WHAT IS A 'SAVE'?

A relief pitcher shall be credited with a 'save' only when his team is victorious and when he is not the winning pitcher of record.

No more than one relief pitcher shall be credited with a 'save' in any one game.

A relief pitcher shall not be credited with a 'save' unless he faces the tying or lead run during his tenure on the mound, except in the following situations:

- I. A relief pitcher shall be credited with a 'save' if he enters the game in the final inning with a two-run lead and proceeds to pitch a perfect
- 2. A relief pitcher shall be credited with a 'save' if he enters the game at any time with a threerun lead and pitches two or more innings and finishes the game while protecting the victory.

Generally, the 'save' would be awarded to the finishing pitcher. This would hold true except in a situation such as the following:

Twins leading Yankees, 4-3, in the seventh inning, and Al Worthington, who has been working in relief for the Twins, is withdrawn for a pinch-hitter during a rally in which the Twins score four runs to go ahead, 8-3. Ron Perranoski succeeds Worthington and finishes the game without allowing the tying run to come to the plate. Credit Worthington with a 'save,' since the tying run came to the plate during his tenure on the mound.

TWINS' TRAINER

GEORGE 'DOC' LENTZ is in his twenty-second season as the team's trainer. A native of Williamsport, Pa., he has trained teams at Dickinson Seminary and Catholic and George Washington Universities. For ten years, he also taught classes for trainers at George Washington. In fact, he still maintains his associate professorship there. He also served as head trainer of the Washington Redskins of the National Football League for 14 years, concluding with the 1961 season. Calvin R. Griffith, Twins' President

One of only two career baseball men currently owning and operating a club in major league baseball . . . San Francisco's Horace Stoneham is the other . . . president Calvin Griffith of the Twins was stung deeply by the team's near-miss in the 1967 American League pennant race.

As a result, he resolved to pull out all stops in an effort to avoid a similar calamity in 1968. Several older players were cleared from the club's roster at the conclusion of the '67 season, and in their places were added a number of bright, up-

and-coming young stars of the future.

A couple of roster spots, however, were left open in order to make it possible to draft a pair of experienced players at the selection session of the major league meetings in Mexico City in late November . . . a practice from which the Twins had abstained since selecting pitcher Bill Fischer in the 1963 draft at San Diego. This time, Mr. Griffith chose catcher Bruce Look, a four-year veteran of the Los Angeles Dodgers' organization, and outfielder Jim Holt, no. 2 hitter in the tough Carolina League last year for the Oakland Athletics' Peninsula club.

Later that day, however, the Twins' prexy negotiated the deal of the year in the major leagues, trading shortstop Zoilo Versalles and pitcher Jim Grant to the Dodgers for catcher John Roseboro and pitchers Bob Miller and Ron Perranoski . . . two

of the top relief hurlers in the majors.

In one fell swoop, therefore, Calvin had strengthened the two positions which had seemed to give the Twins the most concern in 1967 . . . catching and relief pitching.

It's true that in order to get something, you must give some-thing. And, Mr. Griffith is fully aware that he gave up a lot to get what he wanted. He feels, however, that the club has sufficient pitching depth to more than make up for the loss of Grant, and that, in Jackie Hernandez, the Twins have a shortstop who could prove to be every bit as valuable to the team as was Versalles. If not Hernandez, it could be any of several other fine shortstop prospects reporting to Orlando this spring. And

then, of course, there's always Cesar Tovar!

A native of Montreal, Quebec, Canada, Calvin, nee Calvin Robertson, moved to Washington, D. C., as a youngster with his family, following the death of his father. In Washington, he and his sister Thelma, now vice-president and co-owner of the Twins, were adopted by their uncle, the late Clark C. Griffith, Hall of Fame pitcher, co-founder of the American League, and owner of the Washington Senators baseball franchise at the time.

It wasn't long before Calvin became actively associated with the Senators, first as batboy for the pennant-winning aggregations of 1924 and '25. Later on, in 1935, his uncle assigned him to the club's Chattanooga Southern Association farm club as president and treasurer of the team. In 1938, he moved over to Charlotte, N. C., to handle the same capacities for the Sen-ators' Piedmont League affiliate. While there, he even had a whirl at managing the club.

