player to have 15-ormore round-trippers in a season after hitting 0 with 300 -or-more plate appearances in the year before was Phil Bradley, who hit 26 homers in 1985 after not hitting any in 373 PA in 1984.

EXTRA! EXTRA!: Houston Astros All-Star third baseman Alex Bregman has hit 47 doubles and 29 homers this season, both career highs. He is just the third player in Astros history to reach those totals in the same season, joining Lance Berkman $(2008,2001)$ and Hall of Famer Jeff Bagwell (1996). Additionally, Bregman's 77 extra-base hits this season are the most by an Astro since Berkman logged 79 extra-base hits ( 46 doubles, 4 triples, 29 homers) in 2008.
