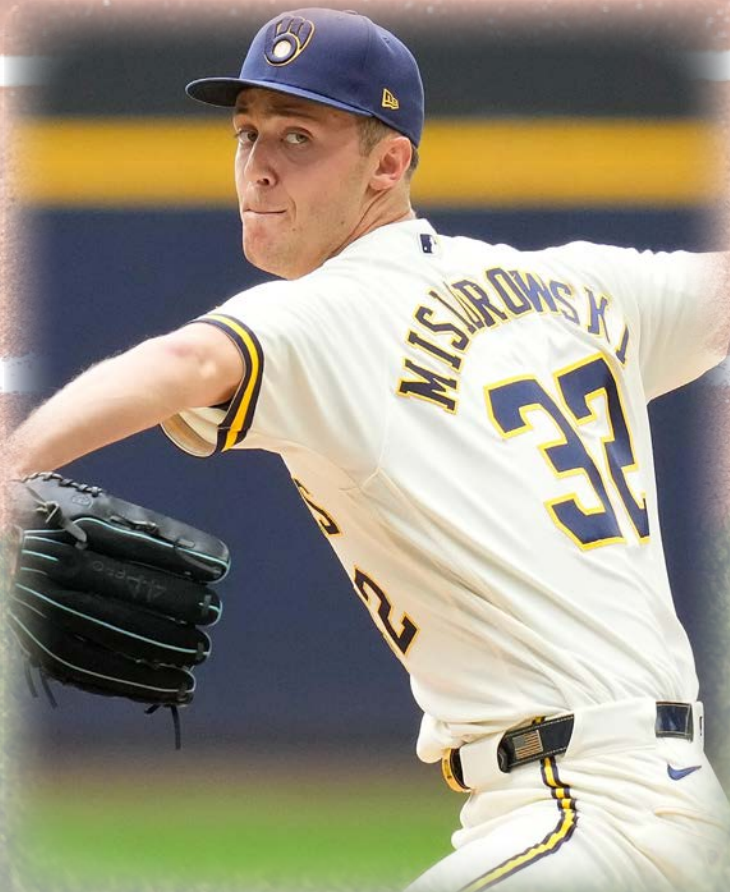

# SCORELESS DOMINATION

Cristopher Sánchez capped off a dominant month of May with 7.0 scoreless frames on Wednesday at Petco Park. His start extended his scoreless innings streak to 44.2 innings, setting a new franchise record since the mound was moved to its current distance in 1893. His streak surpassed Hall of Famer Grover Alexander, who threw 41.0 consecutive scoreless innings during his rookie season in 1911. Per Sarah Langs, Sánchez's streak is the seventh-longest in the Live-Ball Era (since 1920), trailing only Orel Hershiser (59.0 IP in 1988); Hall of Famer Don Drysdale (58.0 IP in 1968); Hall of Famer Bob Gibson (47.0 IP in 1968); Zack Greinke (45.2 IP in 2015); Hall of Famer Carl Hubbell (45.1 IP in 1933); and Sal Maglie (45.0 IP in 1950).

The southpaw completed May with a 4-0 record, a 0.00 ERA, a 0.72 WHIP and a .181 opponents' batting average, firing at least 7.0 scoreless innings in all five of his starts. He is the sixth pitcher since 1901 to make five consecutive scoreless starts of at least 7.0 innings, joining Hershiser (6 GS - 9/5-9/29/1988); Drysdale (6 GS - 5/14-6/4/1968); Brandon Webb (5 GS - 7/25-8/17/2007); Gibson (5 GS - 6/6-6/26/1968); and Doc White (5 GS - 9/12-9/30/1904). Additionally, the La Romana, Dominican Republic native is just the second traditional starter ever to make at least five starts while not allowing a run in a single month, joining Hershiser, who allowed no runs across 55.0 innings for the Los Angeles Dodgers in September 1988, throwing five complete games while making six starts. The only other pitcher to achieve a scoreless month while making five starts is Ryne Stanek, who appeared in 12 games for the Tampa Bay Rays in June 2018, allowing no runs in 15.2 innings while making seven starts as an opener and never throwing more than 2.0 innings in an appearance.

Overall, Sánchez has held his opponents scoreless in half of his starts this season and his six scoreless starts are the most in the Majors, trailed by Shane Bieber, José Soriano and Ranger Suarez, who all have five scoreless starts. Last season, Cy Young winners Paul Skenes and Tarik Skubal paced the Majors with 12 scoreless starts apiece. Across the 836 games played through Wednesday, there have been 225 scoreless starts of at least 5.0 innings (13.5% of 1,672 GS), and 63 scoreless starts of at least 7.0 innings (3.8% of 1,672 GS). The 13.5% of scoreless starts of at least 5.0 innings are on track to be the most in the Majors since 2022 when there were 668 (13.7%) scoreless starts of at least 5.0 innings among the total 4,860 starts (2,430 G). Since MLB expanded to 30 teams in 1998, 2022 is the only season in which at least 13.0% of all Major League starts resulted in at least 5.0 scoreless innings.

