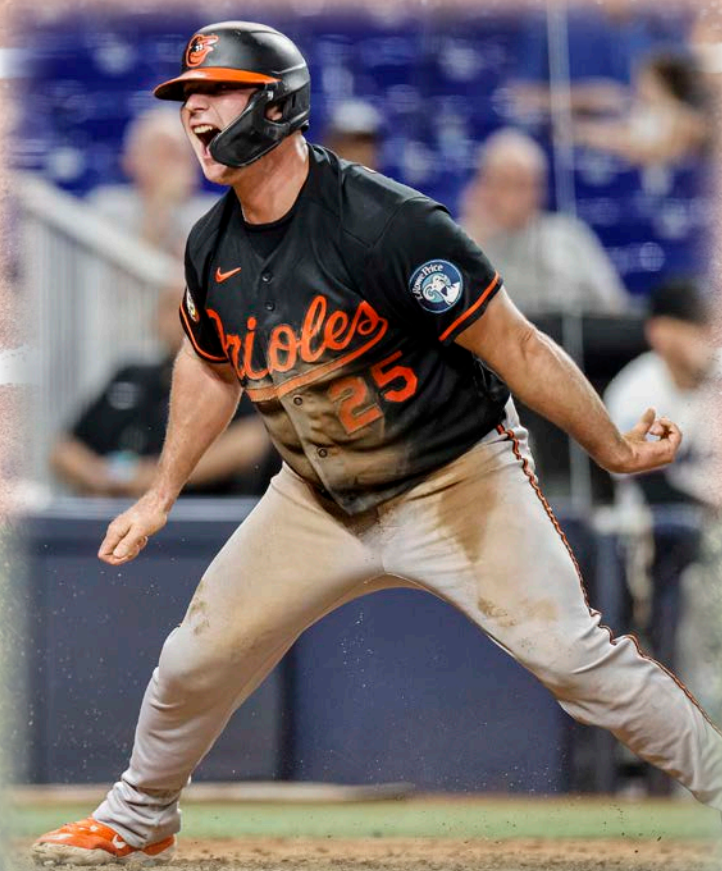




MAJOR LEAGUE BASEBALL WEEKLY NOTES

May 7, 2026





STREAKING

Entering play on Thursday, Mickey Moniak of the Colorado Rockies leads Major League Baseball with an 18-game hitting streak, while Nick Kurtz of the Athletics has reached base safely in 30 consecutive games.

Moniak is hitting .371 (26-for-70) with six homers, seven doubles, a triple, six walks, 14 runs scored, a stolen base, a .757 slugging percentage, a .429 on-base percentage and a 1.186 OPS during the current stretch. It is tied for the longest hitting streak of his career, matching an 18-game streak in July 2023 as a member of the Los Angeles Angels. It is the longest hitting streak by a Rockies player since Brendan Rodgers hit in 20 consecutive games from May 9-June 2, 2022. Moniak's streak is the second-longest hitting streak this season behind only Ildemaro Vargas' 24-game streak for the Arizona Diamondbacks, which snapped on May 1st. There has been at least one hitting streak of 20 games in every season since at least 1990.

Kurtz is batting .282 (31-for-110) with five homers, 17 RBI, five doubles, 31 walks, 16 runs scored, three stolen bases, a .440 on-base percentage and a .904 OPS during his streak. It is the longest on-base streak of his career and the longest on-base streak by an Athletics player since Matt Chapman reached in 30 consecutive games between July 11-August 17, 2018. If Kurtz extends the streak to 31 games, it will be the longest by an A's player since Jack Cust reached safely in 40 straight games from August 26, 2008-April 18, 2009 and the longest in a single season since Mark Ellis reached in 32 consecutive games from August 16-September 19, 2007. Kurtz, who turned 23 on March 12th, has the longest on-base streak for a player aged 23-or-younger since Gunnar Henderson reached base safely in 36 consecutive games for the Baltimore Orioles between May 2-June 29, 2024.

Kurtz drew a walk in 20 consecutive games from April 9th-May 2nd, tying Barry Bonds for the second-longest streak since walks have been recorded (1910 in NL, 1913 in AL). Roy Cullenbine holds the Major League record, drawing a walk in 22 consecutive games with the Tigers during the 1947 season.



CHICAGO CARDIACS

Following their win today, the Chicago Cubs are riding a nine-game winning streak, which included walk-off victories in each of their first three games against the Cincinnati Reds. The Cubs have six walk-off wins, pacing the Majors, and their six walk-off wins through 37 team games are Chicago's most since 1996. Overall, Chicago has won 15 consecutive games at Wrigley Field.

The Cubs are the first team to win three consecutive games in walk-off fashion since the Miami Marlins on June 18-21, 2024. It is the first time Chicago accomplished the feat since June 18-20, 2009. Additionally, it was the fourth time in franchise history that the Cubs won three consecutive games against the same opponent via a walk-off, joining August 16-18, 1932 (vs. Boston Braves); August 28-31, 1932 (vs. New York Giants); and September 27-28, 1943 (vs. New York Giants).

Chicago's current nine game winning streak is their second-longest of the season behind a 10-game winning streak from April 14th-24th. Overall, they have gone 19-3 since starting the 10-game streak on April 14th, marking the best record in Baseball during the stretch.

It is the first time the Cubs have recorded multiple winning streaks of at least nine games within a single season since 1935 when they racked up 11 wins in a row from July 23rd-31st and then won 21 straight from September 4th-27th. Per Sarah Langs of MLB.com, Chicago is the seventh club in MLB history with multiple winning streaks of at least nine games within their first 38 decisions of a season. The Cubs joined the 1955 Dodgers; 1941 Cardinals; 1918 Giants; 1912 Giants; 1887 St. Louis Browns; and 1880 Chicago White Stockings, who are now the Cubs.

The Cubs current 15-game winning streak at home is now the second-longest in franchise history within a single season, and their longest since a 14-game streak from May 18-June 22, 2008. Chicago set a franchise record with 18 consecutive home wins from September 4-22, 1935. It is the longest home winning streak by any club since the New York Yankees won 15 consecutive games in the Bronx from May 24-June 23, 2022. The last club to win more than 15 consecutive games at home was the Houston Astros, winning 18 straight in 2004.



