GOING FOR GLORY

Sal Stewart of the Cincinnati Reds paces Major League Baseball this season with 100 RBI. The rookie from Miami, Florida has hit .261 with 28 homers, 75 runs scored and an .806 OPS in his first full Major League campaign after appearing in 18 regular season games with the Reds last year.

The infielder is attempting to become the third rookie since 1920 (when RBI became official) to lead the Majors in RBI, seeking to join Hall of Famer Ted Williams (144 RBI in 1939 w/ BOS) and Walt Dropo (144 RBI in 1950 w/ BOS). With his RBI last night at San Francisco, he matched Jim Greengrass (1953) for the most RBI by a Reds rookie in franchise history. Stewart is currently on pace for 120 RBI, which would be the most by any Reds player since Hall of Famer Dave Parker had 125 RBI in 1985.

Overall, Stewart would be the 19th player (22nd occurrence) since 1920 with at least 120 RBI in one of the first two seasons in his career and the first since Pete Alonso had exactly 120 RBI in 2019 during his Jackie Robinson NL Rookie of the Year campaign with the New York Mets. No player has exceeded 120 RBI in their first or second career season since Josh Hamilton had 130 RBI for the Texas Rangers in 2008, the second year of his career. Only Dale Alexander (1929 & 1930), Hall of Famer Joe DiMaggio (1936 & 1937) and Albert Pujols (2001 & 2002) have reached at least 120 RBI in each of their first two Major League seasons.

The 22-year-old has 28 homers on the season, seeking to be the first Red to reach 30 home runs and 100 RBI in a single season since Nick Castellanos (34 HR/100 RBI) in 2021. Additionally, Stewart would join Hall of Famer Johnny Bench as the only Cincinnati players to eclipse 30 home runs and 100 RBI in an age 22-or-younger season after Bench had 45 homers and 148 RBI in his age-22 season in 1970. Since RBI became official in 1920, there have been just 21 players (28 occurrences) who have hit at least 30 home runs and tallied at least 100 RBI in an age 22-or-younger season, with Junior Caminero (45 HR/110 RBI) of the Tampa Bay Rays accomplishing the feat last year.

In 2025, American League teams defeated National League teams 367 times in an MLB-record 720 Interleague games (previous record: 690 G in 2023 and 2024).
It was the third year of MLB's balanced schedule.





COUNT ON KWAN

After hitting just .225 (67-for-298) with a homer, 16 RBI, 10 doubles and a .614 OPS in the first 89 games of the season, Steven Kwan has turned his season around with the Cleveland Guardians, batting .384 (53-for-138) with a homer, 11 RBI, six doubles and a .925 OPS in 35 games since the All-Star Break.

Since the Midsummer Classic, he paces Major League Baseball in batting average, on-base percentage (.476) and hits; and ranks seventh in OPS. His recent surge has helped Cleveland win each of its last seven games, matching the Guardians' longest winning streak of the season after also winning seven consecutive games between May 16th-22nd. He has reached base safely at least three times in 17 games since the All-Star Break, the most of any Major League player and five more than Yordan Alvarez's 12 such contests. In games that Kwan tallies a hit this season, Cleveland is 46-32 compared to 19-27 when he goes hitless.

Kwan's turnaround began on June 23rd as he entered the contest with a .206 batting average on the year before hitting safely in 11 of his next 12 games to raise his mark to .221. After his strong stretch following the All-Star Break, the 28-year-old has raised his average to .275, currently on pace to be the third-highest batting average of his career after hitting .298 in 2022 and .292 in 2024.

He highlighted his strong stretch with a five-hit game on Tuesday night at Angel Stadium, marking his second career five-hit game (also: 4/10/2022 at KC). Entering play on Thursday, he has notched multiple hits in four straight games, tied for the second-longest streak of his career.