Sánchez's 1.47 ERA leads qualified pitchers this season, while it ranks second among pitchers with at least 50.0 innings pitched, trailing only fellow NL Cy Young Award candidate, Shohei Ohtani, who has a 0.82 ERA across nine starts for the Dodgers. Ohtani, who is not currently qualified for the ERA title, has not allowed more than two runs in a start and has thrown at least 6.0 innings in all but one of his starts this season. Since earned runs became official in 1913 and excluding pitchers used as openers, Ohtani's 0.82 ERA is tied for the fourth-best mark by a pitcher through their first nine starts of a season, per Sarah Langs. He trails only Jacob deGrom (0.62 ERA in 2021); Juan Marichal (0.69 ERA in 1966); and Dutch Leonard (0.76 ERA in 1914). If Ohtani maintains an ERA below 0.85 through his first 10 starts of the year, he would be just the ninth pitcher (excludes two openers) since 1913 to maintain an ERA of 0.85-or-less through his first 10 starts of a season and the first since deGrom had a 0.56 ERA through his first 10 starts in 2021.



# NASTY NATS

Outfielder James Wood of the Washington Nationals is the only player in Major League Baseball this season with 15 home runs and 10 stolen bases. The 23-year-old has led off all 57 games for Washington, leading MLB leadoff hitters in plate appearances (268), at-bats (217), hits (60), total bases (120), RBI (37) and walks (47). Additionally, his four leadoff homers are the most in the Majors, while his 15 homers overall out of the leadoff spot are second-most among players, behind only Byron Buxton, who has 17 longballs for the Minnesota Twins, all of which have come during his 39 games as the leadoff hitter. Overall, Wood leads qualified Major League hitters in runs scored; ranks third in on-base percentage (.414), OPS (.967) and total bases (120); and ranks fourth in walks and extra-base hits (30).

Shortstop CJ Abrams and Wood lead the Nationals with 60 hits each, and the tandem has combined for 27 homers, 84 RBI, 84 runs scored and 18 stolen bases. With both players on pace for 170 hits, they are seeking to be the third tandem in Nationals' franchise history (since 2005) with at least 170 hits in a season. Alfonso Soriano (179 H) and Ryan Zimmerman (176 H) first accomplished the feat in 2006, followed by Anthony Rendon (176 H) and Denard Span (184 H) in 2014. With Abrams on pace for 34 homers and Wood on pace for 42 home runs, they are seeking to become the fifth and sixth players in Nationals' history (since 2005) with 170+ hits and 30+ homers in a single season, seeking to join Soriano (179 H/46 HR in 2006), Zimmerman (178 H/33 HR in 2009), Bryce Harper (172 H/42 HR) and Rendon (174 H/34 HR). Combined, the pair is on pace to produce 341 hits, 76 home runs, 238 RBI, 238 runs scored and 51 stolen bases.

Abrams has batted fourth in each of Washington's last 15 games, with the tandem batting first and fourth in the lineup in 36 of the Nationals' 57 games. Overall, Washington's first and fourth hitters in the lineup have combined for 120 hits this season, the third-most of any club out of those two spots in the lineup combined, trailing the Tampa Bay Rays (125 H) and Colorado Rockies (122 H).

The Nationals are the only team to not have a player aged 29-or-older appear in a game this season and their 30 home runs by players aged 25-or-younger lead the Majors, while their 163 hits by players aged 25-or-younger are third-most behind the Athletics (204 H) and Chicago White Sox (184 H). Overall, the Nationals lead the Majors in runs scored (306) and runs per game (5.36). Washington is one of four clubs to average at least 5.0 runs per game this season, followed by the Los Angeles Dodgers (5.32); Atlanta Braves (5.16); and New York Yankees (5.0).

## DEVELOPS ON THE DIAMOND

**AMONG THE GAMES' BEST:** St. Louis Cardinals' outfielder Jordan Walker has continued to build on his hot start to the season, finding himself on the leaderboard in many statistical categories. The DREAM Series and Breakthrough Series alumni, among other events, ranks fourth in slugging percentage (.576), fifth in RBI (42), fifth in total bases (117), seventh in OPS (.943), and tied-for-seventh in home runs (15) among all qualified players.



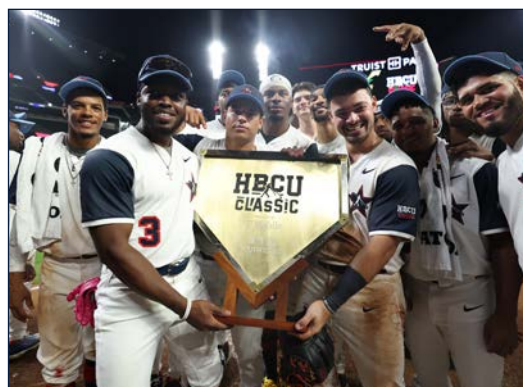
**ONE FOR A REASON:** Number one overall pick in the 2025 MLB Draft and 2023 States Play alumni Eli Willits put on a show today with the Fredericksburg Nationals, the Single-A affiliate of the Washington Nationals. The 18-year-old racked up three hits, three RBI and a stolen base in the Nationals 11-9 victory over the Delmarva Shorebirds. The stolen base, number 25 on the season for the Oklahoma native, leads all Nationals this season across every level.