UNBLEMISHED

Entering play on Thursday, five starting pitchers and one additional relief pitcher have begun the 2026 season with an unbeaten record through at least five starts. The group includes Justin Wroblecki and Tyler Glasnow of the Los Angeles Dodgers; Edward Cabrera of the Chicago Cubs; Eduardo Rodriguez of the Arizona Diamondbacks; Max Meyer of the Miami Marlins; and PJ Poulin, who has been used as an opener five times by the Washington Nationals with both of his wins coming as a reliever.

Wroblecki is the fifth starting pitcher since at least 1913 to open a season with wins in each of his first five starts, while allowing two-or-fewer combined runs. He joins José Soriano (1 R in 2026); Fernando Valenzuela (1 R in 1981); Al Benton (2 R in 1945); and Hall of Famer Walter Johnson (1 R in 1913). Along with Emmet Sheehan, who went 2-0 across his first five starts of the season, it is the fifth time in the last seven seasons that at least three Dodgers starters have been unbeaten through at least their first five starts of the season. Los Angeles also achieved the feat in 2020 (3 SP), 2021 (6 SP), 2022 (6 SP) and 2025 (3 SP).

Cabrera's seven starts without a loss are the most by a Cubs starter since Colin Rea in 2025. He is aiming to become the first Cubs starter to not take a loss within his first eight starts of the year since Shota Imanaga and Javier Assad went undefeated in their first nine and 10 starts of 2024, respectively.

Rodriguez's seven starts without a loss are the most by a Diamondbacks starter since Merrill Kelly went undefeated across his first 12 starts in 2024. Meyer's seven-game streak is the longest to begin a season for the Marlins since Caleb Smith went undefeated across his first seven starts of 2019. José Fernández was the last Marlins pitcher to remain undefeated through at least their first eight starts of a season, going 6-0 across his first 10 starts of 2015.

DEVELOPS ON THE DIAMOND

HTOWN REUNITES: On July 11, 2025, Commissioner's Cup, Breakthrough Series, Houston Astros Nike RBI and Astros Youth Academy alumni Brice Matthews made his Major League debut with the Astros. Less than a year later, 2017 DREAM Series, 2016-18 Houston Astros Nike RBI program and Astros Youth Academy alumni Cameron Foster made his Major League debut with the Baltimore Orioles on April 16th, joining Matthews as the second Astros Youth Academy alumni to debut in the Majors. On April 30th, the Astros and Orioles finished off the final game of their three game set in Baltimore. In the fifth inning with Foster on the mound, Matthews stepped up to the plate, ripping an infield single off of Foster. Prior to the game, two two Astros Youth Academy met up with each other and Duane Stelly, the director of the Astros Youth Academy. Matthews, who is three years younger than Foster, speaking about his time at the Academy said, "He was always good to me. Those older guys at the Academy were good to all of us and helped us with anything we needed." Foster said, "Those guys kind of put me in the right direction, and it's been cool. I owe a lot to the Urban Youth Academy."



STRAIGHT OUTTA COMPTON: When the Seattle Mariners visited the Atlanta Braves on Monday, it was a reunion of sorts for Braves designated hitter Dominic Smith and Mariners shortstop J.P. Crawford. Smith and Crawford who are both alum of the 2009-10 Compton Nike RBI program and the Compton Youth Academy grew up competing together and were even drafted five spots apart in the first round of the 2013 Draft. Before the game, the two Nike RBI and Youth Academy alum took a moment to speak with Harold Reynolds and Greg Amsinger on Ballpark Cam to discuss their time together (see the full interview [here](#)). Smith said, "We were just two young kids who just loved baseball and opportunity came when MLB put that academy right there in our backyard and we went there and they took us all over the world...we're very blessed to have that in our backyard and just so thankful." And, "The Urban Youth Academy took care of us since we were young kids and provided us with the opportunity to travel the world and better our lives in this game."



STATCAST LEADERBOARD: Breakthrough Series and Hank Aaron Invitational alumni Nasim Nuñez and Breakthrough Series and Nike RBI alumni Chandler Simpson have been contributing to their respective teams in more ways than just at the plate, and filling up the statcast leaderboard in the process. On the basepaths, Nuñez and Simpson rank amongst the best in the game with Nuñez ranking tied for fourth (29.8 ft/sec) and Simpson ranking tied for seventh (29.5 ft/sec) among all players in sprint speed. Simpson's 3.97 seconds getting from home to first leads MLB and Nuñez's 4.13 seconds is tied for seventh fastest in the Majors. The Develops alum's speed has translated to creating runs for their teams, with Nuñez's baserunning run value of three tying Detroit's Kevin McGonigle for the highest mark in the league, and Simpson's baserunning run value of one making him tied for third most in the league. In the field, their impact is seen just as much as it is on the basepaths. Simpson's six outs above average rank tied for the third most among all players, and Nuñez's three rank tied for the sixth most in the Majors. Simpson's fielding run value of four is tied for the sixth highest mark in MLB and Nuñez's fielding run value of three is tied for the seventh highest mark.



BRAAADEN MONTGOMERY: On Saturday, Breakthrough Series, Hank Aaron Invitational and DREAM Series alumni Braden Montgomery was promoted from the Double-A Birmingham Barons to the Triple-A Charlotte Knights in the Chicago White Sox organization. The promotion comes following the switch hitter slashing .313/.429/.606 with six homers, 22 RBI, five doubles, three triples, 212 walks and two stolen bases across 27 contests with the Double-A Club. The Des Moines, Iowa native recorded a walk in his first Triple-A contest and connected for his first Triple-A hit in yesterday's game.





