

## Step by Step, Here's How We Entered Big Leagues

Oct. 26, 1960, will be a day long remembered in the history of sports in Minneapolis, St. Paul and the Upper Midwest.

At approximately 3 p.m. that day in the Savoy Hilton hotel in New York, President Joe Cronin of the American league made this momentous announcement:

"The American league today has granted permission to Calvin Griffith to move his Washington baseball franchise to the Twin Cities of Minneapolis and St. Paul for the 1961 playing season."

THAT DECISION ended a seven year drive by civic, business and sports leaders of this area to get major league baseball.

Through that period, the old St. Louis Browns, the old Philadelphia Athletics, New York Giants, Cleveland Indians and the Washington Senators appeared within the grasp of this area.

One by one these teams went elsewhere until last October, when Calvin Griffith ended three years of negotiations with Minneapolis and St. Paul interests by agreeing to make the move.

Did the Twin Cities have a real good chance to get any of the other teams mentioned above?

Let's take them one by one. Bill Veeck and the St. Louis Browns were only lukewarm about this territory. When Baltimore agreed to buy the franchise at \$2,600,000 and had a stadium ready, it went big league. That was in 1953.

IN 1954 Twin Cities people were offered the Philadelphia Athletics franchise for \$3,500,000. This was turned down because a campaign was on then to raise \$4,500,000 to build Metropolitan stadium.

"We have all we can do to complete such a drive without involving this area in another out-

lay of more than \$3,000,000 in the purchase of a baseball franchise," was the unanimous sentiment of business and civic leaders.

Before the Bloomington facilities were built, Horace Stoneham of the New York Giants indirectly hinted that he might move his club some day. He was partial to the Twin Cities if they had adequate facilities.

Negotiations continued for the Giants. But in 1957, San Francisco joined Los Angeles in an all-out bid to get the

New York and Brooklyn franchises. San Francisco's "give-away" offer on cheap rent, a new stadium and other concessions won out over Minneapolis and St. Paul.

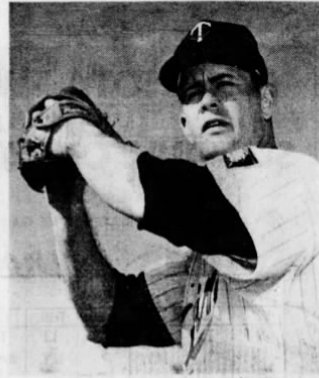
HOPES FOR a major league club sagged badly with this turn in events. However, when the Boston Red Sox took over the Minneapolis ball club of the American Association in 1958, the outlook brightened. The Red Sox hinted that they were making this move to protect the territory for the American league.

In July 1958 Griffith was on the verge of asking permission to move here for the 1959 season. He changed his mind. Again late in the 1959 season Griffith indicated he was ready. He withdrew again.

In the meantime, Cleveland had shown some interest in this territory. At one stage negotiations became rather serious, but legal entanglements in the Ohio city contract stymied this project.

THROUGHOUT 1960 Griffith continued correspondence with Minneapolis and St. Paul leaders about an eventual move. He wasn't taken too seriously in most quarters until the night of last April 25 in New York.

That was the first time he indicated that he would take

the bull by the horns the next day at the special meeting of the American league. Long into the night he dickered with Gerald Moore, chairman of the metropolitan sports area commission and E. W. Boyer, vice chairman.

Griffith stated his definite terms for transfer of his franchise. He demanded an answer from the Twin Cities groups by 9 a.m. Oct. 26, one hour before the American league was to meet.

Through the wee sma'ill

hours of the morning, Moore and Boyer discussed Griffith's offer with Gordon Ritz, Wheelock Whitney, Jr. (original backers of the Continental league) and this writer.

About 3 a.m. there was a meeting of the minds. Moore was instructed to phone Griffith.

Twelve hours later—3 p.m. Oct. 26—Minneapolis and St. Paul had a franchise in the American league.

## Minneapolis Has Been Big League Before — Briefly

Old timers remind us that Minneapolis has been in the big leagues before.

It is true that Minneapolis was included in the charter membership of the American league in 1900. It was dropped, however, at the end of the season and became part of the newly formed American association in 1902. St. Paul, too, has vague claim to prior major league status. In 1884 it was a charter member of the Union association, one of three leagues that claimed major league status. There was some slight validity to this claim since the three leagues pirated players from one another and each had its share of outstanding men. However, the Union association dissolved after one season.

**MINNEAPOLIS** and St. Paul played in the Western league, excepting the one year Minneapolis had been in the American league, prior to the organization of the American association in 1902.

Up to 1896 Minneapolis' games had been played in a ball park back of the West hotel, which then stood on the southwest corner of Fifth St. and Hennepin Av. In 1896 Nicollet park was

opened and used during the week. Residents in the neighborhood complained about the noise and a city ordinance compelled the Millers to play their Sunday games in Minnehaha park.

**LATER** Sunday games were permitted in Nicollet park and the Millers stayed there until they moved to Metropolitan stadium.

In the early days of the American association, W. H. Watkins owned both the Indianapolis and Minneapolis franchises. This unusual arrangement drew criticism and Watkins finally sold the club to Gus Koch of Milwaukee. A few months later Koch sold to Mike Cantillon, who brought his famous brother, Joe (Pongo) Cantillon, here as manager.

Ownership then passed to a syndicate of local businessmen, then to Mike Kelley in 1923, from Kelley to the New York Giants in 1946, and from the Giants to the Boston Red Sox in 1957.

**PERHAPS** the most exciting and popular period in Minneapolis baseball was when Kelley, as manager of St. Paul, matched wits with Pongo Cantillon, manager of Minneapolis. They were close friends but their battles on the diamond carried Twin

Cities rivalry to a peak of intensity.

In the 59 years of intercity play in the American association, St. Paul won 675 games, Minneapolis 633.

Minneapolis and St. Paul each won nine association pennants. Next, with eight each, came Milwaukee and Louisville.

Minneapolis stands first and St. Paul second in percentage of games won through the 59 years of league play.

## Twins Own 175 Farm Club Players

The Twins own 175 farm club players, valued at one million dollars.

Sherry Robertson, brother-in-law of president Calvin Griffith, serves as farm director of the Minnesota Twins.

A former major league baseball player with Washington, Sherry directs 28 full-time scouts, plus 48 who scout on a part-time basis.

**THE ONLY** club owned outright by the Twins is Charlotte, N.C., of the class A Sally league. Phil Houser is the general manager and Ellis Clary the manager.

The Twins still own Chattanooga stadium, which is managed by Joe Engel.

Assistant farm director under Robertson is George Brophy, former Miller general manager. Farm headquarters for all minor league clubs in spring training is Fernandina Beach, Fla., with Bob Tarleton, former St. Paul general manager, serving as camp director.

Working agreement clubs with the Twins are Syracuse, N.Y., in the Triple-A International league with Gene Verble as manager; Wilson of the class B Carolina league with Jack McKeon as manager; Fort Walton Beach of the D Alabama-Florida league with Vern Morgan as manager; Erie of the class D New York-Penn league with Harry Warner as manager, and Wytchville of the class D Ap-

palachian league with Red Norwood as manager.

**NASHVILLE**, Tenn., of the Southern association is a part-time farm.

Robertson says, "We sign 100 ball players a year. A good ratio for making the majors is one out of every 230 players."

## Early Wynn, 41, Is Oldest Active Player in League

The oldest active veteran in the American league is Early (Gus) Wynn, whose 13 wins for the Chicago White Sox last year marked his lowest victory total since 1949 with Cleveland. Gus turned 41 Jan. 6.

Stan Musial of the St. Louis Cardinals is the oldest active National leaguer. He will be 41 Nov. 21.

Elmer Valo, pinch hitter, is 40 and Warren Spahn, Milwaukee's great southpaw pitcher, will turn 40 this month.

Crowding 39 are Minnie Mierson and Jim Rivera of the White Sox, Hank Bauer of Kansas City and Gene Woodling of the new Washington Senators. Pitcher Hoyt Wilhelm of Baltimore turns 38 July 26.

## Cookie's Record Gets Better Every Year

Harry A. (Cookie) Lavagetto, Minnesota Twins manager, has improved his record every year in the American league.

The Twins finished last in 1957, 1958 and 1959 under Lavagetto, but moved from 31 victories to 61 and finally to 63 in 1959. Then, in 1960, Lavagetto's Washington Senators jumped to fifth place with a 73-81 record.

"THEY SAID we were a surprise in 1960," said Lavagetto, "but we could surprise even more in 1961. New fan interest in the Upper Midwest could spark our boys;

all players like to work in front of a crowd.

"We can play 500 ball right now, and might surprise with a little more pitching and if the kid Zorro Versailles comes through at shortstop. We're only a couple of years away from challenging for the pennant."

Lavagetto, 46, started at Oakland in the Coast league in 1933. He was an infielder, the third baseman who gained fame at Brooklyn in 1947 for breaking off Yankee Bill Bevens' no-hitter as a pinch-hitter with two out in the ninth in the fourth game of the World Series.

**COOKIE COACHED** under Charlie Dressen at Brooklyn in 1951, went to Oakland with Dressen in 1954 and then to Washington with Dressen in 1955. When Dressen was ousted May 7, 1957, Lavagetto took the Senators' helm at the behest of Dressen.

"I wanted to manage from the start of my baseball career," said Lavagetto, "and I started asking a lot of questions of all the stars at various positions.

"Biggest element in managing is handling men and handling the pitching staff," said Cookie.

On the Twins' coaching staff are third base coach Sam Mele, former Boston and Washington outfielder; Clyde McCullough, first base

coach and former major league catcher, and Ed Lopat, who will be serving his first term as Twins' pitching coach. He managed previously at Richmond in the International league and coached last year with the Yankees.

## Senator Heads Vow 'New Era' in Washington

WASHINGTON—President Pete Quesada and General Manager Ed Doherty of the Washington Senators promise "new era" in Washington baseball.

"With the passing of the Calvin Griffith Senators to Minneapolis and St. Paul," said Doherty, "we intend to start fresh in Washington."

"We'll have uniformed attendants opening car doors at Griffith stadium, uniformed ushers and ticket takers, and the best in concessions."

"THERE IS tremendous enthusiasm in Washington for our new Senators and the fans will retain that enthusiasm as long as we show them we are trying."

Washington fans lost faith in the Griffiths from the time in 1958 that Calvin Griffith first announced intentions of moving to the Twin Cities.

"The Senators stand ready to trade and to improve," Doherty added.

OPENING DAY is already sold out to capacity—27,419. "If we had 100,000 for opening day, we'd sell out," continued Doherty. "We think a draw of 800,000 for the season would be excellent."

While leasing Griffith stadium, the new Senators look forward to the day next sea-

son when the new stadium will be available, with seating for 42,500 and parking for 12,500 cars.

THE SENATORS are already building a farm system under Hal Keller, new farm director, Pensacola in the class D Alabama-Florida league has already been added on a working agreement farm basis. Two teams are planned in the Rookie leagues for high school and bonus kids.

"The personnel is new to all of us," said Manager Mickey Vernon, "but we won't be an American league patsy even in our first year."

The always-optimistic Doherty added, "We hope to do better than many fans anticipate."

## '60 Orioles Led in Pinch Hitting

Baltimore topped the American league with a 261 pinch-hitting percentage in 1960. Washington, now the Twins, ranked third at 238.

Cleveland was last with a 198 average from pinch-hitters. Manager Cookie Lavagetto of the Twins used a record 309 pinch-hitters, and Elmer Valo appeared a record 81 times.

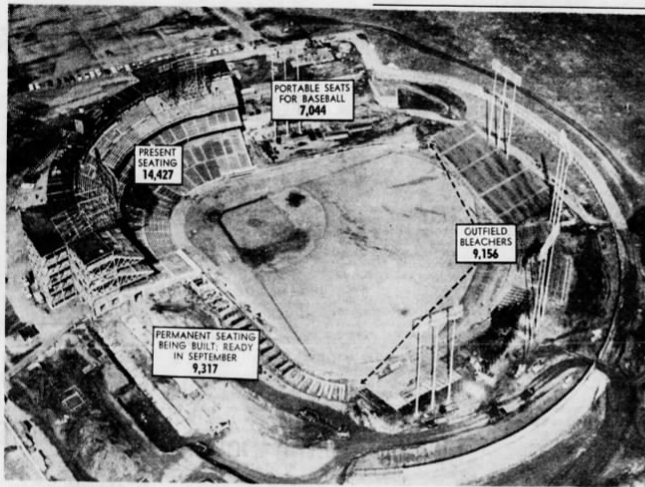

# Road to Big Leagues Was Long and Steep

When more than 30,000 baseball fans from all over the Upper Midwest move into Metropolitan stadium Friday to see the first major league game played there, only a few will recall the trials and tribulations of many years to get the job done.

It's putting it mildly to say that many roadblocks had to be overcome since 1954 to give this area the facilities that could house the best in this sport.