**ROLLINS AND WEEKS NAMED HBCU SWINGMAN CLASSIC MANAGERS:**

Announced yesterday, Phillies legend Jimmy Rollins and 14-year Major League veteran Rickie Weeks will be managers for the 2026 HBCU Swingman Classic presented by USA Baseball. The HBCU Swingman Classic, now entering its fourth year, will take place on Friday, July 10<sup>th</sup> at Citizens Bank Park in Philadelphia as part of MLB's All-Star Week on-field action. Founded by Ken Griffey Jr. in 2023, the Classic rosters consist of players from Historically Black Colleges and Universities across the nation. Rollins accepts the role as manager following his 17-year MLB career, 15 of which he spent with the Phillies. During his time in Philadelphia, Rollins racked up three All-Star appearances, won the 2007 National League Most Valuable Player Award, led the National League in runs scored in 2007, led the NL in triples on four occasions and led the NL in stolen bases in 2001 and amassed a bWAR of 47.3. Rollins was inducted to the Phillies Wall of Fame in 2025. In the other dugout, Weeks will take the helm of his squad following a 14-year Major League career in which he spent 11 years with the Milwaukee Brewers and a year with the Arizona Diamondbacks, Seattle Mariners and Tampa Bay Rays. In 2003, Weeks became the first and only HBCU player to win the Golden Spikes Award after posting an NCAA record .465 career batting average over three seasons with the Southern University Jaguars. The HBCU Swingman Classic presented by USA Baseball will feature special pregame activities designed to honor and celebrate HBCU culture, such as an in-ballpark DJ, in-game "Divine Nine" recognition and much more.



**LOOKING AHEAD TO BREAKTHROUGH:** At the Jackie Robinson Training Complex in Bero Beach, Florida from June 6<sup>th</sup>-8<sup>th</sup>, 80 elite high school athletes will take part in the boys Breakthrough Series. Established in 2008, the Breakthrough Series is a joint effort of Major League Baseball and USA Baseball with a focus on developing players on and off the field. Included on the roster are 62 players who have previously participated in an MLB Develops event, including 16 players who have participated in previous iterations of the Breakthrough Series. The coaching staff, which consists of 20 former MLB coaches and players, brings over 100 years of combined MLB coaching and playing experience. The Breakthrough Series has produced countless MLB players since its inception, including 17 current Major Leaguers, highlighted by 2022 National League Rookie of the Year Michael Harris II, Taj Bradley, Justin Crawford, Carlos Rodón and Nasim Nuñez. # WELCOME TO THE SHOW

**Since May 21<sup>st</sup>, 14 players have made their Major League debut, including seven pitchers and seven position players.**

There have now been 104 players to make their Major League debut this season, including 62 pitchers and 42 position players.

- 23-year-old Alimber Santa, the Houston Astros 16<sup>th</sup>-best prospect per *MLB Pipeline*, toed the rubber for his Major League debut on Monday against the Texas Rangers at Globe Life Field. The Azua, Dominican Republic native fired perfect eighth and ninth innings, recording the final six outs of MLB's first combined no-hitter since September 2024. Per Sarah Langs, the right-hander's effort in the no-hitter made him the second pitcher in MLB history to pitch in a no-hitter in a debut outing.
- 25-year-old David Sandlin, the Chicago White Sox 18<sup>th</sup>-best prospect per *MLB Pipeline*, took the mound for his Major League debut on Wednesday against the Minnesota Twins at Rate Field. After conceding a homer to the first batter he faced, the Owasso, Oklahoma native retired 18 straight batters, tied for the fifth-most consecutive batters retired at any point in a debut outing, per Sarah Langs.

Overall, the White Sox pace the Majors with 10 players making their Major League debut, followed by the Boston Red Sox with seven players making their debut. The Cleveland Guardians, Miami Marlins and Toronto Blue Jays have had six players make their debut while the Twins have had five. The teams with four players making their debut include the Milwaukee Brewers, New York Mets, New York Yankees, Pittsburgh Pirates, Seattle Mariners and St. Louis Cardinals. The teams with three players making their debut include the Arizona Diamondbacks, Baltimore Orioles, Colorado Rockies, Astros, Los Angeles Angels, Philadelphia Phillies, San Francisco Giants and Rangers. The teams with two players making their debut include the Athletics, Atlanta Braves, Chicago Cubs, Detroit Tigers, San Diego Padres and Tampa Bay Rays. Finally, the Cincinnati Reds, Kansas City Royals, Los Angeles Dodgers and Washington Nationals have each had one player make their Major League debut this season.

