Yanks Give Burbach, No. 1 Draft Pick, \$35,000 Bonus

NEW YORK, N. Y.—The Yankees have lassoed their No. 1 draft pick, Bill Burbach, a right-handed pitcher from Dickeyville, Wis., a hamlet on the Iowa border.

It took a \$35,000 bonus to get the 17-year-old prospect to sign. He has been optioned to Johnson City, Tenn., in the Appalachian Rookie League, which launched its season on June 24. Standing 6-4 and scaling 205 pounds, Burbach reputedly has a fine fast ball and curve.

A recent graduate of Wahlert High School, Dubuque, Ia., the youngster plans to attend college during the off season.

Burbach pitched three no-hitters during his high school career as he led his team to three consecutive Iowa State championships.

One of eight children (three boys and five girls), Bill hitchhiked ten miles daily each way to attend high school in Dubuque.

CARMEL BAFFLED BY SLUMP
D ESPITE hitting only around .150, Duke Carmel remains a highly popular player with Buffalo fans. Instead of booing him, they continue to cheer for him. "I don't know what is wrong," Carmel confessed recently. "My timing isn't there. The more I experiment, the worse I become. I'm missing pitches by a foot or more that I should hit into the stands." A year ago, Carmel was the Bisons' top slugger with 35 homers and 100 RBIs.

Outfielder-third baseman Dave Wissman was lost to Columbus for several days after being hit on the foot by a pitch by Buffalo's Dennis Musgraves, June 18. Fortunately, X-rays revealed no fracture.

With two away in the ninth inning and two strikes on him, Ron Cox doubled, Mickey Stanley followed with another two-bagger, tying the score. However, Carroll hung on and emerged a 2-1 victor when Jim McKnight broke up the game with a bases-full single in the eleventh inning.

Dan Schneider, Atlanta lefty became a father for the first time, June 19, when his wife gave birth to a son, Bradley Louis. The Cracker portside celebrated the next day by stopping Rochester on six hits, 4-1, in his first route-going effort of the season.

Showing a liking for Toronto's chilly weather, Bob Heffner fired a three-hitter and struck out 11 in pitching the Maple Leafs to a 3-1 victory over Jacksonville, June 15. It marked his first success in three decisions since being sent down by the Red Sox. In his next outing, June 20, Heffner blanked Columbus on four hits, 5-0, with help from Guido Grilli.