2026 DRAFT RECAP

On May 4th, the new homes of the 17 collegiate athletes who were given golden tickets were revealed. The draft order was chosen based on final standings from last season, with the Carolina Blaze selecting first, followed by the Texas Volts. The two new teams, Oklahoma City Spark and Portland Cascade drafted in the middle of the order, alternating the third and fourth pick each round. The runner-up Bandits picked fifth and the reigning champion Utah Talons had the final pick. Drafted athletes must first complete their college eligibility prior to signing with their new AUSL team. On ESPN2, AUSL Commissioner Kim Ng stepped up to the podium and announced the first overall pick, Karlyn Pickens. Overall, six pitchers and 11 position players were selected, spanning 13 schools and five collegiate conferences. See below for the full draft and video:

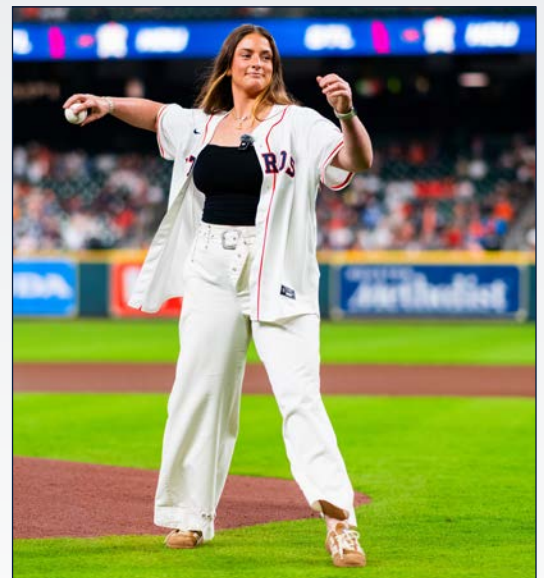

NEW SEASON, NEW TEAMS

The inaugural AUSL season, which ended with the Talons capturing the league championship and Bandits infielder Erin Coffel taking home league MVP honors, exceeded all expectations. The league soldout 24 games, merchandise sales topped \$1 million, the Championship Series averaged 230,000 viewers on ESPN, and the league received over 237 million social media impressions and 450,000 new followers gained. In October, AUSL and ESPN inked a multiyear deal, solidifying ESPN, which will carry 50 exclusive games as well as the best-of-three Championship Series, as the home of the league.

Building on the immense success of the AUSL's inaugural season, the league wasted no time upgrading. New in the 2026 season: home stadiums and two new teams. Beginning on June 9th, the Oklahoma City Spark and Portland Cascade will join the existing Carolina Blaze, Chicago Bandits, Texas Volts and Utah Talons for the AUSL's first six-team season. The Blaze will call Smith Family Stadium in Durham, North Carolina home, while the Chicago bandits will play at The Stadium at the Parkway Bank Sports Complex in Rosemont, Illinois, The Spark will host games at Tom Heath Field at Oklahoma Christian University in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, the Cascade will play at Hillsboro Ballpark in Hillsboro, Oregon, the Volts will play at Dell Diamond in Round Rock, Texas and the Talons will play home games at Dumke Family Stadium at University of Utah in Salt Lake City, Utah.

A number of AUSL players have thrown out first pitches at MLB games in the past weeks, Sharlize Palacios (today @ SD) still to come. The AUSL and MLB will host a media day on Friday, May 8th at MLB's headquarters in New York.

WELCOME TO THE SHOW

Since April 30th, 12 players have made their Major League debut, including nine pitchers and three position players.

There have now been 72 players to make their Major League debut this season, including 46 pitchers and 26 position players.

- 24-year-old Jesús Rodríguez, the San Francisco Giants 18th best prospect, per MLB Pipeline made his debut on Monday against the San Diego Padres at Oracle Park. The La Victoria, Venezuela native has tallied four hits, a homer, two RBI and a run scored through his first three career games. In Giants franchise history, the righty batter became one of eight to record at least four hits and a homer while batting .444 or higher through their first three career games.
- 25-year-old Jake Bennett, the Boston Red Sox sixth-best prospect, per MLB Pipeline made his debut on Friday against the Houston Astros at Fenway Park. The Tulsa, Oklahoma native earned the win in his first Major League outing, firing 5.0 innings, allowing just one run on five hits with two walks and three strikeouts. With his winning effort, the southpaw became one of 10 in Red Sox franchise history and the first since Anthony Ranaudo in 2014 to earn a win while allowing five-or-less hits and one-or-less earned runs in a debut outing.

Overall, the Chicago White Sox pace the Majors with eight players making their debut followed by the Boston Red Sox with seven and the Miami Marlins with five. The teams with four players making their debut include the Toronto Blue Jays, Milwaukee Brewers, Cleveland Guardians and Minnesota Twins. The Baltimore Orioles, Philadelphia Phillies and Texas Rangers have seen three players make their Major League debut while the Los Angeles Angels, Houston Astros, Atlanta Braves, St. Louis Cardinals, Seattle Mariners, Pittsburgh Pirates, San Francisco Giants and Detroit Tigers have had two players make their debut. The teams with one player making their debut this season include the Arizona Diamondbacks, Chicago Cubs, Los Angeles Dodgers, New York Mets, Washington Nationals, Tampa Bay Rays, Cincinnati Reds, Colorado Rockies, Kansas City Royals, San Diego Padres and New York Yankees. The Athletics are the lone team to not have a player debut yet this year.

ABS OVERVIEW

OVERVIEW

MLB introduced the Automated Ball-Strike (ABS) Challenge System powered by T-Mobile beginning with the 2026 season. The system will rely on the same Hawk-Eye tracking technology that fuels MLB's Statcast data. *What to know about the challenge system:*

- Only batters and pitchers/catchers may initiate a challenge. Managers, coaches and other players may not be involved.
- Each team starts the game with two challenges. Teams will lose the ability to challenge after they do so incorrectly twice. Teams will start each extra inning with a challenge regardless of whether they have already exhausted their challenges in the first nine innings.
- The ABS zone is set as follows: The width is 17 inches, identical to home plate. The top of the zone is set at 53.5% of a player's measured height without cleats. The bottom is set at 27% of the player's measured height. The strike zone is captured as the ball passes through the middle of the plate, not the front.
- In MLB, challenges will not be permitted when a position player is pitching.