**METROPOLITAN** stadium will not be a finished construction when the Minnesota Twins face the Washington Senators in the 1961 opener Friday at 1:30 p.m.

While the fans are flocking into the arena, workmen will be busy completing the final leg of the construction program.

They will be working until sometime in September on the new and permanent stands on the first base side of the diamond. This will be a two-deck concrete setup that will add approximately 10,000 seats to the plant.

Opening day spectators will use almost 16,000 seats in the original permanent stands and 14,000 more locations in temporary stands along the third base line as well as in the outfield.

**THE NEW** construction will be the last word in pavilion or bleacher seats, much like those in front of Cooke hall at Memorial stadium. The

only difference is that all seats will have comfortable back rests.

The campaign to build Metropolitan stadium dates back to 1954. That's when the first step was taken to raise \$4,500,000 of private money needed to get the job done.

Originally, Minneapolis and St. Paul investment houses stated that if the major league baseball committee should sell \$2,000,000 worth of Class B bonds, the remainder would be disposed of the open market.

However, late in November 1954 the metropolitan sports area commission was informed that the bond houses would sell only \$1,243,000 class A bonds. That forced another drive to sell \$1,242,000 in A-2 bonds.

**ONCE AGAIN**, local enthusiasts, led by the Minute Men, refused to toss in the sponge. A concerted campaign over two months disposed of the A-2 issue.

In the meantime, work had been started on construction. When the final financial roadblock was overcome in the spring of 1955 the work was speeded up to meet the April 1956 American Association opening.

Contractors would have met the deadline but for a fire in one section of the permanent stands in February 1956.

At first, this looked like a major catastrophe. However, the Johnson, Drake and Piper Co., as the main contractors,



overcame this setback and the first game was played in Bloomington on April 22 between the Minneapolis Millers and Wichita of the American Association. More than 18,000 were on hand for the opener.

**WHEN CALVIN** Griffith decided last October to move his Washington club to the Twin Cities, another refinancing job was necessary to expand the stadium. The new costs boosted the investment to \$8,500,000.

This required approval of the Minneapolis city council and board of estimate and taxation. These two agencies insisted that at least 90 per cent of the A-2 and B bonds be exchanged for the new issue now known as Class D bonds.

This called for another all-out effort to get this job done. The goal was reached late last November.

For months work has been going on at Bloomington to get the stadium ready for Friday's call of 'Play Ball' between the Twins and the Senators.

The Twin Cities' efforts to get major league baseball or-

iginated in Minneapolis in 1952 with the formation of a committee that was headed by Lyman Wakefield as chairman with Kenneth Dayton, Joyce Swan, E. W. Boyer, Gerald Moore and this writer as the original members.

**THE ST. PAUL** Chamber of Commerce early in 1953 appointed its own major league committee headed by Walter Seeger. The two cities then teamed up for a joint venture.

Later the Minneapolis contingent was increased with the addition of Hugh H. Barber, Donald T. Knutson and Neil Messick, Sr., with Moore taking over the local chairmanship.

Professional survey groups were hired by the Minneapolis and St. Paul groups to find out major league baseball attendance potential in this area.

The Twin Cities worked closely together until the University of Minnesota board of regents refused to sell 45 acres on the farm campus for a stadium.

**MINNEAPOLIS** went its own way in May of 1954 and chose a 160-acre tract in Bloomington as the best available site. St. Paul put over a public bond issue of \$200,000 to build what is now Midway stadium.

About 18 months ago the two Twin Cities groups teamed up with a combined effort to get major league baseball through the proposed Continental league. When this venture died

with the decision by the American and National leagues to expand their membership, a Twin Cities' committee began the drive for one of those franchises. That came to a successful conclusion last Oct. 26.

By late September there will be 40,000 seats in Metropolitan stadium for the opening of the Minnesota Vikings' National Football league season.

The baseball Twins will have the use of the seats in the new first base stands for the late stages of their schedule and the capacity will be increased to 40,000 for the American league entry in 1962.

**League Chief Cronin Helped Twin Cities**

It was Joe Cronin, president of the American league, who arranged for the Boston Red Sox to operate a farm club in Minneapolis, in 1958 after the New York Giants had moved to San Francisco.

This move was one of the big factors that brought major league baseball here.

**THE GIANTS** had run the Minneapolis farm club. When they transferred their franchise to San Francisco, they made a deal for the California territory with the Red Sox, that included the right to operate a club in Minneapolis.

In fact, the first lease the Red Sox signed with Metropolitan stadium gave the American league first rights on the Bloomington park when and if the Twin Cities got major league ball.

Last October, before the American league met to consider expansion to 10 teams, Cronin did a lot of spade work to set the stage for the transfer of the Washington Senators franchise to the Twin Cities.

**THEN, BEFORE** Los Angeles and Washington even were awarded new franchises, it was Cronin who helped talk the American league into allowing the men of Calvin Griffith to move to Minnesota.

"I've always regarded the Twin Cities as one of the most fertile baseball territories in the country," said Cronin. "There isn't any reason why the Twin Cities can't match the attendance records of any of the major league clubs that moved."

"The people in your area deserve great baseball. And they will get it, with a team that proved it could be a contender last year."

**THE RED SOX** had a lot of faith in Minneapolis when we put a minor league team into Metropolitan stadium. We feel that faith will be justified and the Twins will have a great season, both on the field and at the gate."

Like Cronin baseball commissioner Ford Frick has favored expanding the major leagues to the Twin Cities.

would get major league ball. "You have a virgin territory," said Frick. "There isn't any reason why the Twin Cities wouldn't do well at the gate, just as Milwaukee did when the Braves moved there from Boston."

**FRICK'S ONLY** argument against expansion was that he didn't want to see Washington without baseball. This was taken care of when a new team was put in the nation's capital.

When there was talk of the major leagues moving to Texas, Frick maintained the Midwest would be as good or better. He was one of many top baseball men who applauded the move to the Twin Cities.

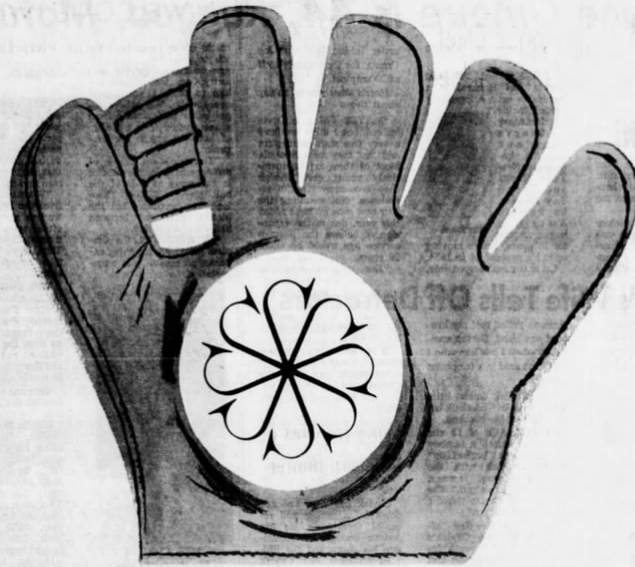

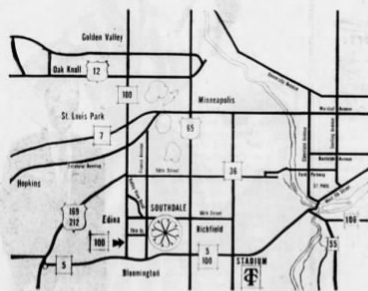

# Average Umpire Is 44, Rugged, Mature

Baseball fans, meet your American league umpire.

He is a rugged, mature individual. He stands a shade over six feet, weighs 200 pounds and is about 44 years old.

He is well paid. He likes his work and he's good at it. Otherwise, how would it happen that he has been on the job for 10 years?

**THE COMPOSITE** picture of the American league umpire is drawn by his supervisor, Cal Hubbard—a king-size symbol of the authority

of the American league's "man-in-blue."

At 6'3½" and 260-plus pounds, Cal Hubbard is a formidable man. A legendary football tackle at Centenary and Geneva colleges and with the professional New York Giants and Green Bay Packers, he was an American

league umpire for 18 years, before moving up to his present job in 1954. Cal is the man responsible,

under league President Joe Cronin, for the league's staff of 20 umpires.

Here's what he has to say about them:

"MAYBE I'M a bit prejudiced, but I think we have a very fine staff of umpires and that they do a fine job. Most of them are comparatively young even though they have many years of experience. Not counting the four new men we have added this year, due to the expansion, I believe the average service age would be about 10 years.

"The umpires work in

teams of four and it is my job to pair them up as to personality, ability and seniority. I am close to them and like to think I know their every whim. We believe we get better performance from a team when it is made up of individuals who are congenial.

"The minimum salary of an American league umpire is the same as that of the ball player—\$7,000. There isn't any maximum but the highest paid get between \$15,000 and \$20,000.

"IN ADDITION the umpires get \$3,500 for living expenses per season, plus transpor-

"All members of the staff are assigned to spring training games and, of course, get all their expenses for this.

"The selection of the umpires is my job and what a job it is sometimes. I get reports on minor league prospects the same as clubs do on ball players, and I go to that league and look at the man myself.

"We usually get our men from the Triple A leagues. If we see a man we like, we often take him to spring training and have a look. Then, if we like him, we will take an option on his services."

**THE FOUR NEW** men in the American league this season are Sam Carrigan, purchased from the Pacific Coast league; Bill Kinnaman, up from the American Association, and Joe Linsalata, and Harry Schwartz from the International league.

Veterans and the year they entered the American league are: Charlie Berry, 1942; Nestor Chylak, 1954; Cal Drummond, 1960; John (Red) Flaherty, 1953; Jim Hosochick, 1949; Ed Hurley, 1947; Bill McKinley, 1946; Larry Napp, 1951; Joe Paparella, 1946; John Rice, 1955; Ed Runge, 1954; Al Smith, 1960; Hank Spar, 1950; John Stevens, 1948; Bob Stewart, 1959; Frank Umont, 1954.

## Umpire's Wife Tells Off Detractors

"Robber! Bum! Jerk! Blind Tom! Your eyes are in your test pocket! Why don't you go back to rolling dice?"

These and several other variations of "kill the ump" are shouted daily at umpires by baseball fans.

"I DON'T mind people yelling at my husband if they see a play differently than he does," said Mrs. Nestor Chylak. "But when they call him names, I feel like standing up and telling them off."

And the 30-year-old wife of Chylak, an American League umpire for eight years, periodically does stand up and tell the shouting fans off.

"One time in New York,

someone yelled that my husband was blind. The fan apologized when I told him who I was," she said in a telephone interview.

Mrs. Chylak knew little about "official" baseball before she met her husband.

**AT THE AGE** of 13 she considered herself a tomboy and often got "bruised up" playing baseball with the neighborhood gang. "It was a rough game for a girl," she said. "But I like to think I was a good pitcher."

She attended her first "official" game with Chylak's brother. At the seventh inning stretch, she got up and walked out of the stadium. Chylak's brother thought she had gone to the ladies room.

But she thought the game was over.

"I was pretty embarrassed," she said.

**MARRIED** in 1956, the Chylaks live in Dickson City, Pa., and have one son, Robert, 2.

Chylak, who umpired the World Series in 1957 and 1960, gets hit by a baseball almost every game. "And it really stings," said his wife. "I almost feel like I got hit too."

Chylak has been knocked down by a runner and received threats on his life serious enough to necessitate his contacting the FBI.

Nevertheless, Mrs. Chylak wouldn't want her husband to be in any other work. "I know he's very happy doing

# Rituals Enliven the Game

Baseball is more than a game.

It is more than a business.

It also is a ritual full of traditions, customs and relics.

The ritual of baseball, as practiced by major league experts, will be one of the sidelights this year at Metropolitan stadium when the Minnesota Twins and their guests perform.

**THE FOLLOWING** is intended as a guide to a few of these rituals, which can be enjoyed by the spectator without detracting from his attention to the game itself.

They do not detract because they usually occur during those long periods of inactivity between brief periods of activity such as a pitch, a hit or a fielding play.

One of the first of these observances each day is the pregame ceremony attended at home plate by the umpires and the team managers.

**THE PROTOCOL** here is so rigid that it has been recorded in the rule book.

"First, the home manager shall give his batting order to the umpire-in-chief, in duplicate," the book says. There is, incidentally, no provision on what to do if it is presented, say, in triplicate.

"Next, the visiting manager shall give his batting order

to the umpire-in-chief, in duplicate."

The book does not say what penalty shall be invoked if the visiting manager gives his batting order to the umpire first.

**SUCH A BREACH** of etiquette presumably is so unthinkable that the rulemakers decided it was unnecessary to establish a punishment.

While the game is in progress it will be noted that players and coaches pay a great deal of attention to the playing field itself.

There is much dabbling in the dirt.

Batters grab it and rub it on their hands, all the while maintaining an air of great dignity.

Pitchers paw at the pitcher's mound.

Infielders pick at the unsodded portion of the diamond between first and third bases.