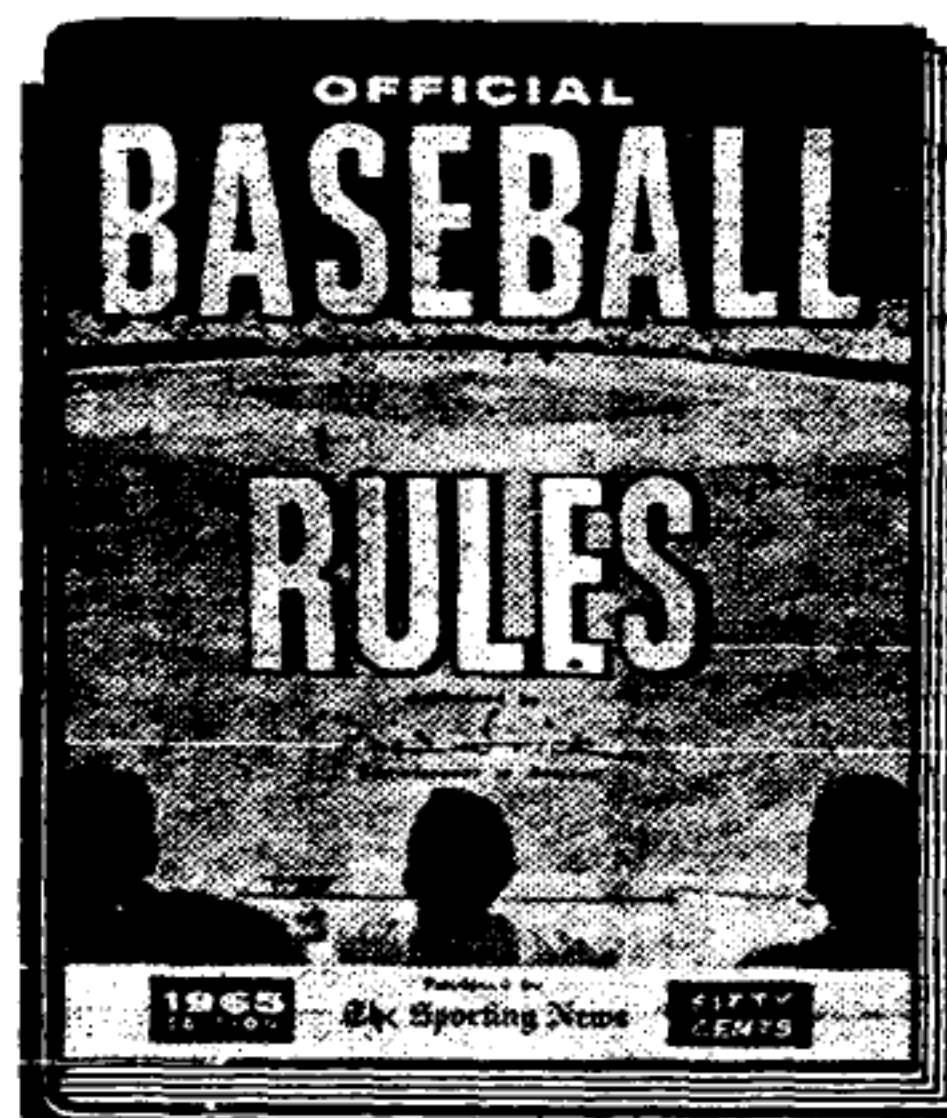
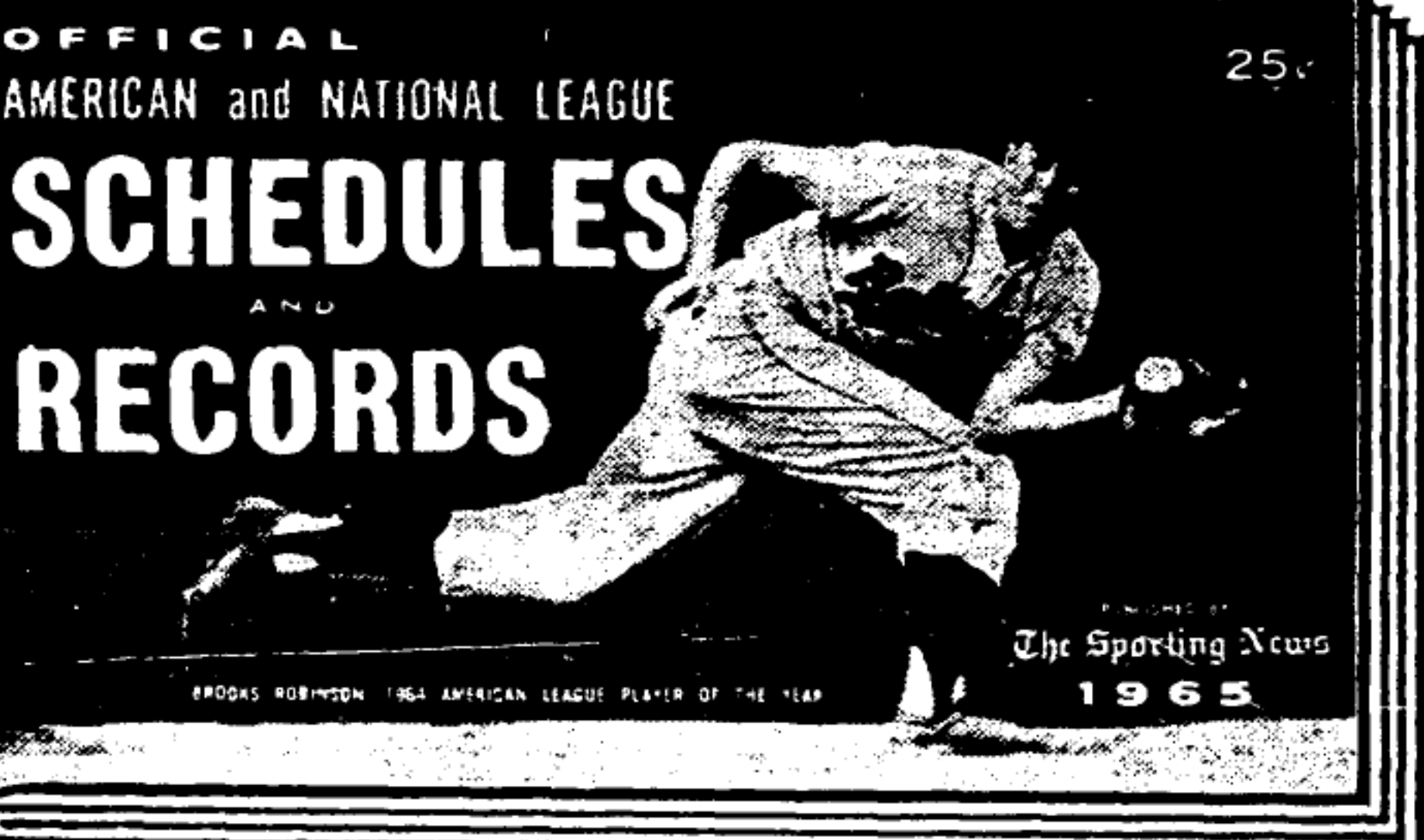

HARKNESS CHANGES MIND

TIM HARKNESS, Atlanta slugger, says he's given up thoughts of retiring. A tremendous 400-foot homer to right-center field that helped beat Syracuse, June 18, prompted him to "change my mind about quitting baseball," he declared. "All of a sudden I believe there's a way back to the majors." The blow gave Harkness 14 hits in his last 32 at-bats and four homers and 12 RBIs in his last six games.

Two Columbus pitchers ended long victory drouths at Toronto when Billy Knoch blanked the Leafs on six hits, 2-0, June 18, and Steve Blass duplicated with a five-hitter, 3-0, two days later. Knoch's victory was his first since May 4, while Blass had gone 24 days without a triumph.

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