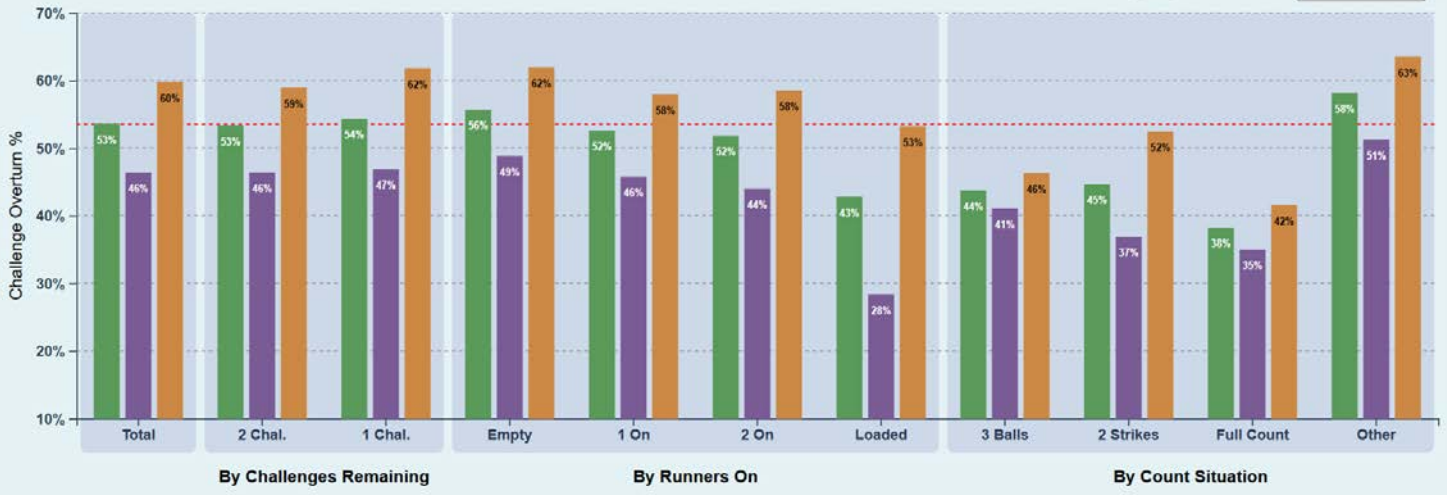
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ABS Overturn% Breakdown 2026 – MLB, Regular Season