In 1942, he returned to Washington as manager of the concessions operation at Griffith Stadium. He went on from there to gain experience as traveling secretary and public relations director, before assuming the post of administrative assistant to his uncle. When Mr. Griffith passed away on October 27, 1955, the well-grounded Calvin was elected president of the organ-

ization five days later.

Before embarking on his professional career, Calvin received his schooling at Staunton Military Academy, in Virginia, and at George Washington University, in the District of Columbia.

It was while he was at Charlotte, that he met the young lady who was to become his wife, the former Natalie Niven. The couple now has three children . . . daughters Corinne and Clare, and son Clark II, a Dartmouth graduate who's now following in the footsteps of his illustrious father as an administrative assistant in the Twins' organization.

The Griffiths make their home in Wayzata, Minn.

Assuming the reins of the Twins last June 9, Cal Ermer did a magnificent job in leading the club down to the last-day determination of the American League

championship.

In sixth place with a 25-25 record when Ermer took over, the Twins caught fire under the patient Southerner to play at a .589 clip the rest of the way. They took over first place on August 13, and remained at the top for all but ten days before the Boston Red Sox overtook

them on the final day of the season, October 1.

A 17-year veteran of the minor league managerial ranks, Cal broke into baseball as an 18-year-old infielder with the Griffith organization's Orlando team of the Florida East Coast League in 1942. When transporta-tion problems and the wartime ban on night ball in coastal cities caused the league to disband on May 14, Cal was shifted to the Jacksonville club of the South Atlantic League, and thence to Burlington, N. C., of the Bi-State League.

Following three years of military service, Cal returned to Orlando as a second baseman in 1946. In midseason of 1947, he took over as manager of the Charlotte, N. C., club, but returned to the playing ranks the next two seasons before settling permanently into a managerial role in 1950, at Orlando.

Married, and the father of two sons, Cal also has quite a background in soccer, having served as head soccer coach at the University of Baltimore for eight autumn seasons in the late '40's and early '50's.

Named 'Minor League Manager of the Year' for 1958 by The Sporting News, the national baseball weekly, Cal is intuitive and recourseful in game situations. CASE, George Washington

Born November 11, 1915, in Trenton, New Jersey. Height: 6 ft., 1 in. Weight: 190 lbs. Batted and threw righthanded. Married. Lives in Morrisville, Pennsylvania.

One of the great base-stealers of all time, George Case was added to the Twins' coaching staff for 1968 with the particular responsibility of assisting Twins' baserunners in capitalizing on their speed potential. A five-season major league leader in thefts . . . and six times in the American League . . . with a top of 61 in 1943, George is also a co-holder of the major league mark for the most hits in a doubleheader, getting nine against Philadelphia on July 4, 1940. After 11 years in the ma-jors, Case, a four-time All-Star selection, retired from the game to operate a sporting goods store in Trenton, N. J., in 1948. In 1950, he was named as head baseball coach at Rutgers University, a position he held through the 1960 season. With the formation of the new Washington franchise in 1961, George became a coach for the Senators under manager Mickey Vernon. With Vernon's departure in mid-1963, Case became a scout for the Nats until named as manager of their Hawaii farm club in 1965. He remained at the helm of the Islanders through the 1966 season, when he returned to scouting. The return was short-lived, however, as he was asked to take the reins of the Senators' York, Pa., farm of the Eastern League last June 27. In the spring of 1965, at the request of Washington general manager George Selkirk, George spent three weeks in Japan as a special spring training advisor to the Chunichi Dragons of the Japanese major leagues.

And, if Martin's success in working with Zoilo Versalles in 1965, Tovar in '66, and Carew last year is any criterion, out of the above-named players the former New York Yankee pennant-sparkplug is a good bet to come up with a player capable of shortstopping in the style established in the Upper Midwest by Versalles. A dedicated baseball man, Billy spent three years scouting for the Twins after retiring as a player in the spring of 1962. In between seasons, he's employed as a goodwill representative of the Minneapolis Brewing Co.

