Goltz to sign 6-year pact with Dodgers



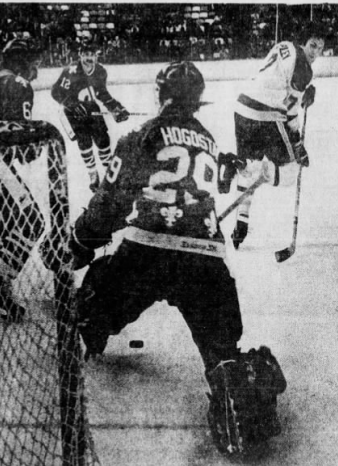

Former Twins pitcher Dave Goltz will fly to Los Angeles today to sign a six-year contract with the Dodgers.

They didn't want Goltz to have regular work in San Diego and they wanted the prospect of signing him over the angle of the road."
"Peer O'Malley (Dodgers president) told me that I outstayed him when I brought Goltz out to meet with him last week. O'Malley said he was so impressed with Goltz that he would send and spend more money than he expected to get him."