# ABS OVERVIEW

## OVERVIEW

MLB introduced the Automated Ball-Strike (ABS) Challenge System powered by T-Mobile beginning with the 2026 season. The system will rely on the same Hawk-Eye tracking technology that fuels MLB's Statcast data. *What to know about the challenge system:*

- Only batters and pitchers/catchers may initiate a challenge. Managers, coaches and other players may not be involved.
- Each team starts the game with two challenges. Teams will lose the ability to challenge after they do so incorrectly twice. Teams will start each extra inning with a challenge regardless of whether they have already exhausted their challenges in the first nine innings.
- The ABS zone is set as follows: The width is 17 inches, identical to home plate. The top of the zone is set at 53.5% of a player's measured height without cleats. The bottom is set at 27% of the player's measured height. The strike zone is captured as the ball passes through the middle of the plate, not the front.
- In MLB, challenges will not be permitted when a position player is pitching.

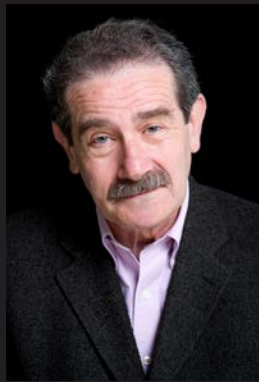


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# AMERICA'S NATIONAL GAME

The outlook wasn't brilliant for the Mudville nine that day ... you know the rest, don't you?

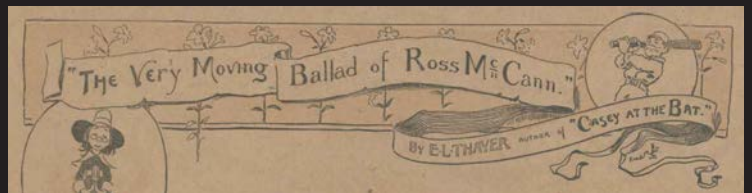
Last week we revisited 1908, the year of The Merkle Game, to write about "Take Me Out to the Ball Game." Oddly—because like Merkle and all his confrères, "Casey at the Bat" commemorates failure—this week we return to 1888. That was the year of Spalding's Tour, which registered hope for the American game to be played worldwide.

Casey is the poem's hero and anti-hero, the "champion" for our aspirations who—like us, most of the time—fails. It struck me this week what a rich, layered word that is, tracing back to the Latin *campus*, which meant a flat plain or field.

"Champion" came to mean a "field of battle" then, as *campio*, a combatant in the field. This evolved into a sort of gladiatorial combat, then a solo fighter on behalf of another person or cause. All these senses of "champion" link to hope, to a vicarious struggle, and to a happy return home. As with Odysseus, if we take respite at the bases—bays, or safe harbors—then the homeward voyage may proceed.

On repeated hearings we mock Casey's vainglory and bluster and, in the poet's genius twist upon the classical paean, delight in his comeuppance. At first this ending comes as a surprise, as it did for the ballplayers in the audience when the ballad was first recited publicly, two months after its publication, on August 14, 1888. In later years Casey would be redeemed in parodies because America loves comeback stories, even for blowhards.

The poet was Ernest Lawrence Thayer, born into a prosperous family in Lawrence, Massachusetts; his father owned a woolens mill in Worcester County to which his son, after traversing the globe, would return.

He had studied philosophy at Harvard, graduated magna cum laude, and served as editor of the *Lampoon*, whose business manager was William Randolph Hearst, until his expulsion.

The junior Hearst was then given the ownership of a newspaper, the *San Francisco Examiner*, by his father who, his Senatorial campaign over, no longer had need of it. Young Hearst invited three members of the *Lampoon* staff to help: Eugene "Genie" Lent, F. H. "Fatty" Briggs, and Ernest L. "Phinnie" Thayer. Thayer contributed a humor column and wrote ditties.

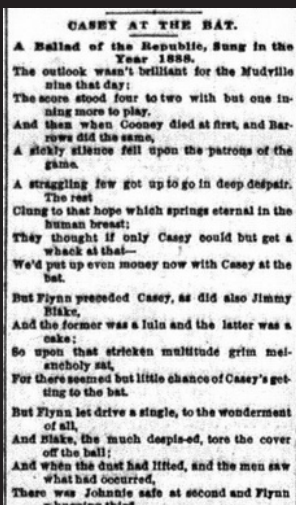
Returning east because of illness, Thayer mailed in "Casey at the Bat: A Ballad of the Republic, Sung in the Year 1888"; it ran in the *Examiner* on June 3. Hearst paid him the usual five bucks and the poem vanished ... except that it had been clipped by the novelist Archibald Clavering Gunter, who kept it in his billfold as he—like Thayer, whose name he did not know—returned east.

Credit is not solely to Thayer who, despite decades of challenge to his authorship, wrote it; nor to DeWolf Hopper, who first recited it, breaking into *Prince Methusalem*, a "Hopperretta," as it was then dubbed. It is to Gunter, who that morning as he read his newspaper, saw that the New York and Chicago baseball clubs were to be at Wallack's Theater that night as Hopper's guests. He gave the poem to his friend with the suggestion that he orate it. Hopper mastered the ballad in a couple of hours; as a baseball devotee he could visualize every line.

