Battery Hurt; Hit by Pitch

Minneapolis' Probs Ramos became a thinking pitcher Sunday to blank Cleveland 10-0.

Ramos tossed a six-shutter and won his seventh behind home runs from Bob Allison (No. 20), Ted Lepore (No. 4) and Harmon Killebrew (No. 30) before 24,478 fans at Metropolitan stadium.

THE TWIN victory was tempered only by the seventh-inning beating of catcher Earl Battery by a Bobby Locke fast ball. Battery was hospitalized with a fractured facial bone in the left cheek.

Ramos swung more brains than brains in hurling his first shutout since opening day in New York. He didn't try to stop any of the Indians with his fast ball, striking out only four and, more importantly, allowing none in.

Allison swung the biggest hit in the Twins' 11 hit, at least on Cleveland pitchers, dealing starter Barry Lutz for his first loss after nine straight triumphs. If nine straight triumphs, it was back at the hands of the Twins who previously over five seasons.

Locke blamed the errant pitch on the fact he was improperly warmed up.

Locke added: "It was meant to be a high, tight pitch, but Battery didn't move a muscle. He just stood there."

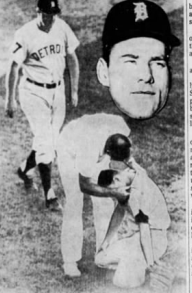
Locke expressed his hope Battery wasn't hurt badly. "I don't see how he could be hurt," he said. "I wasn't throwing a hard enough today to break a jaw of a pitcher."

Battery absorbed Locke's fast ball. "It wasn't trying to throw at me," the Twins receiver said from his hospital bed. "It was an inside fast ball which sailed in at me."

"I tried to roll with the pitch, but I couldn't get it," he said.

Reds Shake Slump, Slap Giants Twice

CINCINNATI (AP)—The Cincinnati Reds exploded out of a six-game losing streak Sunday with a home win, a 4-1 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals.

The twin triumphs enabled the Reds to extend their lead over the St. Louis Cardinals to a game and a half in the second place Los Angeles.

Frank Robinson, continuing his blistering hitting pace, had a homer in each game and extended his consecutive hitting streak to 18 games.

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KANSAS CITY, Mo.—(AP)—The Detroit Tigers took back first place from the New York Yankees by a half game and a percentage point with a double sweep over the Kansas City Athletics Sunday 6-0 and 11-1.

The nightcap was an old-fashioned slugfest with a total of 11 runs, 24 hits, 13 pitchers and seven errors, taking three hours and 34 minutes to finish—a record time for a nine-inning major league game.

Norm Cash drove in eight runs and the Tigers smashed a total of 27 hits in both games.

The Tigers suffered a cost by time when their manager Steve Boros collided with another player in the clubhouse during the second game and suffered a fractured left collarbone.

Boros reportedly will be out of action for at least a month. He was to remain in a Kansas City hospital overnight and fly back to Detroit today. A week ago Saturday the Tigers lost first place to the Yankees.

The nightcap developed in the manner of the wildest of years. The Tigers made it 15-9 in the fifth, and scored twice more in the sixth and were home free except for a four-run outburst by the A's in the eighth.

Green doubled off loser Bob Lusk after Don Budnik had singled and moved to second on a sacrifice. That tied the score. After 1-0 were one Jerry Geyer singled to right field and Green cut a two-run drive down the line to his plate ahead of catcher Elton Howard's tag.

The Yankees, who had wiped out four first leads in two previous games on John Hancock field in the sixth, moved from behind in the sixth on Howard's two-run homer to the centerfield bleachers.

Jim Paganoni and Frank Maloney each hit homers in the Boston cause.

Roger Maris increased his run-batted-in total to 87 when his errorless double in the third provided the other half of the Yankee scoring.