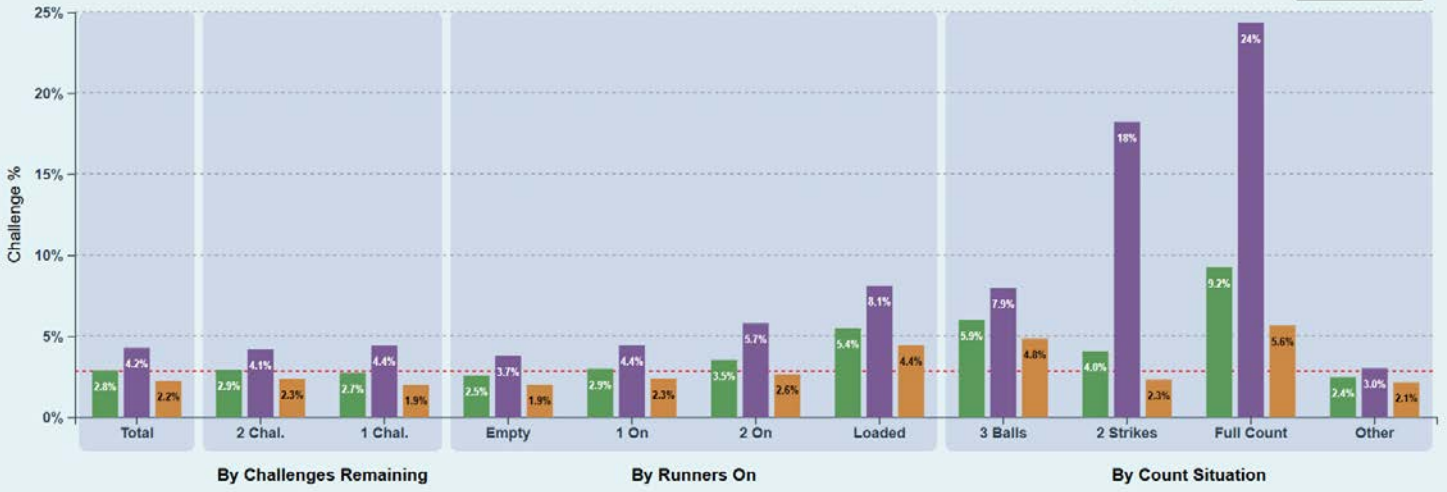

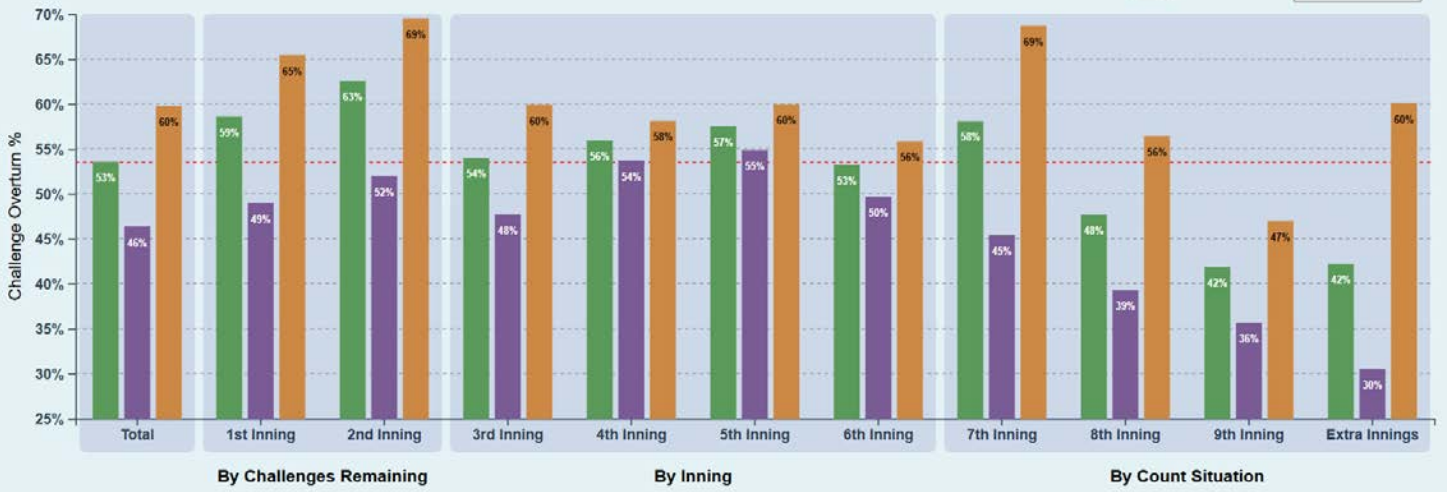

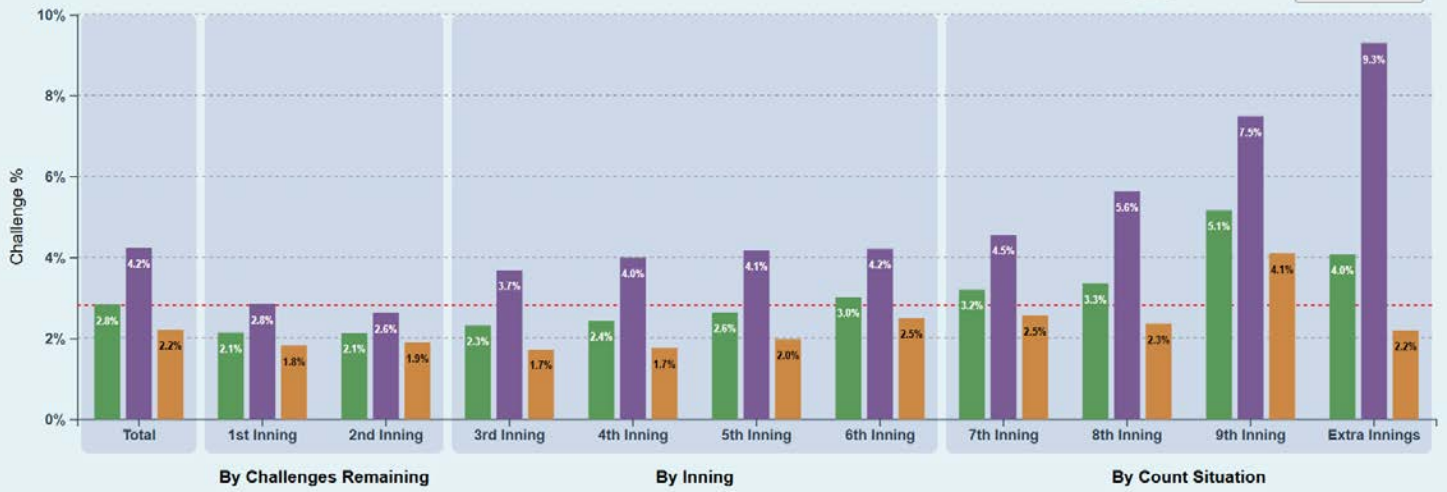

ABS Challenge% Breakdown 2026 – MLB, Regular Season

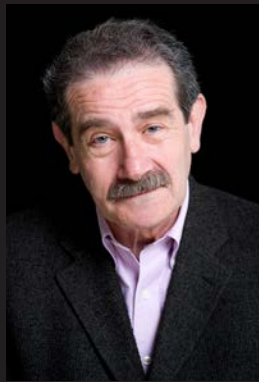

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AMERICA'S NATIONAL GAME

I have loved baseball as long as I can remember, since I was a kid flipping cards against the curbside wall of my apartment house in the Bronx. Then came following the Brooklyn Dodgers ... especially Jackie Robinson and Duke Snider. I was ten when the 1958 season opened, with a Dodgers' loss on the road, in San Francisco of all places. I stuck with those transplanted Dodgers ... what did I know about baseball or its history? I couldn't very well root for the Yankees and I hated Walter O'Malley.

Advocates for O'Malley and Horace Stoneham, owner of the Giants would later say that a regional pastime did not truly become national until those teams moved west. I too came to see the formerly despised one as baseball's version of Johnny Appleseed. The transplant of the Dodgers and Giants was a harbinger for MLB's expansion from 16 teams (in 11 cities, none west of St. Louis) in 1903-1952 to today's 30.

So, who was Walter O'Malley?

In 1941 George McLaughlin, president of the Brooklyn Trust Company, which held the Dodgers' considerable loans, appointed O'Malley as the club's attorney.

Under president Larry MacPhail, the Dodgers had become competitive but their finances were still in disarray; by 1944 the franchise was in the black. When stock held by the Ebbets and McKeever families was made available in 1945, O'Malley, general manager Branch Rickey, and John L. Smith (president of Pfizer Chemical), each ended up with 25 percent of the franchise.

Rickey had baseball knowledge on his side, but O'Malley had Smith (and thus the money). When Smith died in 1950, his widow decided to sell. By prior agreement the stock had to be offered to both O'Malley and Rickey, but the latter's funding was insufficient.

Once O'Malley had control of the club, the "Rickey people" were pushed out. Ebbets Field may have been cozy and lovable, but it could only hold 31,902 fans in a neighborhood that was imperiled amid a middle-class exodus to the suburbs. By 1956 the New York City government, not aware of how serious O'Malley was about creating a privately owned stadium, made two counterproposals. The first involved a site at Brooklyn's Parade Grounds. The second was at Flushing Meadow in Queens, where Shea Stadium was later built. O'Malley wasn't interested.

After the season O'Malley secretly visited Los Angeles, looking for an acceptable site. He found it in a place called Chavez Ravine, a few minutes' drive from the downtown area. Stoneham was also eager to leave New York, and fainted toward Minneapolis-St. Paul, where the Giants had a farm club. (The Dodgers, meanwhile, had swapped their Fort Worth franchise with the Cubs for theirs in L.A., which included Wrigley Field.)

On October 7 the Los Angeles City Council voted to acquire Chavez Ravine for Wrigley, a minor-league jewel built in 1925. The next day O'Malley announced that the Brooklyn Dodgers were no more. His team took temporary quarters at the huge Los Angeles Coliseum until Dodger Stadium opened in 1962.

The Polo Grounds was crumbling and the neighborhood around it was in decline. New York baseball fans were devastated, but calamity provided opportunity: O'Malley's old nemesis Branch Rickey combined with such folks as Bill Shea and Joan Payson to announce a rival Continental League, never formed, as a stalking horse for MLB expansion and a return of National League (NL) baseball to New York.

Of the eight proposed Continental cities, only one has yet to receive an MLB invitation: Atlanta, Buffalo, Dallas-Fort Worth, Denver, Houston, Minneapolis-St. Paul, New York, and Toronto. Rickey's subterfuge created expansion to ten teams in the American League in 1961 and ten more in the National League of 1962. By 1969 balance was restored with 12 teams in each circuit.