**THE EXACT** purpose of this grabbing, pawing and picking is unknown to those outside baseball. Perhaps it demonstrates displeasure with the groundskeeper.

Batters and coaches, using their feet with great cleverness, erase early in the game the chalked outline on the areas in which they are required to stand. It has been said that this allows them to stand slightly outside these areas, thereby gaining improper advantage.

Relics known as resin bags

are handled by the batter and pitcher, apparently in the hope that some baseball deity will favor them.

Often a player will do something worthy of the crowd's applause by nonchalantly touching the brim of his cap. Under normal circumstances, this is the only acknowledgment of the crowd's existence permitted by custom.

**OCCASIONALLY** a maverick will appear, like Ted Williams, who not only never tipped his cap, but also went to the other extreme, sometimes spitting or gesturing toward the stands and the pressbox to indicate unhappiness with the occupants.

The superstitious players will make it a point to kick a particular base or avoid stepping on a baseline while entering or leaving the field.

Among the superstitious there exists, too, the belief that crossed baseball bats lying on the ground are a bad omen.

**AS A LAD** on the sandlots I often had the duty of keeping the bats uncrossed. I once neglected my charge, and we lost the game.

My teammates looked upon me with scorn.

Inwardly, I felt my striking out with two men on base had more to do with the loss, but who was I, a mere youth, to buck the organization?

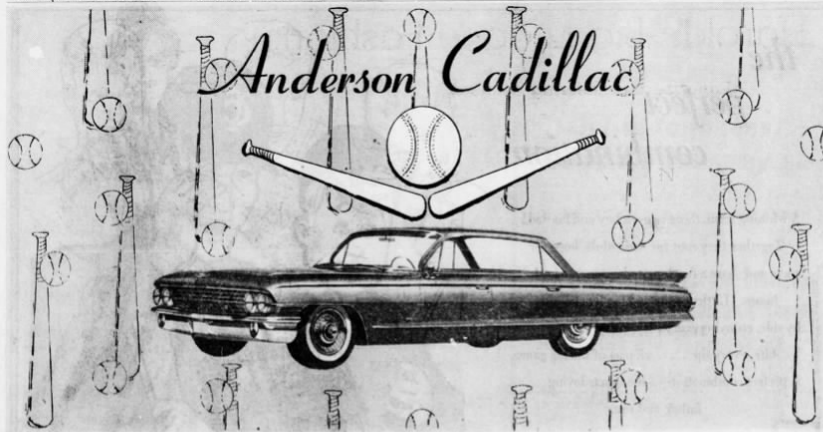

# At 76 She'll Be Out There Cheering

## Mrs. Lund Is Glad Twins Are Ours

As far as Mrs. Elizabeth Lund of Minneapolis is concerned, the Upper Midwest gained its major league baseball franchise just in time.

Mrs. Lund, 76, has been an ardent baseball fan since 1920. She was a faithful patron of old Nicollet park for Miller games, and averaged 20 home games a season in the first five years that Metropolitan stadium housed minor league ball.

"I was afraid I would be gone before the Twin Cities got a major league team," she said. "It would have been a shame, missing a chance to see the Yankees and White Sox play here."

"Now that we have our team, I'm going to see every game I can. Those that I have to miss I'll catch on the radio."

That is the outlook that many fans have today, of course, but Mrs. Lund was just as vigorous a follower of minor league baseball. She recalls the days when Ted Williams and Ab Wright played at Nicollet park when Willie Mays hit .477 during his six-week stay here in 1951, and when Gene Mauch guided the Millers to the Little World Series title in 1958.

"I remember watching Ted

play his first game here in 1939," she said. "What a boy he was! Some of the language he used was a little hot, and I was close enough to hear it."

That was when Mrs. Lund lived at 38th and Nicollet, and walked nearly every day to Nicollet park. "Sometimes," she said, "I worried over falling through those old boards in the grandstand. And of course there were those walks home alone after a night game."

Mrs. Lund claimed she drifted into baseball principally because her children were fans. She had four boys and four girls and three of

the "boys"—Harold, 50; Herbert, 47; and Hilmer, 39, still live in Minneapolis.

Another son, Harry, 42, is a national-ranking table tennis champion living in Denver.

"Harry has over 600 table tennis trophies," says Mrs. Lund. "He used to be a baseball nut, but I think table tennis sort of took over his interest several years ago."

Mrs. Lund has 61 other young followers—30 grandchildren and 31 great grandchildren scattered around the country.

A widow for 23 years, she lives alone now at 3138 S. Clinton Av. For 11 years she

was a cleaning woman for General Mills, and now does housework for four families she calls "steady clients."

"I like doing housework better," Mrs. Lund pointed out, "because I can listen to the ball games while I work. I never get so far from the radio I can't hear what's going on."

For the last five years she has taken the bus to Metropolitan stadium on nice days, to meet a longtime friend, Mrs. Ruth Olson. "I see her at the grandstand gate before the game," she said. "Then we get whatever good seats we can. I love that big stadium, but I'll admit it was a hot handle—getting over to Nicollet park."

SHE IS AMONG the best informed of baseball fans anywhere. When Calvin Griffith moved his Washington Senators here, her first reaction was, "Now I can get to see Billy Gardner again. He was always one of my favorites."

(She met Gardner while Billy played with the Millers in 1955).

Her all-time favorite is Mickey Mantle of the Yankees. "But I think I'll take to Harmon Killebrew," she laughed. "Anybody who can hit a baseball that far must be great."

When the Twins meet Washington here Friday on opening day, Mrs. Lund will be there.

## Bond Proposal Fails at Twins' Spring Camp

ORLANDO, Fla. — A 13-million-dollar bond issue failed to pass here recently. Included were funds to improve Tinker field, spring training home of the Minnesota Twins.

Tom Starling, Orlando park and recreation director, said plans called for improving the grandstand and even clearance of an adjacent field.

THE TWINS have been training at Orlando since 1936 with the exception of war years '43, '44 and '45. They have five years left on a 10-year contract, according to Howard Fox, traveling secretary.

Orlando is a member of the Florida State league, owned by the Los Angeles Dodgers. The Dodgers, with minor leaguers and big leaguers together at Vero Beach, Fla., want to play their games at Orlando.

"They said they would if we added a money-making new grandstand," said Starling. "But the bond issue failed."

THE PRESENT grandstand seats around 2,000 and is not large enough to produce revenue crowds for spring exhibitions.

Manager Cookie Lavagetto of the Twins would like an alternate enclosed field to play "B" games in spring training at the same time the "A" games are being played. "More chance to look at the boys," said Cookie.

"We've got the room here," said Starling, "but all we need is the money to complete the improvements."

Tinker field grounds are much improved and the fences run 338 feet to left and right, 412 to center.

"City fathers believe it brings transients into town for spring training and the advertising does much for the town," concluded Starling.

### Stonky Wasn't Asked

Eddie Stanky, Cardinal scout, said he was never offered the San Francisco Giants managerial job, which was given to Alvin Dark last winter. Stanky managed the Millers in 1956.

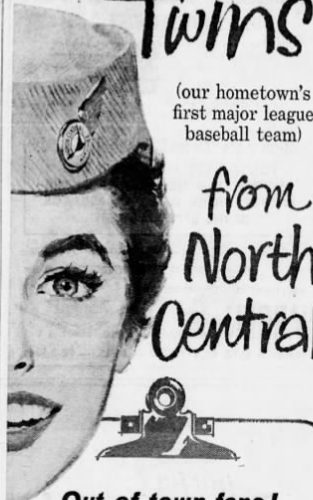

Gerry Staley — are past 40. Wynn is 41, and relief ace Staley will be 41 in August. Nearly all of the regulars are well into their 30s. The Sox are a sprightly group of graybeards but the end of the line has to come sometime. Manager Al Lopez hopes it will hold off for his veterans.

The Happy Hidalgo would like a catching comeback from Sherman Lollar and has high hopes for rookie J. C. Martin at third base.

He also hopes Juan Pizarro and Cal McLish, obtained in trades, will bolster the pitching staff that flopped last year as the Sox dropped from first to third.

### CLEVELAND

Frank Lane, on leaving Cleveland, said the Indians are better than the fourth place club they were last season.

He pointed to injuries and other troubles that hampered the Tribe in 1960.

The Indians could make Frankie a true prophet but there are a couple of "ifs."

The biggest lifts could be supplied by a couple of ex-San Francisco Giants obtained for Harvey Kuenn—Johnny Antonelli and outfielder Willie Kirkland.

Antonelli has been one of baseball's top left handers. He is only 31 and was unhappy with the Giants.

With him back in the groove and Kirkland joining Jim Piersall and Tito Francona in a standout outfield, the Indians could move.

A comeback by Bubba Phillips at third base and Gary Bell on the mound and a healthy Woody Held at shortstop would help manager Jimmy Dykes.

### DETROIT

The Tigers, sixth last year, could go up or down.

They are proud of their outfield of Al Kaline, slugging Rocky Colavito and Billy Burton, who was obtained from Milwaukee.

But at the same time new

manager Bob Scheffing is forced to bet on rookies at infield spots and on the pitching staff, while having a bit of a catching problem, too.

Chuch Cottier or Jake Wood will have to fill second base, because Frank Bolling was traded to Milwaukee. American Association rookie star Steve Boros has been tagged as the man at third base.

The Tigers also will depend on several pitching youngsters to strengthen a staff headed by Jim Bunning and Frank Lary.

Versatile players like Charlie Maxwell and Dick Gernert bolster the Tiger bench. Both play the outfield and first base where there is a traffic jam with Norm Cash, last year's regular, and Bobo Osborne from Denver in the act.

Bloomington's George Thomas could make the club, too.

### BOSTON

Ted Williams has retired to the role of batting coach, but Jackie Jensen has returned after a year of voluntary retirement. He is one of the keys to improvement by the Red Sox.

Jensen drove in more than 100 runs for five straight years before he took a season off. The Sox figure he might more than compensate for Williams' loss because he can play oftener and is better defensively.

The Red Sox also have the standout third baseman, Frank Malzone, and a truly big bat in Vic Wertz as well as the league batting champion, sprygun Pete Runnels.

But rookies must plug many holes, including left field where Minneapolis graduate Carl Yastrzemski will start. Another ex-Miller, Charlie Schilling, is in the picture at second base.

Rookies, among them Tracy Stallard, who has four

Mike, incidentally, is high on the mound savvy of former Miller Billy Muffett.

**KANSAS CITY**

The Athletics are a good bet to get out of last place because the American league has been expanded to 10 teams. They also offer a challenge to trader Frank Lane.

When Frank became general manager of the Athletics he had no catcher, but soon obtained three in Clint Courtney, Heywood Sullivan and Joe Pignatano.

KC also had lost shortstop Ken Hamlin, but new manager Joe Gordon is hopeful Sioux City graduate Dick Howser might fill the hole with Wayne Casey behind him.

The Athletics have a strong utility man in Dick Williams and ex-Yankees like Andy Carey and Jerry Lumpe are back to help the infield.

Norm Siebern swings a good bat at first base or in the outfield which has Bill Tuttle as defensive star in center.

Bud Daley and Ray Herbert head a pitching staff that could improve if Don Larsen and Joe Nuxall, the latter a left hander obtained from Cincinnati, have good seasons.

**LOS ANGELES**

The new Angels have one unchallenged distinction. They can outweigh anyone at first base, where Ted Kluszewski, drafted from the White Sox, and Steve Biko, ditto from Detroit by way of Denver, total approximately 500 pounds.

The two big boys, plus Bob Cerv, grabbed from the

Yankees, could be rough in the Wrigley field home run paradise.

But getting the opposition out looms as a problem. The seven major league pitchers acquired by the new Los Angeles outfit collected a total of 32 victories last year.

Bill Rigney, back in the game after being let out by the Giants last summer, has name players like third baseman Eddie Yost and pitcher Ned Garver on his roster, plus journeymen like Julio Becquer, Rocky Bridges and an assortment of pitchers that include chuckers like Jack Harshman.

He also has a fine defensive catcher in ex-Miller Eddie Sadowski, who would have it made if he could hit. In general, Rig is braced for a long pull.

**WASHINGTON**

The Senators, with Ed Doherty in the front office and Mickey Vernon calling the shots on the field, did better in the pitching line than Los Angeles.

Their staff won a total of 40 big league games last year.

Should Dick Donovan regain his White Sox form of other years, the Nats could have a bellwether.

The Nats like their outfield array, which includes Gene Woodling, Willie Tasby, Marty Keough, Jim King and Joe Hicks, as well as Chuck Hinton who also can play the infield.

The catching with Pete Daley, Dutch Dotterer and Gene Green, figures to be adequate, but the infield is a problem. The Nats should be all right at first base with veteran Dale Long plus R. C. Stevens and Bud Zipfel.

Defensively they are all right at shortstop with Coot Veal and former Miller Moe Mahoney. Second and third are something else again.

Billy Klaus will be helpful somewhere.