The Los Gatos, California native has nine stolen bases on the year, just one steal shy of reaching 10 stolen bases for the fifth time in his career. He is seeking to join Francisco Lindor (2015-2019) and Ray Chapman (1912-1916) as the only players in Cleveland's history to steal at least 10 bases in each of their first five Major League seasons. He is the second player in franchise history to appear in at least 120 games in each of his first five Major League seasons, reaching the mark on Saturday at Colorado, joining Hall of Famer Earl Averill (1929-1933).

Regardless of club, Kwan (120 H & 20 XBH entering Thursday) is on pace to become the 10th player in the Divisional Era (since 1969) to record at least 140 hits and at least 30 extra-base hits in each of his first five Major League seasons. He is attempting to join Hall of Famer Roberto Alomar, Ryan Braun, Robinson Canó, Mark Grace, Austin Jackson, Nick Markakis, Hunter Pence, Albert Pujols and Hall of Famer Ichiro Suzuki. Julio Rodríguez (120 H, 38 XBH) of the Seattle Mariners and Bobby Witt Jr. (129 H, 43 XBH) of the Kansas City Royals are also aiming to join the group of nine players.

DEVELOPS ON THE DIAMOND

IMMACULATE TAJ: On Tuesday night, Minnesota Twins starter and MLB Develops alumni Taj Bradley tossed the 122nd verified immaculate inning in MLB history. In the bottom of the fifth inning of the Twins contest against the Athletics in West Sacramento, Bradley set down Carlos Cortes, Brian Serven and Henry Bolte on nine consecutive strikes. Bradley joined Michael Soroka on March 30th and Gavin Williams on July 23rd as the only MLB pitchers to accomplish the feat this season. The Los Angeles, California native became the first Twins' hurler in their 66-season history to accomplish the feat.



PLAYING FOR THE NEXT GENERATION: Across MLB's Players' Weekend, players had the opportunity to use custom gear to celebrate their personalities, backstories and charitable causes. Kansas City Royals utilityman Tyler Tolbert took the opportunity to sport Kansas City Royals Urban Youth Academy inspired cleats. Opening in 2017, the Kansas City Royals Urban Youth Academy empowers Kansas City's urban youth to unlock their potential and become the leaders of tomorrow through baseball and softball.

SHOWING OUT AT THE CLASSIC: At the Little League Classic presented by New York Life in Williamsport, Pennsylvania, Michael Harris II set a new career mark in homers. The MLB Develops alumni, who recorded 19 longballs in his rookie season, followed by seasons with 18, 16, and 20 homers, respectively, set a new single-season record with his 21st blast at Journey Bank Ballpark. In the top of the ninth inning, Harris connected on an 0-2 pitch, crushing his 21st homer of the season in the Braves win. Through his first five seasons in the Majors, Harris is one of four in Braves franchise history to record at least 15 homers in each season, and the DeKalb, Georgia native stands alone as the only player in franchise history to do so with eight-or-more stolen bases in each season.



CONTINUING THE LEGACCY: Hank Aaron Invitational and Breakthrough Series alumni Carsten Sabathia has been off to a red hot start with the Milwaukee Brewers Single-A affiliate Wilson Warbirds. Through 12 games, the 20th round selection in the 2026 Draft is slashing .370/.431/.630. Across just 46 at bats, the son of Hall of Famer CC Sabathia has crushed three homers, three doubles, driven in nine runs, scored eight runs and has worked five walks with a stolen base. Amongst all Warbirds players this season, Sabathia ranks second in batting average, slugging and OPS, and fourth in on-base percentage.



MOVING UP THE FARM: Donye Evans, an alumni of the Hank Aaron Invitational, Breakthrough Series and DREAM Series earned a promotion within the Detroit Tigers Minor League system on Thursday. In 25 appearances with the Single-A Lakeland Flying Tigers, the 24-year-old posted a perfect record of 6-0 with an ERA of 2.70. In his 33.1 innings pitched, Evans struck out 32 and allowed just 10 runs on 24 hits with 13 walks. Following his promotion to the High-A West Michigan Whitecaps, Evans has appeared in one game, tossing a scoreless 1.2 innings in relief with a strikeout.