Fleeing New York, O'Malley and Stoneham may not have known that MLB's first expansion of the century had nearly been forestalled because Ban Johnson, head of the Western League, could not get into New York. Each time he tried, politicians drove streets through his proposed sites.

In 1900, the NL's magnates, in possession of a twelve-team league, were persuaded to reduce its size to eight. This created fertile ground for a rival league. Johnson renamed his Western League the American League (AL). Chicago replaced St. Paul for 1900, in a move by club president Charles Comiskey, but the AL of 1900 is today regarded as a minor league because it had no representation in the cities of the East.

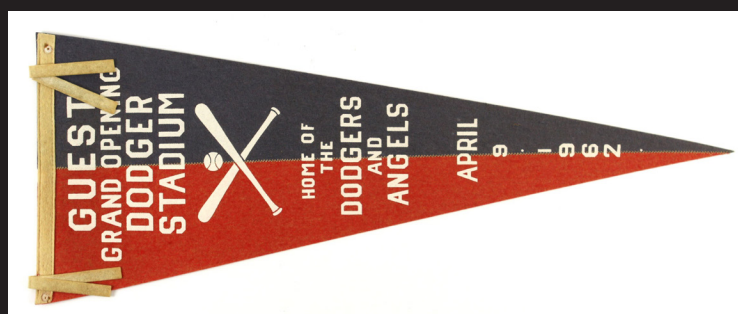
In 1901, however, the Philadelphia Athletics, an original NL franchise of 1876, were reborn as an AL entrant, as were Boston and Washington. By mid-1902 Johnson saw his opening to enter New York: the expulsion of Baltimore's owners.

On July 17 the Orioles, left with only five players in a move that was engineered by suspended third baseman and manager John McGraw, forfeited a game to the St. Louis Browns and thus their franchise to the league. Baltimore was forced to borrow players from other teams so it could complete its schedule. Johnson had promised McGraw that he would manage an AL club in New York, if that ever happened. But McGraw learned that Johnson was offering the same deal to Clark Griffith, a Comiskey pal. On July 19 McGraw, the former Oriole helmsman, managed his first of 4,373 games for the New York Giants. Let McGraw tell the story:

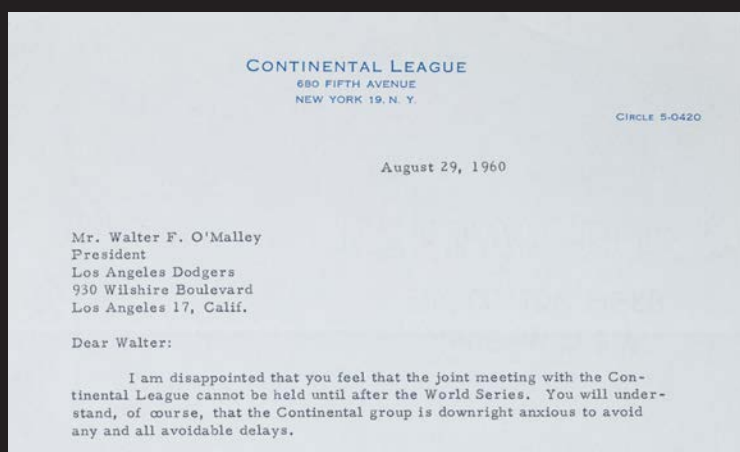
Do you want to know why I left Baltimore, and the American League, in 1902? Well, I'll give you the real story. The move to shift the Orioles to New York had been contemplated for some time. In fact, I did much of the ground work, built up the contacts, scouted around for grounds, and was to get a piece of the club. Naturally, I assumed I would be manager. Then I suddenly learned that I no longer figured in Johnson's New York plans and that he was preparing to ditch me at the end of the 1902 season. So, I acted fast. If he planned to ditch me, I ditched him first, and beat him to New York....

The rest is history. The major leagues had no further movement of franchises until 1953.

Circling back to the beginning, I saw plenty of Mets games at the Polo Grounds in 1962 but, boyishly, did not give up my hope for a Dodgers return until August 26, 1965. By midgame I found myself rooting for New York's Tug McGraw, at that time a starting pitcher, to defeat Sandy Koufax of Los Angeles. The die was cast.



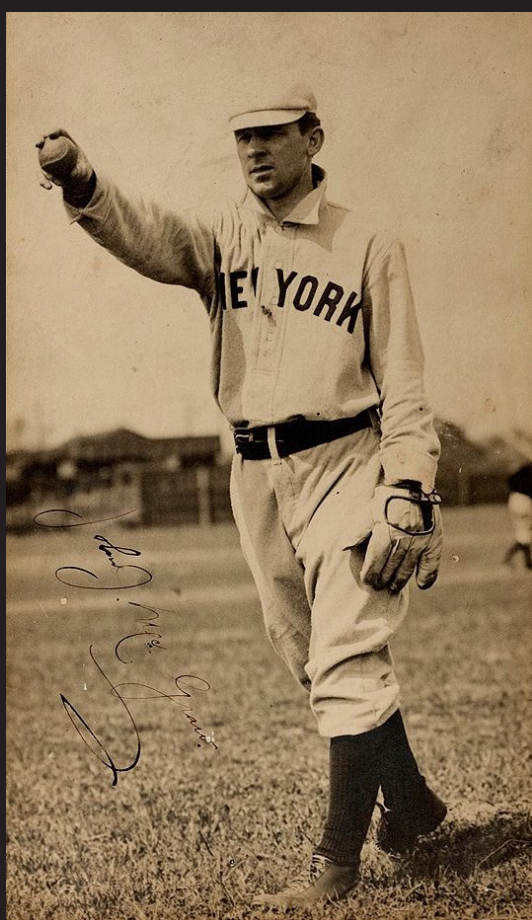
Dodger Stadium opens, April 9, 1962. It now MLB's third oldest park.