The two teams, headed by Cap Anson and Buck Ewing, were in the boxes, and during the show Hopper "pulled Casey on them, in his own words and, as the *Evening World* reported: "The piece was entitled 'Casey at the Bat,' and if Hopper ever did credit to anything in his life he did to those verses."

Let Hopper tell the story, from his 1927 autobiography, *Once a Clown, Always a Clown*:

*I interpolated Casey in a scene in the second act.... It was, I presume, the first time the poem was recited in public.... On his debut Casey lifted this audience, composed largely of baseball players and fans, out of their seats. When I dropped my voice to B flat, below low C, at "the*

multitude was awed" [the poem in fact reads "the audience was awed"], I remember seeing Buck Ewing's gallant mustachios give a single nervous twitch. And as the house, after a moment of startled silence, grasped the anticlimactic denouement, it shouted its glee.... They had expected, as anyone does upon hearing Casey for the first time, that the mighty batsman would slam the ball out of the lot, and a lesser bard would have had him do so, and thereby written merely a good sporting-page filler.

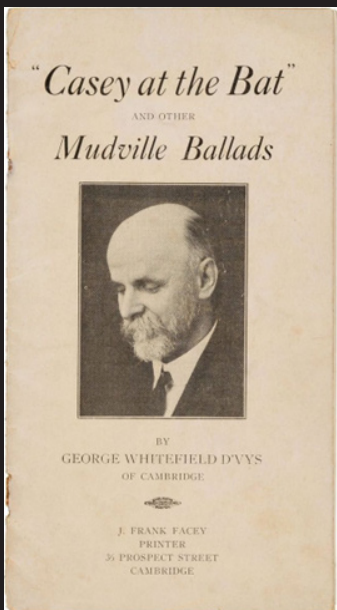
By 1889, King Kelly was taking to the boards to recite the poem (unsurprisingly renamed *Kelly at the Bat*, with Boston replacing Mudville), and many thought the poem had been written not only for him but also about him ... if not by him. No poet came forth to dismiss such notions. Thayer was so shy that he kept quiet while deluded poets claimed to be the author or, like one-time Phillies pitcher Dan Casey, its inspiration.

It was not until December 1892, after Hopper had recited the poem during a performance of *Wang* at Worcester that a note came to him asking him to come around to a club and meet the author of "Casey," as yet unknown. Of course Hopper went, and was introduced to mill magnate Ernest L. Thayer. When the latter revived his poetical career with a few ditties in the *New York Journal* of 1896—owned by his Harvard pal Hearst—he was identified as the man behind "Casey at the Bat."

And yet, like so many fugitive poems such as Clement Moore's "Twas the Night Before Christmas," proprietary wrangles persisted. In 1902 Frederic Lawrence Knowles edited *A Treasury of Humorous Poetry*, including a version of "Casey at the Bat," crediting it to Joseph Quinlan Murphy. Two years later, Frank Wilstach, Hopper's former press agent, began to circulate a story that his roommate in Sioux City, Iowa, Will Valentine (conveniently dead in 1897), had written "Casey" in 1887, a year before Thayer.

Most persistent yet preposterous of the claimants was George Whitefield D'Vys, who claimed that *his* "Casey" had been delivered to the editor of New York's *Sporting Times* one year before that publication commenced. As for his writing other poems in the stentorian style of "Casey," well, Thayer's schoolboy model (and that for D'Vys) was probably Macaulay's "Horatius at the Bridge," written in the same iambic heptameter. I could go on, but let Thayer's comment suffice: "The constant wrangling about the authorship, from which I have tried to keep aloof, has certainly filled me with disgust."

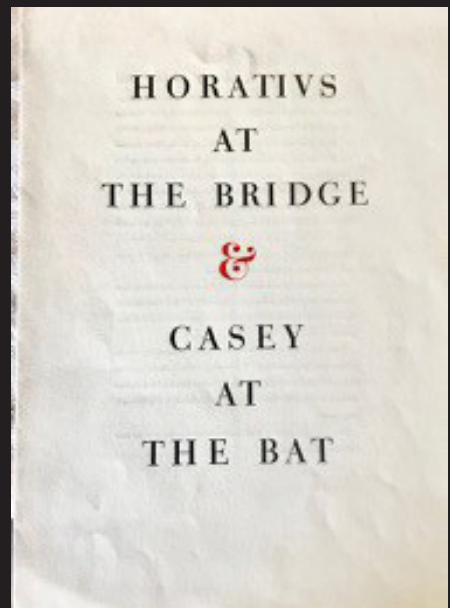
Despite Thayer's evident satire of not only baseball but also would-be heroes (and the Irish), Donald Hall wrote: "When a few fans go home in the ninth inning, they depart not in discouragement but 'in deep despair.' The remaining five thousand illustrate a learned illusion: In his *Essay on Man*, Alexander Pope wrote that, 'Hope springs eternal in the human breast....'"