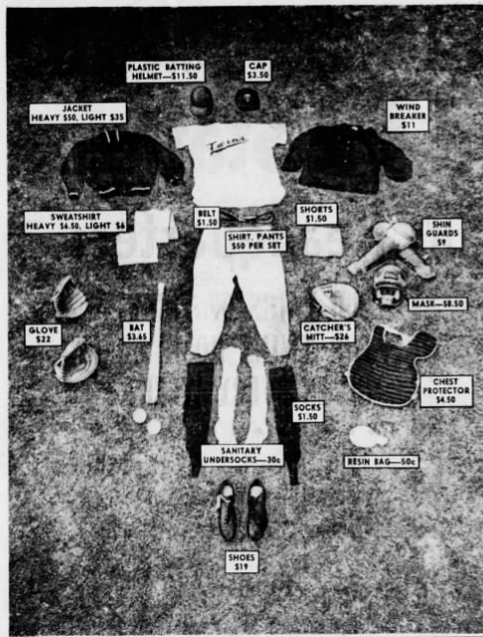

### Equipment for a Twin Costs \$113

It cost \$113 per man for what the well-dressed major league baseball player will wear this year. The figure comes from Ray Crump, Twins' equipment manager.

"The ball club pays about \$60 of it for each man," Crump said. "The club furnishes uniform, cap, helmet and socks. For the catcher, it furnishes shin guards, mask and chest protector."

Each player has three sets of home whites and three sets of road grays. Players must buy their own gloves. Fielder's gloves cost about \$22 wholesale. The catcher's mitt costs \$26. Players also buy their own shoes at \$19 a pair. They need at least two pairs a season.

The ball club pays \$19 a dozen for baseballs and uses 200 dozen in spring training. Most clubs use about 900 dozen in a year. The ball club also buys all the bats.

In the picture at left is a breakdown on the uniform and equipment costs.

## Publicist Heft Grew Up With Washington Team

Herb Heft is a natural as public relations director of the Minnesota Twins. When he beats the drum he thumps it with a fervor born of long association, officially and otherwise, with the team that used to be the Washington Senators.

Born and reared in Washington and a resident of the capital all but a couple of his 36 years, Heft always has considered the Senators (now Twins) his team—as fan, baseball writer and finally public relations man. He is steeped in Senator lore.

**HEFT ATTENDED** George Washington and American universities in Washington. He did not participate in athletics, but his brother, Arnie, did. Arnie is known to Twin Cities fans as an official in the National Basketball association.

Heft started his newspaper career in the news department of the Washington Post in 1944.

**HE WENT** to The Sporting News in St. Louis, Mo., at the start of the 1955 season and at the end of the season was in line for a public relations job with an American league club. A change in ownership closed it out.

He was going to take a baseball writing job with a Detroit, Mich., paper when Clark Griffith stepped in.

Heft, long, lanky and precise of speech, still could work up a large head of controversial steam about the Nats as the only Washington native on the Post staff.

**WHEN HIS** favorites won the opening game in 1949, the sports editor overheard an oration to his co-workers about the Senators and called Heft aside.

"Why don't you write a column about the Nats just like you've been talking it?"

So Heft did under the heading "Those Wondrous Nats."

"After opening day," he remembers, "the Nats lost seven in a row. But we kept

up the column and they won nine straight on the road and came home to a celebration at the station and a parade down Pennsylvania Av.

"The team had its ups and downs and late in the season really crashed to lose 18 in a row. But the column lasted out the season."

Heft and his wife, Shirley, will celebrate their 13th anniversary in July. They have four boys — Harold, 11; Jeffrey, 8; Gerald, 6; and Robert 4. The family will move to Minneapolis when school is out in June.

## Umpire Would Speed Up Game

Umpire Al Barlick says his pet peeve "is the guy who sits on the bench and second guesses the umpire."

Barlick has been a National league umpire since 1940 with time out for duty in the coast guard and a prolonged rest due to a heart ailment. And he has some constructive thoughts about the game.

"We've got too many strategists," said Barlick. "I worked a San Francisco game that lasted three hours and 52 minutes. That's a disgrace."

"They ought to have a rule that the pitchers and other players can't huddle after every two pitches, like they do. And they ought to enforce it. The owners could stop that kind of stuff if they wanted to."



# Feuding Twin Cities Play Ball So Twins Can Play Ball

Long characterized as a pair of feuding neighbors, Minneapolis and St. Paul have joined hands on their major league baseball venture.

From the mayors and top officials of the Chambers of Commerce down to the fans in the streets, they recognized and realized that cooperation is the only method to make their big league status a success.

**THE COMING** of the Twins cemented a bond between the two, on many levels and many phases, which might have been accomplished years ago.

Negotiations to get the franchise from Washington were largely carried on by Gerry Moore, Bill Boyer and Charles Johnson of Minneapolis. Some valuable assistance, however, was rendered by Herb Schell, a St. Paul business and civic leader who played an even greater role after the club was obtained.

Schell pointed out to St. Paul fans that the site of the Twins' home stadium was incidental. There were some who wanted the Twins to base in Midway stadium, and there were others who said Metropolitan stadium was too far away.

"It's equally distant

from the centers of both cities," Schell said, and then proved it. He measured the stadium as 11.1 miles from the St. Paul courthouse, noting the average time as 19 minutes and 22 seconds. From the Minneapolis courthouse it measured 10.1 miles, taking 20 minutes and 11 seconds.

Once the fans were convinced, ticket sales began to climb. The St. Paul Minute Men were formed, established on the same lines which has given Minneapolis' Minute Men national recognition. Officials of the Chambers of Commerce of both cities held joint meetings, along with representatives from both chapters of the Minute Men.

A ticket office was set up in the First National bank in downtown St. Paul, enabling St. Paul fans to compete for top tickets without having to drive either to Metropolitan stadium or the Twins' executive office in Minneapolis.

A GROUP of St. Paul boosters purchased \$70,000 worth of revenue bonds at Metropolitan stadium.

Calvin Griffith, Twins president, encouraged the cooperation. He purchased half of his \$5,000 outlay of office furniture and carpeting from St. Paul firms. And he hinted strongly that several of his top-ranking executives should

make their homes in St. Paul.

Contracts were let recently for addition and remodeling of Metropolitan stadium. St. Paul firms obtained half of these bids.

One of the Twins' television and radio sponsors is a major brewery, located in St. Paul.

**NEXT YEAR** the annual mid-winter baseball dinner, which drew a whopping crowd in January in Minneapolis, will be held in St. Paul.

## These Two Aren't Only Twins, They're Identical

It so happens that two of the busiest members of the Minnesota Twins official group are identical twins.

They are Billy and Jimmy Robertson, rotund, energetic and at 40, the youngest of the Griffith-Robertson baseball family. Billy is director of stadium operations, Jimmy is concessions manager.

"Just to put the record straight," winks Billy, "Jimmy is the youngest member of the family. I'm 20 minutes older than he is."

**THE BEST** way to tell which twin one is talking to is to see them together. Jimmy is noticeably heavier — about 10 pounds — which probably is natural since he runs the food department. Otherwise the odds are even that you will be wrong.

"We are always being mistaken for each other," they say, "but we don't mind. It's been going on all our lives and we're used to it."

Baseball is really in the blood of the Robertson twins. Nephews of the late Clark Griffith, they've been around baseball parks since they were 10. Like their older brothers, Calvin Griffith and Sherry Robertson, they both have played the game.

**THEY FORMED** a second base combination at Roosevelt high school in Washington, D.C., Billy playing short-stop and Jimmy second base. They also played semi-pro ball together in New England and Billy turned to catching. "I was too slow for short-stop," he says.

Out of high school, Billy went on to George Washington university while Jim took a one-season fling at professional ball — at second base for Orlando in the Florida State league. Along came the war, and the twins were in service together for four years. After that they figured it was too late to get a start in the playing end of baseball.

Jimmy usually goes to spring training but had to pass it up this year. Setting up the concessions in Minnesota he could devote to it.

Billy also took the Florida sun annually before his duties as stadium director became too numerous a few

years ago. Billy sums up his job this way:

"I HAVE nothing to do with the players but something with just about everything else around the club. I sort of keep loose ends tied up when Calvin (club president) is away. Guess maybe I'm sort of a general superintendent."

Billy oversees all stadium activities and supervises ticket sales. He and Jimmy had a hectic winter in the public relations department. They figure they must have made fully 100 appearances between them at luncheons, dinners and meetings and say the total would have hit 300 if they had been able to accept all the invitations.

Jimmy has had a tremendous job getting the concessions department ready to handle upwards of two million people at Metropolitan stadium this season for Twins and football Vikings games as well as special events.

"We usually come close to two million in Washington," he says, "and we should handle considerably more here."

**IT HAS BEEN** necessary to enlarge all the permanent concession stands and erect temporary booths behind the outfield bleachers and the portable stands down the left field line.

"We've kicked out a lot of walls," Jimmy says. "We designed our own type of equipment and have had to purchase it new. We built a walk-in freezer that can handle 3,000 cases of beer. We've built new scorecard and novelty rooms and new novelty stands, and we've hired some 400 people to carry out the operation. The work has cost about \$50,000."

In Washington the concession "take" averaged about 85 to 90 cents per admission, Jimmy says.

# In Twin Cities, Twins Mean Business

When major league baseball comes to town it brings more than a group of big men with big names, big bats and big salaries.

For one thing, it carries an almost assured increase in business—lots of money every year from big league fans who flock into town in big-spending droves.

Cities that made the switch from bush to big time in the past decade all report rather startling income hikes caused by baseball.

For example, The Milwaukee Chamber of Commerce took a survey several years after the Boston Braves chose to grace the Wisconsin city in 1953. It was discovered that out-of-town fans poured some \$7,000,000 a year into local purses.

**THE CHAMBER** reported that the average Brave fan from outside Milwaukee spends about \$11 a day. The biggest take from this expenditure goes to restaurants and retail stores (about \$3 each) and the rest goes to hotels, amusement firms, filling stations and various other retailers, the survey indicated.

Baltimore, blessed with the Browns of St. Louis in 1954, reported a mild boom-town reaction came with big league ball. Lee McPhail, president of the now respectable Orioles, reports no less than a quarter million people came into the Mary-

land city each year to watch the Birds.

They, too, bring money—about \$3,300,000 a year, according to McPhail. And the Bird boss sees other dividends coming with major league status.

**"YOU CAN'T** estimate the intrinsic value of an American league franchise to a city, for who can say how much it means in prestige to be known as a major league city? The value in advertising alone can't be imagined."

In Kansas City, Mo., where the inept Philadelphia Athletics became the inept Kansas City Athletics in 1955, it is reported that out-of-town spend about \$3,400,000 each year—despite the perennial problem of whipping up interest in a team that has trouble staying out of the cellar.

The two recent National league moves can be reported in a negative manner that is also impressive. When the Brooklyn Dodgers went to Los Angeles, Calif., and the New York Giants to San Francisco, Calif., statisticians figured New York was losing at least \$20,000,000 worth of annual business.

**THE NEW YORK** transit authority said the city lost \$300,000 a year in subway fares alone when the Yankees became sole possessors of big league territory there.

So the majors mean more money—substantially more—to cities able to shake them-

selves out of the bush leagues.

Sometimes the majors bring major controversies, too.

For example, Los Angeles burned white hot with angry argument a couple of years ago, just after the Dodgers arrived from Ebbets field.

**THE BATTLE** involved the city council, the state's supreme court and several hundred thousand citizens and turned brother against brother in some cases. It was fought over the question of whether the Dodgers could use a 300-acre plot of ground in Chavez ravine for a new ball park.

After weeks of burning discussion, a petition that forced the issue to a referendum vote and several court decisions, Dodger President Walter O'Malley got permission to use Chavez ravine. But until it was resolved, the city was split in anger over their major league newcomers.

In 1959 San Francisco had a big league affair that involved the Giants' Willie Mays. He and his wife bought a home in a fashionable section of the city.

**BUT SOME** neighbors objected, someone threw a bottle through Mays' picture window and it was reported that it all happened because he is a Negro.

Willie held out for a while, then sold his San Francisco home and bought one for \$75,000 in New Rochelle, N. Y.

## Bloomington, Richfield See Boost to Economy

Bloomington and Richfield expect no "boom town" reaction to the arrival of major league baseball at Metropolitan stadium. But they are anticipating a steady, wholesome boost in the general economy, and some early results are already in.

For instance: The Thunderbird Motel Corp. has launched plans to build a \$2,000,000 motel and restaurant near the stadium on 78th St. The motel will contain 195 units.

A year-round sports center is being constructed adjacent to the stadium. It will be the home of Minneapolis' team in the new National Bowling league, and further plans call for hockey facilities.

"THERE IS no question that construction of both of these buildings is the direct result of major league baseball coming to our area," said Irving Keldsen, Richfield mayor.

That, however, is expected to be just the beginning. Mayor Keldsen foresees a general resurgence of industry along the freeway leading to the stadium, resulting in more employment for Richfield and Bloomington residents.