TWINS ON RECORD IN '67

The Minnesota Twins, as a team, tied one major league record, and participated in tying another major league mark and setting an American League standard during 1967. The big league mark tied by the club was their using of four catchers . . . Jerry Zimmerman, Russ Nixon, Hank Izquierdo and Earl Battey . . . in a 9-inning game against California at the Met, September 27. They also joined with Detroit in scoring the most runs, 15, ever tallied in the sixth-inning of a major league game, when the Tigers garnered 10 and the Twins 5, in a slugfest at the Met, June 13. The Minnesotans joined with Washington in recording the most strikeouts ever racked up in an American League game, 35, when Senator hurlers fanned 19, and Twin moundsmen 16, in their 20-inning marathon here, August 9.

Individually, Twin Cesar Tovar participated in the most games ever played by an American Leaguer in a season, 164. Zoilo Versalles established a new league mark for fewest putouts handled in a season by a shortstop appearing in 150 or more games, 229. And, Dean Chance set a new major league standard for most strikeouts by a

pitcher as a batter in a season, 58.

The last of the 300-game winners, Early Wynn imparted the same kind of competitive grit that he was famous for as a player into the Twins' pitching staff last year, with the result that Twins' hurlers, collectively, ranked second in the American League only to the vaunted staff of the Chicago White Sox. A big league hurler until he won his 300th game on July 13, 1963, Gus was a battler all the way during a record 23 seasons in the major leagues, with his crowning achievement being the Cy Young Award, which he received for leading the White Sox to the pennant with 22 victories in 1959. Possibly Wynn's most unique accomplishment came in 1950, however, when he led American League pitchers with an earned-run average of 3.20 . . . which stands as the highest league-leading ERA ever posted in the major leagues. Five times, Early won 20 or more games in a season, a feat surpassed by only a dozen big league pitchers in modern times, plus 15 major leaguers in the days prior to the formation of the American League in 1901. An avid outdoorsman, Gus serves as a representative of the Thunderbird Boat Corp., during the off-season.

Starting with a 5-for-5 day on May 8, against Washington, the slender young speedster, who was born on a train between Gatun and Ancon in the Panama Canal Zone, maintained an average at-or-above 300, until finally falling below the mark on September 12. Along the way, he compiled the team's longest hitting streak of the season, 15 games, from June 3-16. Although he didn't play high school baseball, Rod was spotted by Twins' scout Herb Stein while playing sandlot ball in New York City, where his family had moved during his teens. After batting .305 in the Florida Instructional League last fall, Rod became personally acquainted with many of the fans he'd made during the summer by touring Twinsville as a member of the club's wintertime public relations troupe. Again, he was a smash hit!

The American League's 'Comeback Player of the Year' for 1967, Dean Chance was the bellweather of the Twins' pitching staff throughout the campaign, joining the 20-victory circle for the second time in his 6-year major league career. In the process, he missed by just one of equaling Camilo Pascual's 1961 club strikeout record. But, undoubtedly, the high points of his season were the pair of no-hitters he authored. The first, unofficial since the game was terminated after 5 innings due to rain, was a perfect affair over the Boston Red Sox at the Met, August 6, 2-0. The other was officially registered in the Hall of Fame as he stopped the Indians in Cleveland, August 25, 2-1, with the Cleveland run counting in the first inning on two walks, an error and a wild pitch. Earlier in the season, on May 11, Dean stopped Kansas City on just one hit, a 4th-inning single by Danny Cater, as he blanked the A's, 8-0. Twice the junior circuit's starting pitcher in All-Star Game competition, Chance led the league in innings-pitched and complete games (18), and tied with Boston's Jim Lonborg for the most starting assignments (39). A cattle farmer during the off-season, he is also connected with a pair of Twin Cities business enterprises, the Home Juice Co., and the Golden Cue Billiard Parlor.