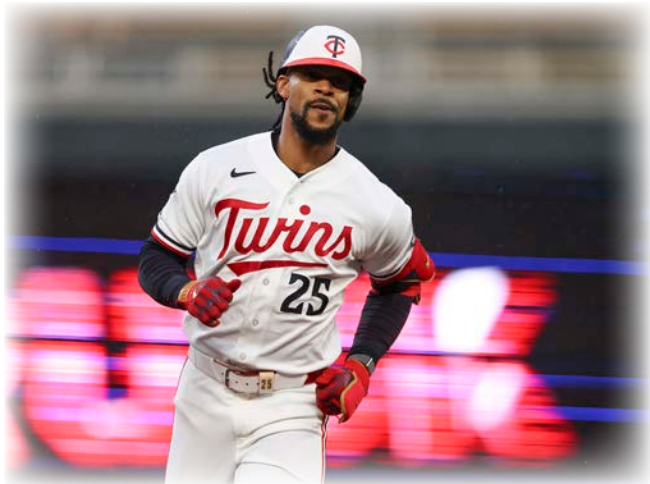
WEEKLY AWARDS

First baseman Alec Bureson of the St. Louis Cardinals was selected the National League Player of the Week, and center fielder Byron Buxton of the Minnesota Twins was named the American League Player of the Week.



PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Bureson won his first career award, marking the first honor for the Cardinals since Nolan Gorman won on May 22, 2023. Buxton earned his third career honor after previously winning on August 28, 2017 and June 13, 2022. It is the first award for Minnesota since Luke Keaschall won on August 11th of last season and the first award by a Twins outfielder since Buxton's most recent award in 2022. Buxton is the sixth player to win at least three awards as a member of the Twins, joining Kent Hrbek (4x); Hall of Famer Joe Mauer (4x); Kirby Puckett (4x); and Rod Carew (3x); and Johan Santana (3x).

SARAH'S FAVORITE NOTES OF THE WEEK

I'm Sarah Langs, a researcher for MLB.com, and I'm honored to have this space to share some of my favorite notes to wrap up each week of this wonderful sport.

NOBODY BEATS THE MIZ: Jacob Misorowski was back at it on Friday with his high velocity. He threw 43 pitches at 100 mph or faster, the third-most by a pitcher in a game under pitch tracking (2008), behind 47 from Hunter Greene on Sept. 17, 2022 and 44 from Greene on March 30, 2023. Misorowski now has 18 career pitches of at least 102 mph including playoffs, six more than any other starter under tracking. He even threw a pitch 103.0 mph, the fourth-fastest by a starter under tracking including playoffs, behind 103.2 mph and 103.1 mph from Jordan Hicks on July 12, 2022 as an opener and 103.1 mph from Justin Verlander in 2011 ALCS Game 5.

M&MS: Friday was already the seventh time this season that Munetaka Murakami and Colson Montgomery homered in the same game. That's the most by any teammate duo in their team's first 35 games of a season in MLB history, and it was only game 32, according to the Elias Sports Bureau. They broke a tie at six with 1994 COL Andres Galarraga - Ellis Burks, 1980 PHI Mike Schmidt - Greg Luzinski and 1956 NYY Mickey Mantle - Yogi Berra.

WALK THIS WAY: The Pirates drew seven consecutive walks in the second inning on Saturday, tying a MLB record, per Elias. It had happened twice previously: by the Braves against the Pirates on May 25, 1983 in the third inning and by the White Sox against the Senators on Aug. 28, 1909 in the second inning.

MULTI-HOMER MICKEY: Mickey Moniak recorded his fourth multi-homer game of the season on Sunday in the Rockies' 35th game. That is tied for the second-most multi-homer games through a team's first 35 games of a season in MLB history, trailing only 1959 Harmon Killebrew (five). Moniak tied 2001 Carlos Delgado, 1976 Dave Kingman, 1969 Reggie Jackson, 1968 Frank Howard, 1964 Killebrew and 1951 Gil Hodges.

DOMINANCE: The Yankees swept the Orioles in a four-game series that ended on Monday. They won each game by at least five runs. It is the third time they won every game of a series of at least four games by five or more runs in franchise history. They also did this in 1947 vs the Red Sox and 1939 at the Browns.

HE HAS POWER: With another homer on Monday, Munetaka Murakami's first 14 MLB extra-base hits were home runs. That extended the longest such streak to start a player's MLB career since at least 1900. The prior longest was 10, by 2016 Dae-ho Lee, per Elias. He hit his first MLB double later in the game, ending the streak. In addition to being the longest to start a career, it's also the second-longest streak to start a season in that span, behind only 1955 Eddie Robinson (first 15).

SHOTIME: Shohei Ohtani made his sixth pitching start of the season on Tuesday, which was also his 20th with the Dodgers. His 2.04 ERA in his starts with the Dodgers is the third-lowest through a pitcher's first 20 starts with the franchise since earned runs became official in the National League in 1912. He trails 1915-16 Larry Cheney (1.37) and 1918 Burleigh Grimes (1.73).

STING(Y) RAYS: The Rays have allowed three runs or fewer in 13 consecutive games entering Thursday. That is tied with the 2022 Astros, 2014 Mariners, 2013 Royals and 2002 Diamondbacks for the second-longest single-season streak in the Wild Card era (1995). Only the 2010 Giants at 18 straight have a longer run.

GO CUBS GO!: The Cubs won their first three games of the series against the Reds in walk-off fashion. It was the fourth time they won three consecutive games, all in a walk-off, against the same opponent in franchise history, per Elias. They also did this in 1943 vs the Giants, 1932 vs the Giants and 1932 vs the Braves.

CURRENT IRONMAN: Matt Olson has played 820 consecutive games entering Friday, dating to May 2, 2021. His streak is the 11th-longest in MLB history. The only other streaks of at least 700 consecutive games to begin in the divisional era (1969) are, of course, 1982-98 Cal Ripken Jr. (2,632 games), as well as 1975-83 Steve Garvey (1,207), 2000-07 Miguel Tejada (1,152), 1978-83 Pete Rose (745) and 1981-86 Dale Murphy (740).

LINE DRIVES

POWER SURGE: The Reds have hit 28 homers over their last 13 games (since 4/21 at TB), second-most in MLB during that time, behind only NYY (29). The Reds' 50 home runs this season are tied with the Dodgers for third most all Major League teams, behind the Yankees (57) & Braves (54). Their 50 homers this season are also tied for their ninth-most through the first 37 games of a campaign in club history, the most since the 2021 team had 54 homers through its first 37 contests. They have hit multiple homers in a game 15 times this season, tied with the Braves for the fourth-most instances in MLB, behind the Cubs (17), Yankees (17), and White Sox (16). Of the Reds' 153 runs scored this season, 76 have come on homers (49.7%), second to only the White Sox for the highest rate in the Majors.

