WASHINGTON, D.C. — The Justice Department today filed a suit in federal court in Atlanta to halt school segregation in Georgia.

The suit, filed in the U.S. District Court in Atlanta, seeks to halt the state's desegregation plan, which the Justice Department says is "inadequate and discriminatory."

The suit also seeks to halt the state's plan to close two public schools in order to desegregate the system.

The Justice Department's suit is the latest in a series of actions taken by the federal government to combat school segregation in the South.