Bloomington has six motels now, and that total may double within a year. A similar upsurge is anticipated in the restaurant business within the borders of both.

Here are comments from four officials—the two mayors and the two managers—of the municipalities.

Gordon Mikiethun, Bloomington mayor: "I have noticed a stable increase of land acquisitions near the stadium by private citizens. Obviously they intend to convert the real estate into business establishments. The sports center is one example of private capital financing a public building."

Irving Keldsen, Richfield mayor: "There's no question that major league baseball will be a distinct asset to our community. One aspect is our baseball program for youngsters—the Babe Ruth, Little League and Legion leagues. As busy and far-flung as they are now, I ex-

pect a big boost when the youngsters and parents see the big leaguers play. I feel Richfield is the most baseball-minded community in the state."

Raymond Olsen, Bloomington city manager: "If Milwaukee is any indication of the economic development resulting from proximity to a major league stadium, we're in for a healthy boost. The entire area of land north and south of Metropolitan stadium will soon be put into service type development—motel, restaurants, filling stations, etc. Naturally we're hoping and anticipating that many of our citizens will be employed in these enterprises."

O. R. Van Kevelen, Richfield village manager: "I'm looking for an increase in construction of apartment houses. People connected with the baseball club in any capacity have to live somewhere; we're hoping that they will pick Richfield."

Richfield officials also look for a boost in business development along Cedar Av. leading out to the stadium. And while there are no bars in Richfield, its municipally-owned liquor store could likely benefit from bottle club patrons of the Stadium club.

A drawback, of course, is the crowd and traffic situation. Richfield figures it must hire a number of policemen on overtime to handle the crowds en route to and from the stadium. If its police force is unable to serve the requirements, some civil defense volunteers may be called out.

"But that's something we're ready for," Mayor Keldsen pointed out. "After all, we have crowds to handle near Southdale, too."

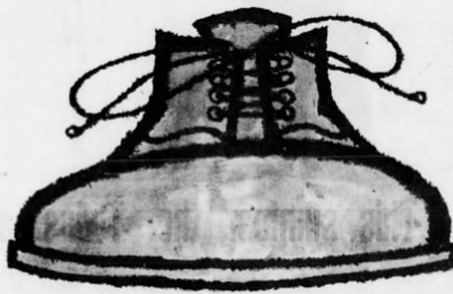

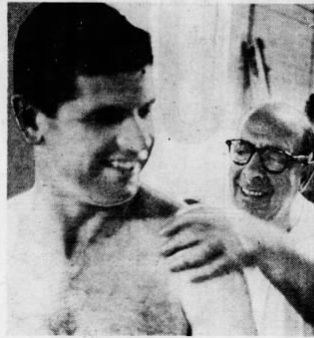

**DOC LIKES** to remember when he was training Catholic university in 1935. "We beat 'Ole Miss' 20-19 in the first Orange Bowl sellout in history," he said.

Lentz is looking forward to his Twin Cities exposure with equal delight. "This is a coming young club," he said. "A good group of fellows who are certain to become a factor in the American league race in years to come."

# Professional Baseball Is 84 in St. Paul

Rutherford Hayes was president of the United States and the Custer massacre was still a fresh tragedy in history when St. Paul's Red Caps won the League Alliance flag.

That happened in 1877 in the city's first year of professional baseball. And it probably set a pattern. In 1903, in its second season in the American Association, St. Paul also nailed a pennant to the mast.

**WHO WAS** at the managerial helm? Why, Mike Kelley, of course, in his pre-Minneapolis era, and he repeated at the top in 1904. Then after a couple of "leaves of absence" Michael staged Saintly encores at the top of the AA heap in 1919, 1920 and 1922.

Kelley also came in second with the greatest number of victories—111—ever accorded an Association runnerup in 1923. And that was enough for Mike to "kick himself up-river" to head the Millers.

But his departure didn't hurt St. Paul fortunes in the least. Thus, in 1924, they won their fourth pennant in six years, mainly because the then new manager, Nick Allen, was able to beat his old boss (Kelley) 19 times in the inter-city series.

The flags flew at Lexington park less frequently after that, with pennants in 1931, 1938 and 1949 and a playoff championship in 1948. So the Saints match the Millers' with nine first-place finishes

apiece. No other clubs have done so well, and now the two cities are combining so . . .

**PROBABLY** the best team the Saints ever put on the field was in 1920. That gang of Charlie (No-Hitter) Hall, Rees (Steamboat) Williams, Elmer Miller, Goldie Rapp, Bubbles Hargrave, Leo Drensen, Danny Boone, Bruno Haas, Doc Riggert, Duke Duncan and Marty Berghammer, was one of the best ever assembled in any minor league. It finished with 115 victories and a 28½-game edge over its closest rival.

Ironically, those 1920 Saints lost to Baltimore in the Junior World Series, which was revived that year with the International League

champs and has been going on ever since.

On the other hand, the somewhat patchwork Saints of 1924 brought the Twin Cities their first—and St. Paul its only—Junior title. They were paced on the attack and the bases by the still young Seacap Christensen at center, Charlie Drensen at third and Johnny Neun at first.

**THEY WERE** anchored on the mound by such oldsters as Howard Merritt, Paul Fitey and Tony Faeth, who won four of St. Paul's five victories in the classic struggle with Baltimore.

The Orioles led four victories to two before the comeback began. But when it was finished the Saints had licked such mound "unbeat-

ables" as Lefty Grove, George Earnshaw and Tommy Thomas, who were heard from later in the American league.

Faeth exemplified love and charity, too, by coddling Boone, the regular Saint shortstop, on the head during batting practice. That paved the way for rookie Mark Koenig's series stardom as a fill-in and eventually won Mark promotion to the Yankees and the Saints a neat \$50,000 profit.

Marty O'Toole, a Saint strikeout ace, had been the first high-price Saint sold on the market when he went, sore arm and all, to Pittsburgh in 1911. By the mid-twenties, however, Bob Con-

nery, the scout who discovered peerless Rog Hornsby, had succeeded John Norton as Saint prey.

**SO THE TRAFFIC** between New York and St. Paul became steady, and any good players the Saints had whom the Yanks wanted they got.

To name a few, Oscar Roettger, Lefty Gomez, Ben Chapman, Dusty Cooke and Wilky Moore, who set the Yankee fireman pattern, all played for the Saints, either before or after their N. Y. stretches.

Perhaps all that was to be expected since long before, in 1902, Miller Hug-

gins, who was to become the mighty mite manager of the Yankees' f a m e d Murderers Row, played second for the Saints and led the Association in chances accepted at the position with 791.

On the managerial front, St. Paul had such well-known names as Kelley, Ray Blades and then Walter At- ston. Wait first showed his quiet leadership when he led the 1948 Saints to an upset playoff championship and then directed Phil Haugstad, Hank Schenz, Eric Tipton and Co. to a '49 flag.

OH YES, there have been great names dotting the downriver horizon, including Charlie Comiskey, who

played first base for the Western league Saints from 1895-99, when their park was still behind the bakery off Robert St.

When the American league was being formed at that time, it looked as if St. Paul might get a major league franchise. But the Old Roman packed up his club and moved to Chicago where his White Sox won the first AL pennant in 1900.

**Burleigh Grimes Urges Return of the Spitball**

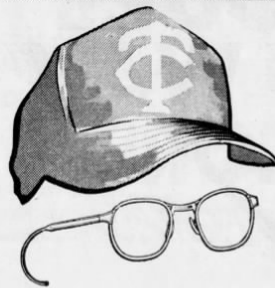

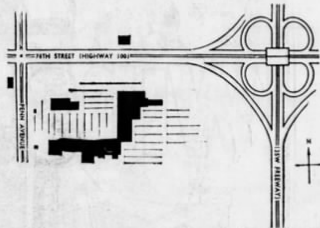

### Dick Groat Finds He's Better Late

FORT MEYERS, Fla.—(AP)—The National league's most valuable player and batting champion hit a weak grounder and a voice in the back-ground bellowed: "Keep both hands on the bat, boy!"

**BEFORE BATTER** Dick Groat could regain his composure he mumbled a few words about wise guys giving instructions.

He then looked up just in time to see the owner of the voice sitting with folded arms in the dugout at Terry field. It was manager Danny Murtaugh.

Groat just smiled. There was a time, however, when,

fresh from a great athletic career at Duke university, he could have stood some hitting instruction.

The 30-year-old Groat is about the best hit and run man in the business because he swings late and usually gets a piece of the ball when he tries to hit behind the runner.

"I'VE SWUNG late ever since I was a kid," Groat says.

"In 1952, when I first came up from Duke, the New York Giants played third baseman Henry Thompson near short and Alvin Dark, the short-stop, would play close to second base.

"Branch Rickey and George Sisler (Pirate hitting coach) told me I'd better learn to pull the ball to left field. With my power I'd have to spray the ball to all fields, they told me.

"I watch the ball longer. That means I hit it a lot after it breaks. I don't roll my wrists like the real good hitters. When I meet the ball my right hand goes under the bat rather than over it.

Shortstop Groat, a .286 career hitter until last season when he upped his mark to .291 on the strength of a league-leading .325, batted only .214 in the World Series, but it was a potent .214.

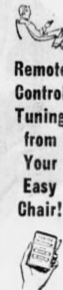

## Joe Haynes Is Key Twins Figure in Scouting and Deals for Players

Joseph W. Haynes is Calvin Griffith's brother-in-law. He also is executive vice president of the Minnesota Twins and a key figure in their operations.

The title is something of a misnomer. It implies office duties where—as Joe's job is chiefly connected with the playing end of baseball. Backed by 14 years as an American league pitcher and additional time as a coach, he is well qualified.

The husky (6-2½; and 200-plus), 43-year-old Haynes is one of three members of the Twins' organization authorized to carry on trade talks. The others are President Cal Griffith and Cookie Lavagetto, manager.

Griffith leans on Haynes' advice. Cal seldom makes a player deal without discussing it fully with Joe.

**HAYNES DOES** a great deal of scouting during the season and in the winter leagues. This spring, for example, he has been scouting the other major league clubs in Florida. The Twins want the latest information if and when chances for a trade develop.

Joe started his major league career with Washington in 1939 and finished it with the Senators.

He spent eight years with the Chicago White Sox.

Haynes' best year was 1947 when he compiled a 14-6 record and a 2.42 earned run average. He won considerable fame as the nemes- is of Cleveland's great Bob Feller.

IN 1946 when Bob won 26 and fanned 348 for a strike-out record, Haynes beat the Indians' fireballer four times. He won one of those games with a base hit.

On May 1, 1945, Joe just missed undying baseball fame. Hurling for the White Sox against Detroit, he was robbed of a perfect game by light-hitting Skeeter Webb, who hit a third-inning single.

Joe never played on a pennant-winning team in the majors but jokingly says, "I helped build a couple."

He explains:

"After the 1948 season, the White Sox traded me to Cleveland for Joe Tipton, a catcher. Then the Sox traded Tipton to the (Philadelphia) Athletics for Nellie Fox.

"A COUPLE of months later Cleveland traded me along with pitcher Ed Klie-man and first baseman Eddie Robinson to Washington for Early Wynn and Mickey Vernon.

"Wynn was the star of the Cleveland club which won the pennant in 1954, and he and Fox together helped the White Sox win in 1959."

Haynes played for Griffith when Calvin was managing Charlotte, N. C., in the South Atlantic league. On one occasion Cal found it necessary to fine him \$25 for a curfew violation.

Some years later—in 1941 — Joe married Thelma Griffith, but the fine never was rescinded.

"It's one of the family jokes," says a member of the Twins staff. "Thelma still is trying to get back that 25 bucks."

2 Detroit Tigers Roaring**

The bench between third base and the clubhouse at Henley field in Lakeland, Fla., where the Detroit Tigers' surplus talent sat during exhibition games was crowded.

The late-inning replacements were doing a good job keeping Chuck Cottier and his 167 pounds suspended in mid-air.

"THIS LITTLE fellow looks so young that he gets into the movies at half price," one of them said.

Baby-faced Cottier just smiled and the muscle men lowered him gently behind the chicken wire that separates the paying guests from the freeholders.

But mention the fact that manager Bob Scheffing had suggested Cottier as his utility man and that Jake Wood was the second baseman, and Cottier sounded off.

Wood is the 23-year-old Negro from Elizabeth, N. J., who can do everything Cottier says he can't do.

WOOD MADE 105 double plays despite 34 errors at Denver last year. He batted .305 with 12 homers and 78 runs batted in despite 126 strikeouts.

"Wood has got to beat me out," Cottier began.

"What he did at Denver doesn't count in the big leagues. I don't think he can make the double play."

"I don't want any of this utility business. I'm going to be the regular second baseman."

If Cottier doesn't play second, he may wind up at short, replacing the light hitting Latin, Chico Fernandez.

Cottier, 25, has youth and a flaming spirit going for him. IT WAS HIS desire to play that drew Scheffing's attention to the spunky Billy Martin-type lad from Hollydale, Calif., by way of Delta, Colo.