D'Vys self-published this pamphlet in 1929



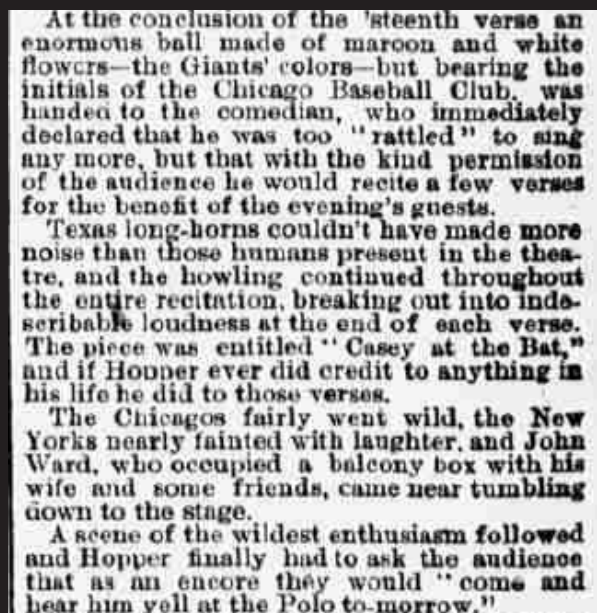

# WEEKLY AWARDS

First baseman Willson Contreras of the Boston Red Sox was selected the American League Player of the Week, and second baseman Ketel Marte of the Arizona Diamondbacks was unanimously named the National League Player of the Week.

Contreras earned his second career award and his first in the American League after previously winning as a member of the Chicago Cubs on August 7, 2017. It is the first award for Boston since Trevor Story was honored last season on August 4<sup>th</sup>. Marte also won his second career award after taking home the honor as a member of the Diamondbacks on September 9, 2019. It marks the second honor for Arizona this season, with Marte joining his teammate Ildemaro Vargas, who won the award on April 27<sup>th</sup>, and it is the first time since 2024 that multiple Diamondbacks players won in a single season. It is the second time this season that a pair of internationally-born players have won the award in each league, joining Cuban-natives Andy Pages and Yordan Alvarez on April 6<sup>th</sup>.

Chicago Cubs second baseman Nico Hoerner earned his second career Play of the Week Award after previously winning earlier this season on April 27<sup>th</sup>. He became the first player to win multiple awards this season, as well as the first Cubs player to win the award multiple times in his career. It is the fifth time the Cubs have earned the honor since the award's inception in 2019, with Hoerner joined by Albert Almora Jr. (7/27/2020); Javier Báez (5/31/2021); and Mike Tauchman (7/30/2023). With no outs in the top of the fifth inning against the Houston Astros, César Salazar laid down a bunt as Hoerner picked up the ball and flipped it between his legs to first base to get the out.

# SARAH'S FAVORITE NOTES OF THE WEEK

*I'm Sarah Langs, a researcher for MLB.com, and I'm honored to have this space to share some of my favorite notes to wrap up each week of this wonderful sport.*

**NOBODY BEATS THE MIZ:** Jacob Misorowski pitched on Monday and yet again didn't allow an extra-base hit. Over his last six starts, Misorowski has 58 strikeouts and no extra-base hits allowed. He's the first pitcher since at least 1900 with at least 45 strikeouts and no extra-base hits allowed in a six-game span. Misorowski threw 57 pitches at 100-plus mph, with 40 of those at 101-plus, both of which set single-game records under pitch tracking (2008).

**NO-HITTER!** The Astros threw the Majors' first no-hitter since September 2024 on Monday. The final two innings belonged to Alimber Santa, who was making his debut. Santa is the second player in MLB history to pitch in a no-hitter in his MLB debut, joining Bumpus Jones of the Cincinnati Reds on Oct. 15, 1892, who threw one all himself, according to the Elias Sports Bureau. Houston now has 18 no-hitters, including the postseason. That's the most no-hitters thrown by any club since the Astros' first season in 1962. The next most by any club in that span is 13, by the Dodgers.

**CHURN IT UP:** Nick Kurtz's on-base streak finally ended on Tuesday at 48 games. And what a streak it was. It's tied with 1996 Mark McGwire for the longest single-season on-base streak in A's franchise history. It's also tied with 2001 Albert Pujols for the fifth-longest by a player at age 23 or younger in a season since 1900.

**ZEROS:** Cristopher Sánchez extended his scoreless innings streak to 44.2 innings on Wednesday. That's the longest by a Phillies pitcher since the mound was moved to its current distance in 1893, according to Elias. He passed 1911 Grover Alexander, at 41 innings. Sánchez's streak is the seventh-longest in a single season in the live ball era (1920). The streak also means he had a scoreless month of May. Sánchez is the second pitcher since at least 1900 to make at least five starts in a calendar month and not allow a single run (excluding openers), joining Sept. 1988 Orel Hershiser.

**COLE TRAIN:** Gerrit Cole made his second start since returning from Tommy John surgery on Wednesday, and turned in a classic outing with 10 strikeouts and no walks. It was his 28<sup>th</sup> game with at least 10 strikeouts since joining the Yankees, five more than anyone else in franchise history (Ron Guidry). It was his 23<sup>rd</sup> career game with at least 10 strikeouts and no walks. The only pitchers with more are Randy Johnson (36), Max Scherzer (31), Curt Schilling (27) and Clayton Kershaw (27).