CENTURY MARK: States Play alumni Josiah Hartshorn has made a name for himself through his first 112 games in the Chicago Cubs organization. The New York native spent his first 39 games with the Myrtle Beach Pelicans before his promotion to the High-A South Bend Cubs. Across both levels, the 19-year-old has slashed .290/.406/.524. On Tuesday, the sixth round pick in the 2025 Draft connected on his 100th professional RBI, and added two more in Wednesday's game. Overall, Hartshorn has amassed 21 homers, 23 doubles, five triples, 102 RBI, 80 runs scored, 76 walks and 12 stolen bases in his first professional season.

SERIES 3 RECAP: In the first showdown of Series 3, Team Landry took down Team Palacios, 6-3. Sydney Stewart earned first place in MVP voting behind her two-RBI effort. 1,650 team win points were awarded to Team Landry, along with 304 team stat points and 120 team MVP points. In the second showdown of the Series, Team Klingler defeated Team Landry, 2-1. Back-to-back team captain Baylee Klingler earned first place in the MVP voting, knocking in both runs on a two-run walk-off homer in the bottom of the seventh. Overall, Team Klingler took home all 1,950 team win points, gathered 250 team stat points and 100 team MVP points. In the final matchup of Series 3, Klingler’s first-inning sacrifice fly made the difference in her team’s 1-0 win over Team Palacios. Lexi Kilfoyl’s 4.0 scoreless innings in relief earned her first place in MVP voting as Team Klingler earned all 1,950 team win points, 154 team stat points and 120 team MVP points.



SERIES 4 DRAFT IS IN: On the heels of an action-packed Series 3 in the AUSL All-Star Cup, Baylee Klingler, Lexi Kilfoyl and Hannah Flippen, who finished Series 3 at the top of the individual leaderboard, earned the role of captain for the fourth and final draft. The Carolina Blaze’s Klingler became the sixth player in league history to win their first four career games as a captain in the All-Star Cup, the Bandits’ Kilfoyl owns an 8-6 all-time record as a captain and the Talons’ Flippen became the second player in Cup history to record 50 career game wins and owns a league-record four career Defensive MVP certificates. Series 4 begins on Friday, August 28th and runs through Sunday, August 30th, after which a new AUSL All-Star Cup champion will be crowned. See the full Series 4 draft breakdown [here](#).



USING THE PLATFORM FOR GOOD: Each week throughout the AUSL All-Star Cup, a competing athlete is spotlighted to share the personal stories behind the organizations they represent during the Cup. At the conclusion of the Cup, Athletes Unlimites, powered by Give Lively and the Give Lively Foundation will make a grant equal to 100% of each competitor’s win bonus to the organization of their choice. Previous spotlights throughout the Cup have included the Sparks’s Jessi Warren supporting Virginia-based travel softball organization Fury Platinum; Hannah Flippen supporting athletes beyond the game through the Soroya Foundation; Ailana Agbayani fighting food insecurity in her home state of Hawaii; and most recently, Reese Atwood supporting the Military Warriors Support Foundation. Atwood said, “I’m hoping that I can do everything I can to give back to a community that means a lot to me. I’m hoping that people see this organization and are able to give back as well. It means a lot to me just to be able to have a little bit more of a purpose. I think this All-Star Cup has brought that-being able to have something to play for. It gives a lot more meaning to the game.”

WELCOME TO THE SHOW

Since August 20th, seven players have made their Major League debut, including seven pitchers.

There have now been 219 players to make their Major League debut this season, including 128 pitchers and 91 position players.