Both were at Milwaukee last year. Scheffing as a coach and Cottier as a .227-hitting second baseman in 95 games.

But while Red Schoendienst rode the bench, Cottier made all the plays. Scheffing gladly took Cottier with Bill Bruton and two others in the deal which sent Frank Bol-

ing, Detroit second baseman for six years, to Wisconsin. TWO SPRINGS ago, Cottier was tabbed for stardom by Fred Haney. Last spring Charlie Dressen took up the chant. He even gave little Chuck a heavier bat and said, "Don't swing for home runs."

"With the heavy bat," says Cottier, "the pitchers threw me fast balls inside, and I couldn't put wood on it. I went to a lighter bat and on the last road trip I must have have hit .420."

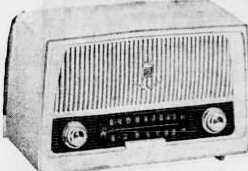

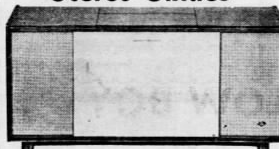

## Yankees, Braves Are Top Choices for 1961 World Series Competition

With expansion a reality in one league and only a jump away in the other, major league baseball embarks on a new frontier.

American league action figures to suffer, for each 1960 team has thinned its ranks to make way for two new franchises and the first 10-team circuit in diamond history.

The National league will show more interest than ever in the junior circuit because it too becomes a 10-team setup in 1962, with new clubs in New York and Houston.

Stocking these new teams depends on how well—or how poorly—the Senators and Angels fare in the standings.

The National league presents the more interesting pennant race. One of four teams—Milwaukee, Los Angeles, Pittsburgh or St. Louis—could win the flag.

In the American league a battle looms among New York, Baltimore and Chicago. It looks like the Milwaukee Braves and the Yankees will meet in the World Series.

The most improved National leaguers figure to be the Los Angeles Dodgers. Even Milwaukee manager Charlie Dressen says, "They are the ones to beat," not the world champion Pirates.

The Pirates jelled when they moved from fourth to a seven-game pennant-winning margin and a series conquest of the Yankees. But they were fortunate. They had no serious injuries and a depth still is suspect.

St. Louis rose from seventh to third. But the Cardinals could use more hitting. Manager Solly Hemus must platoon the once-great Stan Musial with castoffs. His deep pitching staff could carry him to the top.

**THE YANKEES** will miss Casey Stengel and their once powerful bench, not to mention Gil McDougald, now in retirement. However, they are solid in slugging and in catching, possess a fine infield and enough veteran pickers to make Ralph Houk's managerial debut successful. Their bullpen could be a weak spot.

Baltimore could win the pennant if a fine young pitching staff improves as expected and the outfield supplies the punch it lacked a year ago, when the Orioles moved from sixth to second. It was Paul Richards' best showing in 10 years.

If the Orioles are ever going to win the pennant, Richards figures, this has to be the year.

**THE WHITE SOX** probably form the oldest team over to leave the barrier—and it's a 162-game schedule this time. Manager Al Lopez

has only three regulars under 30, and with such a group of old geezers he will do well to finish higher than third, if that well. Two teams below him—Cleveland and Detroit—have improved tremendously and the old Senators figure to benefit in their new Minnesota surroundings.

Fan interest in Minnesota has reached a high pitch. Mickey Vernon deserves a better fate than Washington in his first managerial effort. The new Senators will do well to win 30 games, despite a shortened left field fence.

"I don't know how old Minoso is," Lopez said. "But however old he is he plays like a kid, like a young kid. Al Smith (33 on the records and maybe older) hit .315. He was second in the American league in hitting, and Minoso at .311 was third."

"Everyone has been predicting for years that Wynn may be having his last year. Well, he won 13 games after

a poor start. The encouraging thing about Wynn is his last half of the season.

"PITCHING-WISE we are better off than anybody in the league. Some clubs would be glad to add one starting pitcher. We added two in Cal McLish and Juan Pizarro.

"Yes, Baltimore has a fine young staff, but we picked up more help.

"Staley still looks fine as our top relief man. He was great the first half when his earned run mark was about one for nine innings. Later

on his sinker pitch was coming in high.

"Lollar (catcher Shugman Lollar, 35) was the only one who had an off year. He didn't say anything but he had a bad knee.

"ROY SIEVERS isn't old (he's 34) and while he hit 285 he also drove 28 home runs. He may get a few more with those two new teams in the American League.

"No, I'm not ready to concede the White Sox are getting old, not when you have fellows like Luis Aparicio, Nelly Fox and Jim Landis."

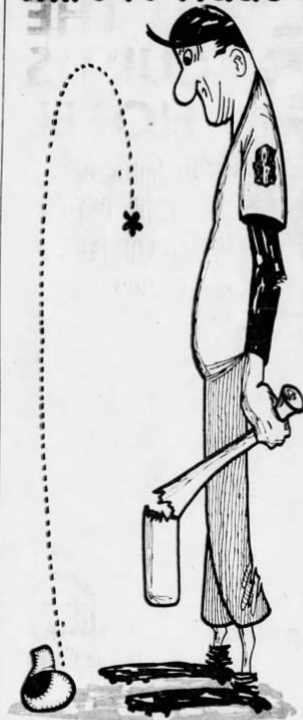

# Game Has Lingo of Its Own

## Don't Strike Out in 'Baseballese'

One of the basic tenets of good journalism, supposedly, is to write so even a 12-year-old can understand.

No group disregards that philosophy more consistently than baseball writers, both big and both league, mainly because no sport has more technical slang than our national pastime.

**THIS ARTICLE** is not written for the edification of 12-year-old fans. These diamond devotees probably could tell many a writer a thing or two.

But maybe some explanation of "baseballese" will help those less familiar with the game understand better what they watch as well as what they read about afterward.

A base hit, which can also be called a single, safety or a base knock, is when the ball is hit safely in fair territory and the batter reaches first without benefit of an opposing error.

**ERRORS**, which frequently are called miscues, muffs, boots and bobbles, include such horrors to the offending team as failing to catch grounders or flies and throwing wild.

As for base knocks, they may be of the one - base knock, two - base knock variety, depending on how far the batter is able to advance. The four - base knock is the ultimate, a home run.

This, in turn, is often described as a four - master but has nothing to do with ships.

Then there is a Texas leaguer which has nothing to do with Texas but refers to an arching fly too deep for the infielders to catch and too short for the outfield to reach. This is not quite like a humped - back liner which starts to sail, then suddenly drops to earth. Nor is it like a clothesline or grass - cutter which allegedly "handcuffs" an infielder.

A **BUNT** does not mean the central portion of a fishing net or sifting meal, as Webster's dictionary says, but a ball that is purposely placed along the ground short of the infielders. It is hit by holding the bat extended and still, except in the case of a



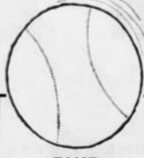

**IT'S HARD NOT TO BE NOTICED!** swinging bunt. Get it? The hit and run has nothing to do with highway mayhem any more than base stealing represents any form of larceny except in baseball parlance.

The hit and run is having the base runner head for second as the batter tries to hit the ball through the position the infielder has vacated to cover the bag.

**STEALING** a base is the way you advance without benefit of hit, walk, error, etc., while the pitcher or catcher has the ball. Only don't try to steal first. No one has figured out a way to do that since Abner Doubleday's started changing the game of rounders.

A curve, referring to a thrown baseball, should be just what it says, except that scientists have proved or attempted to prove that a baseball doesn't curve. And there are such varieties of curves as the in and-out, the slider, the knuckler, the fade-away, the floater, the screwball.

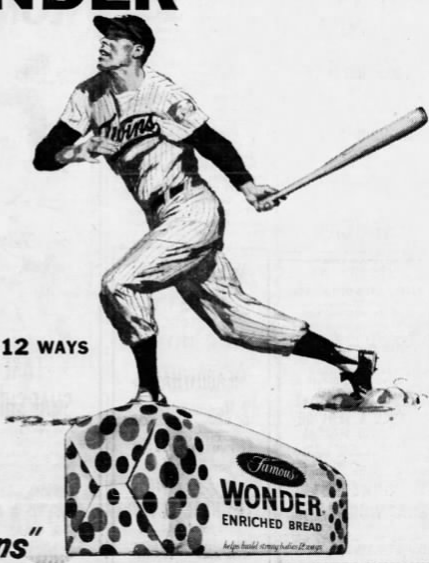

## Twins Games Will Be Heard in 12 States

The Minnesota Twins 1961 American league baseball games will be heard in 10 states and viewed in five through radio and television networks organized by the Hamm Brewing Co., the North Star network and Campbell-Mithan advertising agency.

Every one of the 162 Twins games will be broadcast by radio. More than 30 stations will carry the games in a far-reaching setup that extends from Denver, Colo., in the west to Michigan's Upper Peninsula in the east.

MINNESOTA and North Dakota will be blanketed and South Dakota as far west as Rapid City. The network also will reach into Nebraska and Iowa and the games will be heard in parts of Montana and Wyoming from stations in adjacent states.

### Los Angeles Fans Are Bound to Cotton to New 'Angels'

The Angels will also play at Wrigley field, old home of the Los Angeles PCL entry. While the interest is hot, attendance will not likely equal that of the Dodgers' nearly two million in 1958 because Wrigley field seating capacity is limited to 20,457.

# Ramos Is Kooky Cavalier

## HE LIKES WESTERNS, GIRLS

They call Pedro Ramos "the gay caballero."

He's a knight, all right, in armor a bit baggy at the knees—standing tall on the pitcher's mound flinging hot baseballs at such dragons as Mickey Mantle.

His white charger is heavy with extra chromium. Its top goes up and down with the seasons. Ramos wheels it around any town in cavalier fashion, one eye on the road, the other on the girls.

It's a benevolent eye, that one on the girls. Ramos likes girls.

HE ALSO likes anything western.

Out of a baseball park he stands sartorially somewhere between John Wayne and But Masterson.

Ramos wears the heavily fringed jackets of Daniel Boone, the elegantly embroidered black cowboy suits of Hopalong Cassidy and the broad-brimmed Stetson hats of any Texan.

"I love the Lone Ranger," he will say sweetly, and smile.

You have the feeling that Ramos really does.

The Cuban-born pitcher of the Minnesota Twins is probably the most debonair and devil-may-care member of the team.

He's a character, a superbly kooky fellow with a joy for living that should charm even the most sour fan.

THE GIRLS will also see that Ramos is mighty handsome, tall, dark and rugged. His Spanish accent is the added continental filipp guaranteed to set girlish hearts a-flutter.

All of this doesn't mean that Ramos isn't serious about baseball. "I started to play when I was a little boy in Cuba," he said. "Only a little boy of 11 or 12, maybe. I pitched. I played outfield. I bat with right or left hand. And I can run fast. I challenge Mickey Mantle to a race."

Ramos is considered one of baseball's fastest men on the bases. And Mantle isn't slow. The race, if it comes off, should be a dilly.

ALTHOUGH he hasn't pitched often to National League players, Ramos has great respect for Don Hoak.

the gariously scrappy third-baseman for the world champion Pittsburgh Pirates.

"He's good, but hard to pitch at," said Ramos.

When Ramos is scheduled to pitch, he gets just a bit superstitious. "I don't like to touch the first base line when I walk to the mound," he said. "And I don't like anybody to handle my glove."

I get mad quick. I have a Cuban temper."

Ramos throws what he calls the Cuban palm ball. Some of his enemies, the poor lugs who have to watch it coming, call the pitch a spitball. That's illegal. Ramos denies everything.

"I'M JUST a poor country boy from Cuba," he says with a shy smile. "But I'm not a hillbilly."

It's true that Ramos, his four brothers and two sisters, grew up on a tobacco farm in Cuba. They also had cows and horses on the place and that's where Ramos first began to ride the range.

The family also had a cigar factory and that's where Ramos learned to smoke. "Cigars are okay," he said. "Cigarettes I smoke only once

in a while."

Ramos also likes to eat. He'll even cook a few native dishes when he gets homesick. "French fried bananas. I can cook," he said, "and black beans."

"I CAN BUY black beans in Washington so if I can't get them in Minnesota, I'll buy them when we play in D.C. and carry them home."

Ramos learned his English—and it's colorfully good—from a restaurant man.

"I first came and pointed to something on the menu," he recalled. "It was pork chops. I ate pork chops for two months until I learned English."

Ramos works off any excess weight by simply working hard. "I pitched 500 innings last year," he said proudly. (An average pitcher considers himself a record-setter if he pitches 200 innings in a year.)

IN REGULAR season play, Ramos won 11 games and lost 18. His hitting average was .175.

"When I win, I feel happy," he said, with a broad smile. "When I lose, I feel so sad."

To cheer himself after these disasters, Ramos will go to a western movie. "And I like to mambo or rumba," he said. "But no cha-cha."