KILLEBREW, Harmon Clayton, Jr. 'Harm' 1B-3B No. 3

The major leagues' co-leader in homeruns in 1967, marking the third time he's achieved such honors in the majors and the fifth time he's paced the American League in his nine seasons as a big league regular, Harmon Killebrew now ranks 14th on the list of the greatest homerun hitters in the history of the game. During the past season, he moved up seven notches in this respect, passing the marks of such greats as Joe Adcock, Yogi Berra, Johnny Mize, Joe DiMaggio, Rocky Colavito, Ralph Kiner and Gil Hodges. Frank Robinson (403), one of six active players still ahead of Harm, and Duke Snider (407) are the only players within the Idaho slugger's sights in 1968. Besides homers in '67, Harm also tied with Baltimore's Brooks Robinson and Dave Johnson for league tops in sacrifice flies, with 8, and his 131 bases on balls were the most in the majors since Eddie Yost received 135 for Detroit in 1959. While Killebrew's homerun ratio of one for every 13.01 times at bat is second to the 11.76 ratio of the immortal Babe Ruth, it remains a fact that Harm's current total of homers is 24 greater than was Ruth's at age 31. A onetime student at the College of Idaho, in Caldwell, Killebrew placed third in the league's slugging race last year with a .558-figure . . . a category in which he led the circuit in 1963. An All-Star selection for five consecutive seasons, and in seven of his nine campaigns as a regular . . . and at three different positions . . . the personable Killebrew also does a top-level job during the season as host of a pre-game television show over Twins' outlet WTCN-TV.

Voted by his teammates as the Twins' most valuable player, Cesar Tovar's outstanding performance at six different positions was the single most contributing factor to the success of the team in 1967. So noteworthy were his efforts that they resulted in his receiving a most highly-deserved first-place vote in the American League's year-end Most Valuable Player poll. The diminutive Venezuelan established a new league record for most games played in a season, with only Maury Wills' 165-game season for the 1962 Los Angeles Dodgers standing between Tovar and the major league record. Cesar also led the circuit in times at bat, and paced the Twins with 19 stolen bases, a personal major league high for him. Although he had a 4-for-4 day against Washington on September 12, undoubtedly his biggest game came at California on May 21, when he belted a pair of homeruns and two doubles in six trips to pace the Twins to a 12-3 win over the Angels . . . the first time any Twin has ever gotten four extra-base hits in a single contest. In addition, his 12 total bases that day tied the club record in that category, set previously by Bob Allison and Harmon Killebrew when they hit three homeruns in a game . . . on May 17, 1963, and September 21, 1963, respectively. During the off-season, Tovar performs for his hometown Caracas club in the Venezuelan Winter League, batting .295 last winter.

TWINS ESTABLISHED NEW ATTENDANCE HIGHS IN '67

The year 1967 saw the Minnesota Twins set new club records, attendance-wise, both at home and on the road.

Their home draw of 1,483,547, over 76 playing dates, exceeded the club's previous home crowd standard by 20,279, eclipsing the 1,463,268 draw of the pennant-winning 1965 season.

On the road, in 71 openings, the Twins attracted 1,292,600 fans, an increase of 124,425 over their old road attendance record of 1,168,175, also set back in 1965.

Eddie Stanky's Chicago White Sox, who battled the Twins tooth-and-nail for first-place over the last three months of the season before the Boston Red Sox sneaked home with the bunting on the last day of the campaign, proved to be the top attraction at the Met throughout the year, drawing 242,339 persons in 9 dates, an average of 26,927 fans per opening. The Detroit Tigers, also involved in the American League's great 4-way dog-fight in '67, were the next most popular club to appear in Minnesota. The Tigers drew 209,448 persons in 9 outings . . . 23,272 per game.

Strangely, the champion Red Sox brought just 163,643 fans out to the Met during the season, ranking only fifth on the Twins' attendance totem pole. The New York Yankees, perennial Metropolitan Stadium attendance champs, although lacking the lustre of former years, still maintain their appeal, finishing third among A.L. clubs here in 1967.

Away from home, the Twins proved most attractive in California, where 236,807 fans turned out to see them meet the Angels on 9 occasions in Anaheim.