- 22-year-old Kade Anderson, the Seattle Mariners top prospect and fifth overall prospect in MLB, per *MLB Pipeline* toed the rubber for his Major League debut on Saturday against the Chicago Cubs at T-Mobile Park. The Slidell, Louisiana native pitched to a no-decision in the Mariners’ win, becoming the eighth pitcher in franchise history and first since 2023 to fire at least 5.0 innings with five-or-more strikeouts and two-or-less walks issued in a debut outing.
- 26-year-old Mason Adams, the Chicago White Sox 20th overall prospect, per *MLB Pipeline* made his Major League debut on Tuesday against the Washington Nationals at Nationals Park. The Davenport, Iowa native allowed just one run across 4.0 innings in the White Sox 3-1 win, joining Antonio Senzatela as the only hurlers in franchise history to fire at least five strikeouts while allowing one run or less in a debut outing.

Overall, the White Sox pace the Majors with 15 players making their Major League debut this season followed by the Toronto Blue Jays with 13, Colorado Rockies with 12 and the San Francisco Giants with 11. The Cleveland Guardians and Minnesota Twins have seen 10 players make their debut while the St. Louis Cardinals and Texas Rangers have had nine. The teams with eight players making their debut include the Arizona Diamondbacks, Boston Red Sox, Detroit Tigers, Houston Astros, Miami Marlins, New York Mets and Pittsburgh Pirates. The Los Angeles Angels, Milwaukee Brewers and Nationals have had seven players make their debut while the Athletics, Cincinnati Reds, New York Yankees, Philadelphia Phillies and Mariners have had six players debut. The Baltimore Orioles are the lone team with five players making their debut while the Cubs, San Diego Padres and Tampa Bay Rays have had four. The Atlanta Braves have seen three players make debuts while the Kansas City Royals and Los Angeles Dodgers are the lone teams with two players making their Major League debut this season.

ABS OVERVIEW

OVERVIEW

MLB introduced the Automated Ball-Strike (ABS) Challenge System powered by T-Mobile beginning with the 2026 season. The system will rely on the same Hawk-Eye tracking technology that fuels MLB’s Statcast data. *What to know about the challenge system:*

- Only batters and pitchers/catchers may initiate a challenge. Managers, coaches and other players may not be involved.
- Each team starts the game with two challenges. Teams will lose the ability to challenge after they do so incorrectly twice. Teams will start each extra inning with a challenge regardless of whether they have already exhausted their challenges in the first nine innings.
- The ABS zone is set as follows: The width is 17 inches, identical to home plate. The top of the zone is set at 53.5% of a player’s measured height without cleats. The bottom is set at 27% of the player’s measured height. The strike zone is captured as the ball passes through the middle of the plate, not the front.
- In MLB, challenges will not be permitted when a position player is pitching.

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WEEKLY AWARDS

Right fielder Fernando Tatis Jr. of the San Diego Padres was named the National League Player of the Week, and shortstop Zach Neto of the Los Angeles Angels was selected the American League Player of the Week.

Tatis earned his fourth career award after previously winning on August 10, 2020; April 26, 2021; and most recently last season on April 21st. It marks the second honor for San Diego this season after his teammate Gavin Sheets won on May 18th. Neto garnered honors for the second time in his career after winning last season on August 18th. It is the second award for Los Angeles this season after José Soriano won the award on April 13th. It marks the first honor for an Angels position player since Jo Adell won last season on September 9th.

San Diego Padres right fielder Fernando Tatis Jr. earned his fourth career Play of the Week Award after previously winning on July 12, 2021; September 25, 2023; and August 25, 2025. Along with his honor as NL Player of the Week, Tatis became the second player to win Player of the Week for his respective league and win Play of the Week, joining Juan Soto, who earned both awards on April 1, 2024. Additionally, Tatis is the fifth player to win the award at least four times since its inception in 2019, joining Cedric Mullins (8x); Byron Buxton (5x); Denzel Clarke (4x); and Sal Frelick (4x). Overall, it is the seventh award for San Diego, with Tatis’ four awards joined by a pair of honors to Manny Machado on April 12, 2019 and July 14, 2025, and an award to Jackson Merrill earlier this season on April 20th. With San Diego leading 1-0 in the second inning after a leadoff blast from Tatis on the first pitch of the game, Francisco Lindor stepped to the plate with the bases loaded and hit a ball to right field as Tatis ranged back and made a leaping catch over the wall to bring back the grand slam.