Ramos also can relax by watching other baseball games or by reading one of a small mountain of western

books he owns. They're all piled in the trunk of his car.

More than one young woman has received an invitation to view Ramos' western books. It's one of his opening gambits.

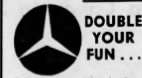
HE'S ALSO been known to stop any pretty girl he sees with a courtly bow and introduce himself. This can happen anywhere pretty girls are. In Orlando, Fla., Ramos, out driving, would curb his car, jump out and follow a girl until he could catch up and make his introduction.

It's expected he may enliven Minneapolis with the same routine.

Once he meets the girl, however, Ramos has a certain test of her true-blue qualities.

"If she likes western movies," he said, "then she'll be my girl."

### Griffith Is Top Name in Club's 2-Part Story

The Washington baseball club, which now is the Minnesota Twins, has a two-part history. In each part the name Griffith dominates.

The name Clark Calvin Griffith dominates most of the tradition and lore around the former Senators. He earned the nickname of "the Old Fox" through his pitching and later through his ability to trade players and conduct a club.

Clark was a successful player, a successful manager and a successful executive.

As a major league pitcher for 18 years, he won 236 games and lost 139. As a manager he directed Cincinnati in the National League and Chicago, New York and Washington in the American.

AS AN OWNER he was known for his ability to judge baseball talent and his shrewdness as a trader and club president.

Clark Griffith was born in a log cabin in Vernon county, Missouri, on Nov. 20, 1868. He helped form the American league in 1901 and then became manager and pitcher for the Chicago White Sox. His salary was a "fancy \$2,400."

Clark retired as an active player in 1907. In 1912 he became part owner of the Washington club and in 1919 the club president.

UNTIL HIS DEATH in October, 1955, Clark was one of baseball's great figures. He

won pennants in 1924, 1925 and 1933. In 1924 the Senators won the World Series from John McGraw's New York Giants.

It was Clark who thought of having the president of the United States throw out the first ball to start the baseball season. This tradition started with William Howard Taft in 1912.

In 1900 Griffith married Ann Robertson of Chicago. They had no children but adopted seven youngsters orphaned when a relative of Mrs. Griffith died.

One, Calvin Robertson Griffith, is the president of the Minnesota Twins who made the decision to transfer his franchise from Washington.

# Minnesota Twins Bring Region a Legacy of Baseball History

The Minnesota Twins acquired tradition along with the personnel of the Washington baseball club when the decision to move the franchise was made Oct. 26, 1960.

With the shift of the American league team this area "adopted" 102 years of participation in baseball. It also clasped to its bosom Washington's immortals of yesterday like Walter Johnson and Clark Griffith.

Washington organized its first baseball team in 1859. It was an informal group of government clerks who called themselves the "Potomacs."

**IN THE FALL** of the same year another group, the "Nationals," organized under shortstop Arthur Pae Gorman. Gorman later became president of the National Association of Professional Baseball Players, and still later, senator from Maryland.

In 1860 the first intercity game was played and Baltimore won 40-20, over the Potomacs. On the White lot (just behind the White House) in 1865 the first intercities tournament was held.

The Nationals lost to both Brooklyn and Philadelphia but President Andrew Johnson entertained all the players. Still amateurs and paying their own expenses, the Nationals took a nine-game road trip in 1867. After winning eight of the games the team was greeted by Mayor Ellenbeck upon its return. Their triumphs touched off a week of celebration.

In 1870 Washington built its first enclosed ball park, which seated 500. A 25 cent admission was charged. Next year a team called the Washington Olympics became one of nine charter members in the National association, forerunner of the National league. The Olympics finished fourth.

In 1876, with the formation of the National league, Washington lost its franchise. Not until the Nationals played in both the Union and the American Association leagues in 1884 did they regain their pro status.

In 1885 the Nationals joined the Eastern league

and won the pennant. In '86 they changed the nickname to the "Statesmen" and became a member of the National league.

**TWO YEARS** later they became the "Senators," and in 1892 they moved into a new ball park which is the present site of Griffith stadium.

In 1901, a year after being dropped from the National league, the Senators joined the American league.

In their opening game, the Senators lost 5-1 to Philadelphia. Their first winning effort was a decision over John McGraw's Baltimore Orioles. They did it before an overflow crowd of 9,772, including Admiral Dewey, the hero of Manila.

The Senators' history during the 20th century has a more familiar ring. The immortal right-handed pitcher, Walter Johnson, joined the team in 1907.

**IN 12 YEARS** OF HIS 21-year career, he won 20 or more games. Clark Griffith moved in as manager in 1912 and later became president of the club. Bucky Harris was the "Boy Wonder" manager of the championship teams of 1924 and '25.

Joe Cronin, now president of the American league, was star shortstop and managed the 1933 winners.

And then history was made again less than six months ago... the Washington Senators became the Minnesota Twins.

## Speed, Timing Put the Thrills Into Baseball

The baseball game as played in this era of television and wordy commercials takes almost three hours, but the crowds still turn out.

They thrill at a pitcher's fast ball which travels between 90 and 100 miles an hour and the line drive home run which reaches 120 mph.

To the baseball fan there is nothing so thrilling as the sound created when bat meets ball. The double play is a thing of beauty, especially if you are on the pitcher's side.

The toughest double play to make is the "around the horn" maneuver. It is thus called because the ball travels from third to second to first. Such a play has been clocked in 3.48 seconds, reports the magazine, Roche Medical Image.

## Angel, Senator Pitching Staffs Inspire Panic

Further evidence as to why everyone predicts a battle for ninth place between the Los Angeles Angels and the new Washington Senators is now on hand.

You can't win in the big leagues without a pitching staff, and the hand-me-downs focused on these two new American League teams at \$75,000 apiece should make an infielder shudder.

**THAT THE OTHER** eight teams in the American League will feast on Angel and Senator pitching is almost a certainty.

The two teams went to spring camp—the Angels to Palm Springs, Calif., and the Senators to Pompano Beach, Fla.—with 15 pitchers each. Collectively the 30 show 116 big league starts for 1960, but only 12 complete games. Even the lowly Kansas City Athletics of last year had 39 complete games among their 58 victories.

**THE ANGELS** appear to have a bit of an edge in the pitchers selected in the expansion draft.

The edge is in the important "games completed" column. They have hurlers with a total of nine complete games.

Ned Garver, at 35, probably is the best hurler of the Angels. He completed 5 of 15 starts for Kansas City last year but won only 4 of 13 decisions.

Outside of Garver, the Angels' best hope could be Jerry Casale, a former bonus pitcher who won only two decisions—both against the Yankees—in 1960. Casale won 13 games as a Red Sox rookie in 1959.

**COLLECTIVELY**, the Angels' staff shows only three shutouts for last year's activity. Garver turned in two and Ted Bowsfield one—his only complete game with Cleveland.

Outside of Garver, Casale and Bowsfield the only other L.A. hurlers who completed big league games a year ago are Truman Clevenger, with Washington, and Eli Grba, with the Yankees.

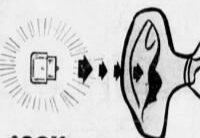

## Here's How to Get to the Stadium

The founding fathers who built Metropolitan stadium five years ago were not primarily interested in a minor league location for Minneapolis' entry in the American Association. Theirs was a major league vision, encompassing both the markets of Minneapolis and St. Paul.

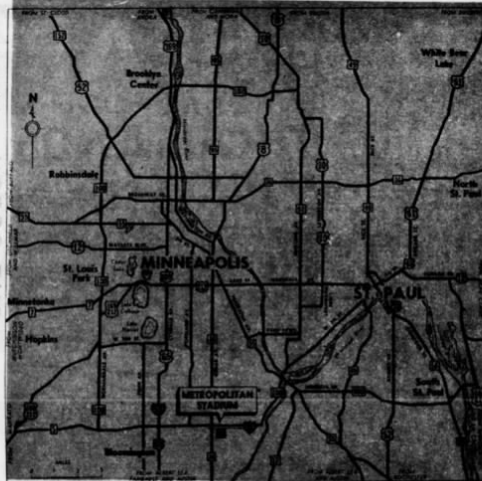
Now, thanks partly to widespread road improvements, the stadium stands as a natural magnet for the fandom of both cities.

Located just south of the intersection of Cedar Av. and 78th St., it is 11.1 miles from the St. Paul courthouse and 10.1 miles from the Minneapolis courthouse.

Its accessibility was greatly increased by the completion last fall of the freeway which parallels 78th St. and loops into parking outlets near the stadium.

For Minneapolis fans, here are the best routes:

**SOUTHBOUND:** Take Cedar Av. straight out and turn left into the parking lots. Or take Portland Av. and turn left on either 58th or 78th St., turning right at the freeway loop. Take Lyndale, Penn or any other southbound street out to the freeway, turn onto it and into



the parking area. Edina fans can take highway 100 out to 78th St., turn left and then right on Cedar and they will discover there are no stop signs along the entire route.

Best route for fans in northern and northeastern Minneapolis is the Belt line around to 78th, and then turn right on Cedar.

**EASTBOUND:** A straight throughway by taking the freeway, then turn right on Cedar.

**WESTBOUND:** St. Paul fans will likely drive over W. 7th St. to the Belt Line and come in on the freeway.

### OUT-OF-TOWN FANS:

The stadium is accessible from Rochester by taking highway 55. Turn off at the Belt line and then catch the freeway into Cedar. Mankato area fans can take highway 169 up, catch highway 100 in Edina, take 100 south to the new freeway, then take the freeway to Cedar. Fans from northern Minnesota can hit the Belt line from several incoming highways and take the same routes.

The parking situation, admittedly a headache to many during minor league days,

has undergone many drastic changes.

An analysis was completed by a firm in Evanston, Ill., regarding the parking situation, and its recommendations have been carried out.

**SIX NEW** entrances were built, bringing the total to nine. The new outlets include two on 24th Av., two on the boundary road south of the stadium, one on Cedar and one on the north boundary road.

Assume there is a big game, with capacity traffic. A total of 6,100 cars are expected to come in off Cedar Av., an average of 4,000 per hour. That is 36 per cent of the traffic total expected. Another 2,200 an hour will come eastbound on highway 100, or 20 per cent.

**THE 151 ACRES** of parking space will all be paved and divided into 10 sub-lots. Each lot will be centered with a huge sign of an American league club, and illuminated by special lights being installed. One lot, for instance, will carry the official insignia of the Yankees, another the White Sox, another the Twins, etc. It was patterned after the plan at the Southdale shopping center, which features animals for guide posts instead of baseball club emblems.

The lot will hold 15,000 cars at capacity, instead of the 3,000 which filled the minor league lot the last five years. In addition, special areas will be reserved for 180 charter buses, another for club officials and players and another for bond holders.

In addition to the freeway completion, accessibility was made more complete by the paving of the boundary roads on both the north and south sides of the stadium. Road improvements are also scheduled for 24th Av., and long-range plans call for widening of Cedar Av. all the way to Minnehaha Pkwy.

## Group of Six Run Stadium Operations

Metropolitan stadium, for all its expansive beauty and practical considerations, doesn't run itself. Behind the scenes is a group of six men, called the metropolitan area sports commission, who direct operations.

Appointed by the Minneapolis city council for four-year terms, the commissioners are in effect supervisors and operators of the stadium and the land surrounding it.

**CHAIRMAN IS** Gerry Moore, executive vice president of the Minneapolis area Chamber of Commerce.

Of the five members, three are from Minneapolis: Lyle Dorrian, owner of Lyle's Bar; Walter Cramond, president of the Central Labor Union; and Nathan Harris, retired city engineer.

Richfield is represented by Clayton Lefevre, an attorney; and Bloomington by James Kempf, also an attorney.

Dorrian is the vice chairman and Kempf is the commission secretary.

**THE DAY-TO-DAY** supervision of the stadium is handled by Joe Duffy, Minneapolis sportsman who was recently named stadium manager. Joe's brother, Ray, was named to manage the Stadium club.

Among the commission's duties are letting and approving bids on all the complex construction work involved in the stadium expansion; maintenance of the building itself; working with architects on expansion plans; supervision of parking and traffic control and relationships with the major tenants, the Twins and the Vikings.

"It's a big job," Moore said, "and it's getting bigger. We used to meet twice a month; now we get together every week and still can't find enough time to do the work."

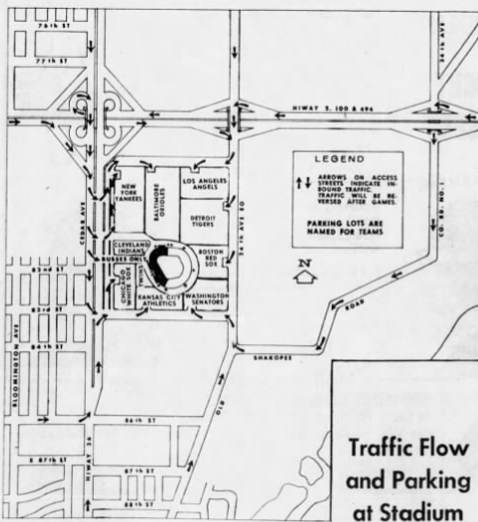

As it turned out, Scheffing was half correct. Yost went to LA and Veal to Washington.