**HE HAS POWER:** Munetaka Murakami hit his 20<sup>th</sup> home run on Wednesday in his 55<sup>th</sup> career game. That's tied with 2015-16 Gary Sánchez for the third-most home runs in a player's first 55 career MLB games, behind only 2017 Cody Bellinger (22) and 1930 Wally Berger (21). It's also tied for the second-most home runs in the team's first 55 games in White Sox history with 2006 Jim Thome, behind 1994 Frank Thomas (21).

**SETTING THEM DOWN:** David Sandlin had quite the debut on Wednesday, allowing a leadoff home run before retiring the rest of the 18 batters he faced in order. Sandlin's 18 straight retired batters are the most by a White Sox pitcher who was making his debut over at least the last 100 years, per Elias. That's tied with July 7, 1993 Kirk Reuter for the fifth-most consecutive batters retired at any point in a pitcher's MLB debut in the expansion era (1961). Sandlin trails only Nick Kingham on April 29, 2018 (20 to start game), Dan Smith on June 8, 1999 (20), Glendon Rusch on April 6, 1997 (19) and Jimmy Jones on Sept. 21, 1986 (19).

**AIR YORDAN:** Yordan Alvarez hit two homers on Wednesday to reach 20 for the season. Alvarez got there in the Astros' 57<sup>th</sup> game. That's the fewest team games to 20 home runs in a season in Astros history. It was his second consecutive multi-homer game. Alvarez is the fifth Astros player with multiple home runs in consecutive games, joining 2023 Jose Altuve, 2000 Richard Hidalgo, 2000 Moises Alou and 1973 Doug Rader.

**SHOTIME:** Shohei Ohtani made his ninth pitching start of the season on Wednesday and his ERA now sits at 0.82. Before he even threw a pitch, though, he hit the third leadoff homer by a pitcher in MLB history, joining himself in 2025 NLCS Game 4 and in his last start. He went on to throw six hitless innings. It was the sixth time a pitcher hit a home run and allowed no hits through the first six innings of a game in the last 50 years. He joined Jake Arrieta on Sept. 27, 2015, Matt Cain on April 12, 2008, Carlos Zambrano on June 5, 2006, Mark Clark on June 14, 1997 and Tom Seaver on July 14, 1977.

**CURRENT IRONMAN:** Matt Olson has played 838 consecutive games entering Thursday, dating to May 2, 2021. His streak is the 9th-longest in MLB history. The only other streaks of at least 700 consecutive games to begin in the divisional era (1969) are, of course, 1982-98 Cal Ripken Jr. (2,632 games), as well as 1975-83 Steve Garvey (1,207), 2000-07 Miguel Tejada (1,152), 1978-83 Pete Rose (745) and 1981-86 Dale Murphy (740).

# LINE DRIVES

## Compiled from Club Game Notes

**SLUGGING SOX:** In their last nine games, since 5/17, the Red Sox are batting .289 with a .347 OBP and .804 OPS (91-for-315, 16 2B, 5 3B, 9 HR, 28 BB). In that span, they rank second in the Majors in AVG, fourth in OBP, and fourth in OPS. The Sox have homered in three consecutive games (six total HR) after doing so in three of their previous six (three total HR). Boston has scored five runs in each of its last three games, and in five of its last seven. Prior to that stretch, the Sox had gone 11-straight games without scoring five or more runs. The Sox have recorded 10+ hits in four of its last seven games, since 5/19, after going 11-straight games without doing so.

**ELLYTRICITY:** On Tuesday at NYM, Elly De La Cruz went 2-for-5 with a double and two RBI. This season, De La Cruz leads all Major League shortstops in both extra-base hits (26) and total bases (113). His 37 runs scored and 37 RBI each rank second among all primary shortstops. He is two stolen bases shy of 150 for his career and is aiming to become the youngest Red (currently 24 years, 136 days old) since 1900 to reach the mark (Eric Davis, 25 years, 82 days old). He is also two stolen bases shy of ranking among the fastest players since the live-ball era (since 1920) to reach 400 hits, 200 RBI, and 150 stolen bases for his career (474 career games). He has appeared in each of Cin's last 272 games, beginning 7/30/24, t's the third-longest streak of consecutive team games played by a Red since 1970.

**ENTER SANDMAN:** David Sandlin became the first White Sox pitcher over the last 100 seasons to retire 18 consecutive batters in his Major League debut and the first MLB pitcher to accomplish the feat since Pittsburgh's Nick Kingham retired the first 20 on 4/29/18 vs. St. Louis (Elias). Sandlin became the first starter in Sox history to allow one hit or less and no walks over 6.0-plus IP in his MLB debut. He averaged 10.2 pitches per inning (61 pitches/6.0 IP), the fewest by any pitcher in his MLB debut (min. 6.0 IP) since pitches were first tracked in 1988 (STATS).