SARAH'S FAVORITE NOTES OF THE WEEK

I'm Sarah Langs, a researcher for MLB.com, and I'm honored to have this space to share some of my favorite notes to wrap up each week of this wonderful sport.

CAN YOU BELIEVE IT HAPPENED AGAIN?! After Pete Crow-Armstrong hit a leadoff home run last Monday, then ended the game with a walk-off home run, Randy Arozarena did the same thing on Saturday — against the Cubs. He became only the seventh player with a leadoff and walk-off home run in the same game, per Elias, joining Crow-Armstrong, Chris Young on August 7, 2010, Ian Kinsler on July 19, 2009, Reed Johnson on June 15, 2003, Darin Erstad on June 25, 2000 and Vic Power on May 7, 1957. Only Arozarena, Crow-Armstrong and Power did this with a first-pitch leadoff homer.

SERIOUSLY, ALL OF IT: He wasn't done. Arozarena then led off the game with a homer on Sunday, just as Crow-Armstrong had last Tuesday. He became the 14th player since at least 1900 with a leadoff home run in the next team game after he hit a walk-off home run, per Elias. They're also the first player with multiple leadoff homers and a walk-off homer in a two-game span — and they did it in the same week. Baseball is the best.

FORTHREE: Cal Raleigh recorded his first career three-homer game on Monday. He became the second player in Mariners history with a three-homer game while playing catcher, joining his manager, Dan Wilson, on April 11, 1996. Raleigh became the third player in MLB history to hit at least three homers in a game against a team that entered on a win streak of nine or more games, as the Phillies did. He joined Gus Bell on July 21, 1955, also against the Phillies, and Moose Solters on July 7, 1935 against the Tigers. Raleigh is the only one whose team won and snapped the opponent's streak.

WALK-OFF WALDY: Ryan Waldschmidt did it again on Tuesday, hitting yet another walk-off home run. He's the only player with multiple walk-off homers while trailing in MLB this year. He's also one of just four rookies in MLB history with two walk-off homers while trailing in a season, per Elias. He joined 2006 Ryan Zimmerman, 1994 Bob Hamelin and 1943 Butch Nieman. Waldschmidt is one of five players in MLB history with two walk-off homers within their first three career home runs, along with Will Smith, James McCann (Waldschmidt's current teammate!), Kevin Romine and Kirby Higbe.

SCHWARBS: Kyle Schwarber hit his 40th home run of the season on Wednesday. This is Schwarber's fourth season with at least 40 home runs with the Phillies, tying Ryan Howard for the most such seasons in franchise history. That's also his 227th since joining the Phillies. That's the second-most home runs by a player in his first five seasons with a team, behind only Babe Ruth (NYY: 235). And there's plenty of season left.

RAFI: Rafael Devers has 17 home runs at Oracle Park this season after going yard in a third consecutive game on Wednesday. That's the most at the venue since Barry Bonds hit 26 there in 2004. Devers and Bonds (5x) are the only players to hit at least that many homers there in a season. From 2005-24, no Giants player hit 30 homers for the team in a season. In 2025, Willy Adames got there on the final day of the season. Now, Devers might get there before September. His 29 homers are the most through 133 team games for the club since 2004 Bonds (38).

WHEEEEEEE: The Reds won on Wednesday despite trailing by six runs entering the ninth. The Reds are now 3-1,917 all-time when trailing by at least six runs entering the ninth inning, per Elias. Wednesday's win joined one on May 8, 1958 at the Cubs and May 8, 1918 at the Cardinals. On the other side, the Giants entered the day 2,208-0 in franchise history when leading by at least six runs entering the ninth inning. The Giants were one of 12 current franchises that coming into Wednesday had never lost such a game, but only two others predated 1960s expansion (Red Sox & Yankees) and none began play before 1900 like the Giants did.