"We've got some good kids coming up," Scheffing continued. "You will be hearing about Steve Boros, a third baseman, and Jake Wood, a second baseman. Charlie Metro had them all season at Denver and is high on them."

"I like the Detroit pitching staff and added to it are some promising young rookies like Seyfried, Wyman Carey, Dick Egan, Alan Koch and Dick Smallwood."

**IT SEEMS** the two new American league teams missed the boat on young pitchers. They took veterans Dick Suster and Pete Burnside from Detroit but passed up Seyfried, Carey and Egan.

"Egan was only 44 at Portland but his last three games were shutouts," com-

### Frick Predicts Era of Change for Baseball

By FORD C. FRICK  
Commissioner of Baseball

NEW YORK—(AP)—In my opinion, baseball in the next five years will enter a new era of most interesting development, culminating a program started almost 10 years ago when the Boston Braves moved to Milwaukee.

In five years time I think there will be 24 major league clubs, probably divided into two 12-team leagues, each with two divisions. The teams in the two divisions would play interlocking schedules with the two division winners meeting in a best-of-three or best-of-five game series to determine the league champion. Then the two league winners would meet in the usual World Series.

I EXPECT that this five-year period also will see the reorganization and realignment of the minor leagues with closer and more realistic arrangements with the majors. They probably will have to be supported or subsidized as feeders.

Instead of all the classes we have now from the triple A to class D, I expect there will be only three classes. They could be called the senior, intermediate and junior classes. For example, cities with population over 200,000 could be in the senior leagues, cities between 100,000 and 200,000 in the intermediate and those under 100,000 in the junior.

If we have 24 major league cities, each would need a minimum of one senior league team as a farm.

EACH MAJOR league team would need two intermediate clubs or 48 in all and each major would need three junior clubs or 72 in all.

Many people criticize baseball for its "stand patism." They do not realize that there have been since 1952 and will be in the next five years, more baseball stadiums constructed than in any previous period.

You often hear that baseball is running out of players, that we can't stock the new teams. We have more kids playing baseball now than ever before.

**Colavito Sure  
His Batting  
Has Improved**

LAKELAND, Fla. — The  
happiest man in Cleveland  
last April was Rocky Colavito,  
the curly-haired idol of the lake-front  
bobbysocks set.

He had won his contract  
battle with his boss and se-  
verest critic, Frank Lane.  
He had had two slam-bang  
seasons in a row with 41 and 42 homers.  
He had just moved into a  
new house. And he had lined  
up a reliable baby-sitter for  
the lambkins. He was set.

The day before the cam-  
paign opened, however, the  
iconoclastic Lane engineered  
a deal that shook the base-  
ball world. He traded Colavito  
to Detroit for Harvey Kuenn,  
a swap of the home-  
run king for the batting  
champion.

THE SENSITIVE Rocky  
was jolted to his heels. He  
didn't even have time to ad-  
just his thinking before he  
was put in the showcase be-  
fore a new batch of fans.

Colavito never tried hard-  
er to please. On opening day  
he fanned four times and be-  
fore the season was a month  
old he was hitting a rousing  
161. He was benched, a  
humiliating development for  
one of the better gate attrac-  
tions in the league.

The soothing and persua-  
sive tactics of his manager,  
Jimmie Dyle's, however,  
eased the pressure on him.  
After his return to the line-  
up Rocky began to hit with  
ever increasing frequency  
and by the season's end was  
booming away like the Colavito  
of old.

"Perhaps Lane's taste has  
changed. I read in the Sport-

ing News that he'd love to  
have me back." Rocky tried  
to be sarcastic but he's such  
a mild-mannered young man  
that he can't put a sting in  
his words.

Some outsiders thought  
Rocky was a little too home-  
conscious last year.

"BUT THAT isn't true," he  
said earnestly, his dark eyes  
flashing in protest. "I never  
try for home runs. I wasn't  
even trying the best day I  
ever had." The soft eyes grew  
wistful at the memory of that  
day in Baltimore.

**Musial: If I Couldn't Help Team, I'd Quit**

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla.— (AP)—“That’s my summer weight,” said Stan Musial as he pinched the flesh around his mid-section. “Some is here and some is there.”

Actually, the .335 career hitter looked no heavier than the 180 pounds listed beside his name on the St. Louis Cardinal roster. In fact, he looks better than he has in some time.

“I’VE EVEN cut out smoking,” Stan the Man—remarked. “Stopped last January. My wife Lillian says she even notices the difference. When I smoked she said I used to have bags under my eyes. Now they’re gone.”

The talk got around to stories which appeared in the St. Louis papers last May. Bob Brong of the Post-Dispatch, often regarded as Musial’s ghost writer, wrote: “If the Cardinals are trying to embarrass a man who never embarrassed them, either by word or deed, they are succeeding.”

Musial had been used as a pinch hitter to get an obvious base on balls and was substituted in games already lost. Manager Solly Hemus was raked over the coals, and not too gently at that.

“IT WAS JUST one of those things,” Musial said. “I’d quit if I thought I could not help the team. When my time comes to hang up the spikes I’ll know it. I’m not going to embarrass anyone.”

Hemus commented on the charges: “I went with a younger ball club at the start,” he began. “I felt it was sounder to put Bill White at first base. I had Bob Nieman in left field and he was carrying the ball club. He pulled a leg muscle and I put Stan in and he went great. I could not get him out of there.”

“I don’t care about individuals. It’s who helps the team. I have made mistakes regarding individuals. But when I put their names down on paper those are the ones I think will help the club.”

“I THINK Musial is the greatest ball player I have ever seen. I’d never do anything to embarrass him and I don’t feel I embarrassed him.”

**Records? Yost Can't Recall All He Owns**

By Associated Press  
Elder Yost is getting to the point where he may be forced to carry around in his wallet all his big league records.

"What records do you hold now?" is the question most asked of the new third baseman for the Los Angeles Angels.

"ALL I KNOW," says the 33-year-old athlete who went from the New York university campus to the Washington Senators in 1944, "is that I've led the American league in walks six times, have broken Pie Traynor's record for games at third base and that I am fourth in lifetime walks in the majors."

Yost was informed about his 2,270 putouts and 3,509 assists, both new American league marks.

"I didn't know about those," said the South Ozone Park, N. Y., resident.

Just because Yost has been around so long is no reason for anyone to anticipate his retirement.

"I'd like to make 2,000 hits," says Yost. "I figure to do that would mean playing at least three more seasons. I think I can do it."

**YOST FINISHED** the 1960 campaign—his second with Detroit—with 129 hits to put him five shy of the 1,800 mark. He has played 1,313 games at third base, a major league record, and with more than 1,500 walks he is fourth behind Babe Ruth, Ted Williams and Mel Ott.

Yost played 12 full seasons with the old Washington Senators. After the '58 season the Senators traded him to Detroit.

Last December the Tigers placed him on their list of 15 expendables and in the expansion draft he was quickly snatched by the new Angels.

Training in California will be a new experience for the popular Yost. His previous springs were spent in Florida at Orlando or Lakeland.

### After 13 Years Al Dark Knows His League

Many people helped San Francisco Giants' manager Alvin Dark in baseball. He played with so many big league clubs—six—and under so many successful managers that he was bound to pick up many of the game's finer points. But it was a front office man who in 1948 first-graded the infielder from Comanche, Okla., and Lake Charles, La. And it was the same man who last spring said: "Dark will make a fine manager some day."

**THAT MAN** was John Quinn, general manager of the last place Philadelphia team.

Two winters ago Quinn obtained Dark from the Cubs, for utility infield duty only.

When Eddie Sawyer quit the day before the Phils opened their National league season in Philadelphia, Quinn told Dark the score.

Quinn said he would never appoint a manager from the playing ranks, that his manager would first have to get minor league experience.

Dark didn't care to manage in the minors, so Quinn had no choice but to bring in Gene Mauch.

**BUT IT WAS** back in 1948, possibly in Bradenton, Fla., that Quinn was asked about a rookie being brought up to the Boston Braves from Milwaukee then in the American Association where shortstop Dark had batted .303 in his first full season of organized ball.

"Dark will make it," Quinn said in no uncertain terms. "If anyone in the country is the all-around athlete, the rookie we'll have at short-stop this year is that boy."

Quinn was never more correct about Dark making good at first asking—as a player. All Alvin did for the 1948 Braves was play 137 games and hit .322 for which he was named the National league rookie of the year.

As a New York Giant he got along with Leo Durocher for six years. He came to play, and he knew how to play.

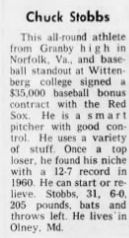

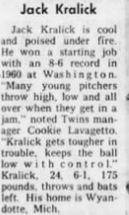

So you see many financial miles come out of the \$1.50.

My \$2.50 friend contributes 14 cents to taxes; my \$3 buddy is worth 18 cents to Uncle Sam.

As I said, I'm new here, but I hope we become well acquainted this summer.

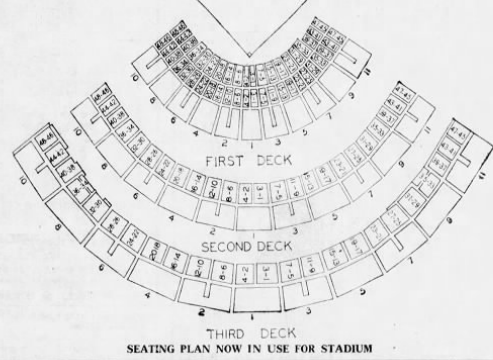

## Baseball Marches On-Photo-Electric Hits?

Harmon Killebrew, Twins slugger, is interested in a new batting machine called the "Bat-O-Matic". The machine, using photoelectric cells to register bat speed, impact timing and line of impact between ball and bat, is being produced by Ray Tanguay of Eugene, Ore. Tanguay plans to tour Florida this spring, hitting all baseball training camps. He will lease the machine to clubs interested. "It shows exactly where you're hitting the ball," said Killebrew. "The bat, with a mirror on the end, reflects every

swing, which is registered by various dials and needles. It tells you whether you are under-cutting or under-cutting the ball, whether you're hitting the ball out in front of the plate or are late on it. "I think the most value will come in making comparisons. When you're going good, you'll chart your swing with this machine. Then, when you hit a slump, you'll chart again. The comparison should help you correct whatever fault you have fallen into." All the baseball people in town for the "Welcome Twins" banquet at the Radisson took a look at Tanguay's "Bat-O-Matic" machine on display this week.

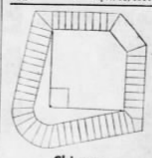

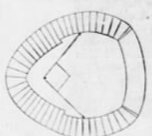

Like unusual mustards? Take your choice of smoky, wine or Dijon mustard. Fancy Reese jellies flavored with rosemary, sage, clove, cinnamon and orange, as well as sherry, bourbon and champagne sparkle next on that shelf, too!

There'll be a small break here, while we cross to the next counter. (We're still in the left hand aisle though). Look for the imported smoked crab and froglegs, the smoked eel, salmon, flams and rainbow trout from Denmark, the smoked sparrows from Japan. You'll find snails, too, from France, with the shells and dishes to serve them properly. From Mexico, iguana meat in mole sauce, whale meat from Japan. And here too, you'll find a very different item . . . bottled Sumner's English Beef Tea!

Let's pass on to exotic fruits in syrup: passion fruit, guava, papayas!

Now, that was on the left-hand counter. Next, we'll cross the aisle and come back toward the door, for imported hering, sardines and other Scandinavian foods. On this shelf too, fancy, clean grade A wild rice, Danish canned hams and sliced bacon.

Well, we're back near the door so let's cross to the farthest aisle. Now, look to your left! Cheeses to make a gourmet's dream come true! Imported Roquefort, Gorgonzola Swiss . . . and to serve with your cheese, little rounds or triangles of pumpernickel, baked in Berlin! (It's in a package, of course—how else?) You'll find Ricotta cheese there, too, imported from Italy for an especially elegant pizza!

Farther along, on the other side of the aisle toward the back of the store, we came to the tea and coffee section. You'll find teas with romantic names like Jasmine, Oolong, Tea of Capri (this last is mint-flavored). Among the coffees, there's El Gusto instant coffee from Panama City, French-style coffee with chicory, and espresso coffee.

Just space to mention some of the uncommon soups Witt's has for you: Au Gourmet green turtle consomme with sherry, snapper soup with sherry, Grosse and Blackwell's cock-o-leckie, and bean with sherry. Somewhere near there too, I saw something that was new to me—yellow rice seasoned with saffron.

That's the end of my notes, but those are just a few of the interesting foods I found at DOWNTOWN WITT'S.



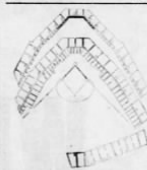