**HOT SOTO:** Juan Soto has hit five home runs over his last six games as well as seven in his last 11. He has hit seven home runs in an 11-game span for the second time as a Met (also: 6/17-27/25). His 10 home runs since April 28 are tied with Byron Buxton for the second-most in the Majors during that span. Soto has hit safely in 10 of his last 13 games dating back to May 12. He has a .347/.429/.776 slashline during that span. Soto stole his 100<sup>th</sup> career base Thursday in his 1,131<sup>st</sup> career game. That is the fewest games to 100+ SB, 200+ HR & 900+ walks. The previous fewest: 1,257 games by Mickey Mantle.

**BUCK TRUCK ACROSS THE MAP:** Byron Buxton has homered seven times in his last 16 road games. He has now homered in five of his last six road series' (NYM, WAS, CLE, BOS & CWS; his one miss was the TB series). Since June 17, 2025, Buck has hit 24 road home runs, second-most in baseball, trailing only Christian Walker (25). Last night, he extended his road on-base streak to nine-straight games. Over those nine, he is hitting .308 (12-for-39) with three doubles, four home runs, eight RBI, a .692 slugging percentage and a 1.049 OPS. Byron Buxton has hit 12 home runs over his last 22 games and 17 home runs over his last 33 games, since April 13. Since that date, he is tied with Kyle Schwarber for the most home runs in baseball.

**BRONX BOMBERS:** Yankees batters set season highs with 15 runs, 24 hits and six HR on Tuesday at Kansas City. This marked their most runs in a game since 4/29/25 at Baltimore (also 15R). This also marked only the 12th time in franchise history and only the third time in the last 52 years (since 1975) the Yankees have recorded at least 24 hits in a single game (also 24H on 7/30/11-G2 vs. Baltimore and 25H on 7/22/07 vs. Tampa Bay). Their six HR were their most in a game since 8/27/25 vs. Washington (also six HR). This marked the first time in franchise history that each of the Yankees' starters recorded multi-hit games.

**HOLY SCHMITT!:** Casey Schmitt tied his career-high with his 12<sup>th</sup> homer of the season on Tuesday (also hit 12 last year). He leads the club in total bases (101), homers (12), RBI (31), slugging percentage (.567) and OPS (.906). His 12 homers through the Giants' first 55 games this season are the most by a Giant since Joc Pederson had 13 in SF's first 55 games in 2022. His 12 homers through SF's first 55 games are the most by a right-handed SF batter since Jeff Kent had 16 in 2000. Schmitt now has five homers vs. Arizona in his career, which is his most against any team.

**COLT'S BIG DAY IN KC:** On Sunday, Colt Emerson went 4-for-4 with 3 doubles and an RBI against the Royals. At 20 years, 308 days, he became the youngest player to record three doubles in a game since Hall of Famer Roberto Clemente (20 years, 284 days, 5/29/55 vs. PHI) and the youngest player in Mariners history to accomplish the feat. He also joined Ken Griffey Jr. (4x) and Alex Rodriguez (3x) as the only trio of Mariners to record four hits in a game before turning 21.

**SPIDER-MAN:** In save opportunities, Phillies closer Jhoan Duran is 11-for-11 this season, 27-for-30 since joining the Phils last season and 101-for-113 in his career. On Monday at SD, he tied Edwin Díaz, Jordan Romano and Joakim Soria for fifth-fastest to 100 saves (in terms of save opportunities). Ahead of them are Eric Gagne (104 SVO), John Smoltz (107 SVO), Zack Britton (108 SVO) and Greg Holland (111 SVO). Duran is the fifth pitcher to record their 100<sup>th</sup> save in a Phillies uniform, joining Tug McGraw (1976), Steve Bedrosian (1987), Roger McDowell (1989) and Mitch Williams (1991). With his save on Monday, Duran now has recorded a save against all 30 teams in baseball. He is the 22<sup>nd</sup> pitcher to record a save against all 30 teams, and Duran is the fastest player to do so (in terms of games pitched) at 262. The previous fastest was Josh Hader in 367 games.

**STRONG UP THE MIDDLE:** Miami's middle infield contingent leads all middle infield groups with a combined .323/.383/.470 (140-for-434) slash line in addition to their combined OPS (.853). No other middle infield duo owns a combined OPS over .800 (Pittsburgh ranks second with a .790 OPS). Both 2B Xavier Edwards and SS Otto Lopez have hit safely in 44 games this season, leading the National League and tied for second in MLB behind only KC's B. Witt Jr. (45). Lopez continues to lead MLB in hits (71), AVG (.330), and multi-hit games (21), while Edwards is tied for second in hits (64), tied for third in triples (3), tied for fifth in runs scored (39), and ranks seventh in AVG (.306).

**THE MAGICIAN:** Esmerlyn Valdez connected for his second home run with his two-run blast in the first inning on Tuesday. Per the Elias Sports Bureau, Valdez is the fourth Pirate since at least 1900 to have at least each of his first two Major League hits be home runs, along with Stuart (1958, two), Craig Wilson (2001, two) and Rodolfo Castro (2021, five)