WHITE SOX WINNING WAYS: The White Sox won their 70th game on Wednesday. That tied the most wins by a team following at least three consecutive 100 or more loss seasons, with the 2014 Astros, 1965 Senators and 1925 Boston Braves. It's August. In related news, no team has made the playoffs following even two straight 100-loss seasons. Yet.

SUPER SAL: Sal Stewart leads MLB with 100 RBI entering Thursday. He's the first rookie with at least 100 RBI in a season since Pete Alonso had 120 in 2019. Just two rookies have led at least their league in RBI for a season (RBI official since 1920): 1950 Walt Dropo (144 RBI) and 1939 Ted Williams (144 RBI per Elias). Both led MLB. Will Stewart become the third?

CURRENT IRONMAN: Matt Olson has played 915 consecutive games entering Thursday, dating to May 2, 2021. His streak is the 8th-longest in MLB history. The only other streaks of at least 700 consecutive games to begin in the divisional era (1969) are, of course, 1982-98 Cal Ripken Jr. (2,632 games), as well as 1975-83 Steve Garvey (1,207), 2000-07 Miguel Tejada (1,152), 1978-83 Pete Rose (745) and 1981-86 Dale Murphy (740).

LINE DRIVES

HOW'S IT GOING, OLD CHAP?: Andrés Chaparro hit his eighth home run since the All-Star break last night and leads the Majors in slugging percentage (.727) and OPS (1.132) in the second half. Chaparro's 9.63 at-bats per home run since the All-Star break rank second in the Majors among players with at least 80 plate appearances, trailing only Hunter Goodman (9.56). Since July 16, Chaparro also ranks fourth in the National League in on-base percentage (.404) and seventh in batting average (.312).

A BOLTE OF LIGHTNING-AY: Henry Bolte is batting .326 (31-for-95) with 17 runs scored and six three-hit games across 24 games in August. Bolte ranks third in the Majors in hits this month and 10th in batting average (.326). Overall, he is tied for seventh among Major League rookies with 14 stolen bases and ranks 13th with 83 hits. Among rookies with at least 300 plate appearances, Bolte ranks sixth in batting average (.272) and on-base percentage (.347).

GASP!: Mickey Gasper's 2.208 OPS over his last seven games prior to last night trails only Ted Williams, in 1941 and 1957, for the highest mark over a seven-game span in Red Sox history among players with at least 10 plate appearances. Over those seven games, Gasper batted .563 with a .708 on-base percentage, three doubles, four home runs and 10 RBI, going 9-for-16 with six walks and two hit-by-pitches. Since being recalled on August 16, Gasper has recorded eight extra-base hits and 12 RBI in eight games. He entered that stretch with nine extra-base hits and 18 RBI across his first 92 career games.

HAIR OF THE DOG: With baseball's "Dog Days" of August coming to a close this weekend, the Cardinals feature three qualifying hitters batting at least .300 this month: Alec Burleson (.337), Nathan Church (.317) and Jordan Walker (.306). The Mets are the only other National League team with at least three qualifying hitters batting .300 or better this month: Carson Benge, who leads the NL at .359, Bo Bichette, Jared Young and Luis Robert Jr. Burleson also leads the Majors with 25 RBI in August, while the Orioles' Pete Alonso ranks third with 20.

NEED FOR SPEED: The Miami Marlins lead the Majors with 140 stolen bases, one ahead of the Washington Nationals (139). Miami is the only team in the Majors with four players who have recorded at least 15 stolen bases: Esteury Ruiz (29), Otto Lopez (29), Jakob Marsee (20) and Xavier Edwards (19). The 2026 Marlins are looking to join the 2002 club as the only teams in franchise history to have four players record at least 20 stolen bases. The Cubs and Red Sox both accomplished the feat during the 2025 season.