SALVY SPLASHES: Salvador Perez hit his fifth HR of the season and 308th of his career on April 28 in Sacramento. The Royals Captain is nine homers shy of matching Hall of Famer George Brett (317) for the club's all-time home run record. When Salvy catches Brett, he will become only the third active player to own his current team's all-time home run record, and will join Mike Trout (415 with the Angels) and Manny Machado (199 with the Padres). Salvy has 134 HR at Kauffman Stadium, just two shy of tying Brett (136) for the most in the 54-year history of this park.

THE LEFT-HANDED MASHERS: In the Cubs last 23 games dating to April 12, their left-handed batters are hitting .295 (88-for-298) with 20 doubles, four triples, 15 home runs, 51 RBI and a .938 OPS. Their .916 OPS, .540 SLG and .388 OBP are all highest in the majors, while their .295 avg. is third. Moisés Ballesteros is batting .33 (23-for-69) with five doubles, six home runs, 16 RBI, a .397 OBP and a 1.064 OPS in his last 25 games with a plate appearance since April 7. Michael Busch in 15 games since April 21 is batting .316 (18-for-57) with five doubles, one triple, three home runs, 17 RBI and a 1.033 OPS. Pete Crow-Armstrong has hit safely in 12 of his last 15 games since April 21, batting .296 (16-for-54) with two doubles, one triple, three home runs, 10 RBI and an .904 OPS.

PEN PALS: Yankees relievers allowed only one hit over 5.0 scoreless innings on Wednesday vs. Texas (two BB, seven K). They have allowed only one run over their last 18.1 innings (since the seventh inning on 5/2 vs. Baltimore). They have posted a 2.13 ERA (55.0IP, 13ER) and 57K over their last 18 games (since 4/17). They rank third in the Majors in ERA (3.22, third in AL), sixth in opponents SLG (.352, second in AL), opponents' OPS (.663, second in AL) and walk rate (8.6%, second in AL), seventh in HR/9.0IP (0.75, second in AL) and K/BB (2.70, third in AL). The Yankees pitching staff overall have posted a Major League-best 3.07 ERA this season (full rankings on left). They have allowed only three ER-or-fewer in 12 of their last 16 games (since 4/19) and 13 of their last 18 games (since 4/17), posting a 2.42 ERA (160.0IP, 43ER) over that 18-game span. They have allowed one ER-or-fewer in nine of their last 18 games.

1K FOR B-REY: Bryan Reynolds reached the 1000-hit mark for his Major League career after collecting two singles off Michael Soroka (first inning and third inning) in Wednesday night's 1-0 win at Arizona. He joined Roberto Clemente, Andrew McCutchen, Dave Parker and Willie Stargell as the only players in Pirates history with at least 1000 hits, 200 doubles and 140 home runs. His 1000 hits since making his Major League debut on April 20, 2019 vs. San Francisco rank 12th in all of Major League Baseball.

D-FENSE: The Red Sox lead the Majors in defensive runs saved (30). They ranked T-12th in 2025 (30). The only other AL teams with more than 11 DRS are NYY (14) and SEA (13). Boston has three players who either lead or are tied for the lead in DRS at their respective positions: Willyer Abreu (RF, seven), Caleb Durbin (3B, six, tied), and Willson Contreras (1B, four, tied). Roman Anthony also ranks second in LF (six). The Sox on Monday snapped a 24-game streak with one or zero errors, since 4/7. It was their longest such streak in a single season since 7/28-9/13/22 (43 games).

GARCIA'S GREATNESS: Rico Garcia has posted a 0.56 ERA (1 ER/16.0 IP) with 18 strikeouts across 17 appearances. His lone hit allowed is a home run by KC's Michael Massey on April 21. His .020 (1-for-49) opponent average and 0.38 WHIP are the best among all MLB relievers, outpacing MIA's John King (.063, 3-for-48) and SEA's Matt Brash (0.44 WHIP), respectively. Prior to Garcia's current run, the fewest number of hits allowed by an Oriole through their first 17 outings of a season was four (Yennier Cano, 2023 & Jesse Orosco, 1997). He has yet to allow a hit in each of his eight home appearances to open the 2026 campaign, one of three Oriole pitchers in franchise history to accomplish the feat along with Bryan Baker (9 G, 2023) and Shawn Armstrong (8 G, 2019).

PAIR OF STREAKING SOX: Colson Montgomery and Miguel Vargas each have reached base safely in 18 straight games (since 4/16). They are the first White Sox teammates since Yasmani Grandal (30) and Yoán Moncada (25) in 2021 to post on-base streaks of 18-plus games at the same time. Montgomery is batting .277/.405/.600 (18-65) with six home runs, 14 RBI, 10 runs scored, four hit-by-pitches and 10 walks during his career-high streak. Vargas is hitting .279/.417/.559 (19-68) with six homers, 11 RBI, 15 runs scored and 16 walks during his streak. He ranks sixth in the American League with 26 walks this season.

THE DUKE OF CLEVELAND: After his fifth multi-hit performance in his last six games, Chase DeLauter now owns a 14-game on-base streak and 10-game hit streak, both career-highs. Over the 14-game stretch, he's hitting .412 (21-for-51) with four doubles, one triple, one home run, 11 RBI and a 1.071 OPS. The last Cleveland rookie to reach base in 14-or-more games was Steven Kwan (15G) from Sept. 17 (G1)-Oct. 3, 2022. Kwan was also the last Cleveland rookie with a hit-streak of 10-or-more games, hitting safely in 18-straight contests from July 14-Aug. 4, 2022. DeLauter's multi-hit effort last night was his 10th of the season. He's one of four Cleveland rookies since 2010 to total 10-or-more multi-hit performances thru their first 34 games, accompanied by Francisco Lindor (13, 2015), Óscar Mercado (12, 2019) and Oscar González (11, 2022).

FINN AGAIN: Since being acquired at last year's trade deadline, Kyle Finnegan has gone 4-0 with seven holds, five saves and a 1.04 ERA (4 ER/34.2 IP) in 32 relief appearances. Finnegan boasts the second-lowest relief ERA in the A.L. and the fourth-lowest ERA among all relief pitchers in baseball (min. 30 relief innings) starting last August 1. He trails only Atlanta's Raisel Iglesias (0.27 ERA), Boston's Aroldis Chapman (0.87 ERA), and San Diego's Mason Miller (0.91 ERA) in that span.