VARGAS LOOKS TO JOIN 30/30 CLUB: Miguel Vargas needs one home run to join Robin Ventura (1996) and Joe Crede (2006) as the only primary third basemen in White Sox history to record 30 doubles and 30 home runs in a season. Vargas, who has recorded 30 doubles for the second consecutive season, also needs one home run to become the fifth primary third baseman in franchise history with a 30-homer season. He would join Todd Frazier (40 in 2016), Ventura (34 in 1996), Bill Melton (33 in 1970 and 1971) and Crede (30 in 2006). Vargas is also attempting to become the fourth White Sox player to lead the American League in runs scored, joining Tim Anderson (2020), Frank Thomas (1994) and John Mostil (1925).

PETERS MAKES HISTORY: According to OptaSTATS, rookie Tristan Peters is just the third player in Major League history to hit for the cycle, hit a grand slam and a walk-off home run, homer in four consecutive games, record six RBI and reach base safely five times in a game in the same season, joining Hall of Famers Jimmie Foxx (1933) and Joe DiMaggio (1937). Peters has joined Colson Montgomery, who homered in four straight games from April 18-22, and rookie Munetaka Murakami, who homered in five straight from April 17-22, as White Sox players this season to homer in at least four consecutive games.

SECOND THOUGHTS: The Royals are 21-16 (.568) since the All-Star break, the ninth-best record in the Majors and second best in the American League, trailing only the Red Sox (27-12). Kansas City was shut out, 3-0, by Toronto last night, snapping a nine-game winning streak. Kansas City's second-half play marks a significant improvement after going 38-59 before the All-Star break, 21 games under .500 and tied for the worst record in the Majors. The Royals are 6-4-1 across 11 completed series since the All-Star break. Among American League teams, only the Red Sox (nine), Blue Jays (seven) and Yankees (seven) have more series wins during that span. Royals starting pitchers own a 3.63 ERA, allowing 80 earned runs across 198.1 innings since the All-Star break.

SAVED BY THE BELL: Cody Bellinger recorded his 500th career extra-base hit with his 12th home run of the season, a go-ahead three-run shot in the third inning on Tuesday vs. Houston. He followed that performance with a go-ahead two-run double in the seventh inning on Wednesday, going 1-for-5 with one run scored and two RBI. Bellinger is batting .349/.410/.542 (29-for-83) with six doubles, two triples, two home runs, 41 RBI, 12 walks and five sacrifice flies with runners in scoring position this season. He has hit .317/.394/.568 (58-for-183) with 31 runs, 15 doubles, two triples, nine home runs, 38 RBI, 26 walks, four sacrifice flies and five stolen bases in 50 games at home this season. Bellinger has hit safely in 14 of his last 15 games dating to July 9, batting .333/.387/.474 (19-for-57) with nine runs, five doubles, one home run, eight RBI and five walks during that span.

I SEE THE FUTURE (OF SD), CRYSTAL BALL: Fernando Tatis Jr. (12 home runs, seven stolen bases) and Jackson Merrill (11 home runs, five stolen bases) are two of three players to record at least 10 home runs and five stolen bases since the All-Star break, joining Pete Crow-Armstrong. Since the All-Star break, Tatis is tied for the league lead with 12 home runs, while Merrill is tied for the third most with 11. Tatis is also one of four players with at least 15 home runs and 30 stolen bases this season. Since July 1, San Diego ranks among the Major League leaders in on-base percentage (second, .342), batting average (third, .261), fWAR (third, 9.9), wRC+ (third, 116), OPS (fourth, .760) and slugging percentage (fifth, .419).

REID THIS: Reid Detmers has posted a 1.56 ERA, allowing seven earned runs across 40.1 innings, in seven starts since the All-Star break and owns an active 16.0-inning scoreless streak. Detmers has allowed three earned runs or fewer in 17 of his last 21 starts. This season, he ranks fourth in the American League with a career-high 172 strikeouts, is tied for fifth with a .209 opponent batting average, ranks seventh with a 1.06 WHIP and ninth with 149.0 innings pitched.
